3	You went as far to put together

9	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: So, you are not	
10	making allegations that there are no-show

25	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: I am sorry, Can	

1	you, please, repeat your question.	1
2	LUCILLE DEFINA: There was a policy	
3	that allowed an owner when an owner came in	
4	to surrender their pet, they had to sign two	Page 72
5	forms, "owner's request for immediate	
6	euthanasia," but it is supposed to be when a	
7	person does that, it is immediate euthanasia.	
8	They have been signing, "owner's	
9	request for euthanasia" and "owner surrender	
10	for adoption and rescue."	
11	They have been recently forced to sign	
12	both those forms, which when a dog has been -	
13	- when the Director made the decision to kill	
14	that dog under aggression, it shows up as	
15	owner's request.	
16	So, it has to be one or the other.

4	Are these people that are surrendering	Page 73
5	their dogs into the shelter, are they going	
6	to continue to have to sign those forms?	
7	That is all I want to know.	
8	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: Two things, Number	
9	1, put that request in writing.	
10	It will be answered in the contents of	
11	the lawsuit that is pending.	
12	LUCILLE DEFINA: What does that have	
13	to do with the lawsuit that is pending?	
14	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: Please, be	
15	respectful and quiet.	
16	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: There is a pending	
17	Federal lawsuit concerning every aspect of	
18	the Animal Shelter.	
19	The questions that you asked touched	
20	on questions, therefore, I will answer those	
21	questions in writing within the contents of	
22	the lawsuit, so, please, put that in writing.	
23	LUCILLE DEFINA: This is always what	
24	you do when you are afraid to answer	
25	something, so, I will suspect that the owners	

1	are going to be signing both forms because	
2	your excuse is a pending lawsuit and cannot	
3	answer.	
4	One has nothing to do with another,	Page 74
5	so, yes, okay, we will find out if both of	
6	these forms are being signed.	
7	We will find out.	
8	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: Thank you. David	
9	Pernachi. (phonetic spelling)	
10	DAVID PERNACHI: David Pernanchi,	
11	Westbury, New York.	
12	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: Yes, sir.	
13	DAVID PERNANCHI: On the Resolution,	
14	21646, um – –	
15	(Whereupon, "talk in the mic," was	
16	heard calling out from the audience.)

18	idea overall but since it is being so far	
19	away, um, is there any committees or any	
20	meetings together to follow-up on these dogs,

1	keep them sociable and adoptable is very	
2	important.	
3	Like I said, I went down there and I	
4	volunteered and what I saw is very upsetting,	Page 76
5	not that everything is bad but there are	
6	certain changes for the betterment of the	
7	dog, but to keep them adopted.	
8	I don't know if you even looked at the	
9	information that you had at the last meeting	
10	but, it is very possible in a twelve-month

12	in the Town of Hempstead.	
13	Um, Item Number 21646 on the contract,	
14	what is an acceptance letter bid?

23	DIANE MADDEN: Where was this posted?	
24	When? Where? How many applicants?	
25	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: It was sent to	

1	Rehabilitative Services as identified by the
2	Department.
3	DIANE MADDEN: How can we find out?
4	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: You can FOIL it?
5	DIANE MADDEN: Because you said that
6	was the only response, correct?
7	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: We got the
8	response.
9	DIANE MADDEN: Was it ever posted on
10	FACEBOOK?
11	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: Please, FOIL the
12	information.
13	DIANE MADDEN: There is no
14	specification on how many videotapes are
15	required during the dog's time there.
16	Can this contract be modified to
17	request updates until the outcome of the dog
18	is finalized?
19	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: Please, put the
20	request in writing.
21	DIANE MADDEN: That is not a yes or no
22	answer.
23	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: Please, put your
24	request in writing.
25	DIANE MADDEN: With this contract

1	arrangement, does the Board understand after	
2	sixty days, these dogs can be destroyed?	
3	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: I would tell you	
4	that, thank you for your comments and if the	Page 79
5	document is available, I will provide it for	
6	you.	
7	DIANE MADDEN: The document	
8	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: It is a FOIL	
9	request.	
10	The Board is not going to comment.	
11	There is a Federal Civil Rights	
12	lawsuit.	
13	The Board is not going to comment with	
14	anything that has to do with the Animal	
15	Shelter.	
16	DIANE MADDEN: That is interesting	
17	because the Board has commented on other	
18	lawsuits that have been in different	
19	departments, so, I am finding that quite	
20	interesting because this is so reminiscent to	
21	the last time we filed a lawsuit for animal	
22	rights violated.	
23	In any case, what are the policies and	
24	procedures for transport?	
25	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: As we said earlier,	

1	there is a major alliance that transported	
2	the animals to the facility.	
3	DIANE MADDEN: Is that the only	
4	organization that is going to be	Page 80
5	transporting?	
6	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: So far, that is the	
7	only one that we know of.	
8	DIANE MADDEN: Does Ms. Strong have	
9	any input on which dogs will be sent there?

2	DIANE MADDEN: I asked you if she has	
3	any input in the dogs coming in?	
4	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: In the first	Page 81
5	instance, I would imagine if there is an	
6	instance if the dog gets there, we would have	
7	to discuss it with her, which would be	
8	reasonable.	
9	DIANE MADDEN: Okay, under this	
10	agreement, ten favorite dogs will be sent for	
11	extra training or placement, who determines	
12	which dogs are selected out of the hundreds	
13	that need help and pass through the shelter	
14	doors each year?	
15	Who makes those determinations?	
16	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: The Animal Shelter.	
17	DIANE MADDEN: Who in the Animal	
18	Shelter?	
19	What names?	
20	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: You may FOIL the	
21	information and if it is available, we will	
22	give it to you.	
23	DIANE MADDEN: So, there is no	
24	committee?	
25	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: You may FOIL the	

1	Information.
2	DIANE MADDEN: So, there is no one
3	that is going to be making those decisions?
4	It is not the trainer that you are $ ext{Page} \mid 82$
5	hiring?
6	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: You may FOIL the
7	information.
8	DIANE MADDEN: Was Kim Strong's
9	facility inspected?
10	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: Yes.
11	DIANE MADDEN: And, by whom?
12	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: FOIL that
13	information, please.
14	DIANE MADDEN: By whom?
15	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: FOIL the
16	information.
17	DIANE MADDEN: Has the Board seen any
18	qualifications and any licensing on this
19	contracted job?
20	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: The Board has the
21	background of Kim Stron.
22	DIANE MADDEN: From FACEBOOK or actual
23	certifications, licensing, references?
24	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: I can provide that
25	to you.

1	DIANE MADDEN: To be clear, the total	
2	of this contract on top of one hundred and	
3	nine thousand dollar contract is an	
4	additional ninety thousand dollars taxpayer	Page 83
5	dollars to send only thirty dogs over a	
6	period of three years for rehabilitation,	
7	they could be receiving at the Shelter under	
8	a seventy-five thousand dollars on staff,	
9	fulltime Behaviorist.	
10	This is more money, less services.	
11	Does this contract eliminate the	
12	collecting and handling of unaccounted cash	
13	donations and GO FUND ME pages previously	
14	created by Shelter supervisors and/or	
15	employees or is this additional money, this	
16	line item?	
17	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: I don't have that	
18	information available.	
19	I will get it to you.	
20	DIANE MADDEN: Advocates have been	
21	asking since last October what the line item	
22	was for, what the policy and procedures for	
23	this placement of animals, thirty thousand	
24	dollars from last October when did you decide	
25	where this money was going to go?	

1	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: You may FOIL the	
2	information.	
3	DIANE MADDEN: And, the policies and	
4	procedures, as well?	Page 84
5	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: You may FOIL the	
6	information.	
7	DIANE MADDEN: And, finally on this	
8	issue, this is a four hundred and seventeen	
9	thousand dollar taxpayers' expense versus,	
10	um, two hundred and twenty-five thousand	
11	dollars, it should cost to have a fulltime on	
12	staff Behaviorist.	
13	There is nearly a two hundred thousand	
14	dollars additional cost for this contract	
15	combined.	
16	When, on Ms. Fanti's resume, she says	
17	she handles very difficult, aggressive dogs,	
18	so, I think it is important that the Board	
19	understands taxpayers are paying two hundred	
20	thousand dollars difference to have less	
21	services and this does not address the	
22	majority of dogs that need this kind of	
23	intervention.	
24	To answer your question, Councilman	
25	Blakeman, you asked if we are saying that	

1	there are no-show jobs.	
2	We have no way of knowing, at this	
3	moment, today, but, yes, there have been.	
4	There has been no-show jobs at the	Page 85
5	Animal Shelter.	
6	It took place as we were	
7	(Whereupon, the bell rang. After, the	
8	following ensued.)	
9	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: Your time is up.	
10	Thank you very much.	
11	DIANE MADDEN: I have a second item,	
12	Item Number 4, um, I know you don't know what	
13	I have to say.	
14	Pat Murphy, Chris Smith was fired.	
15	The office was vacant.	
16	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: You have had your	
17	five minutes.	
18	DIANE MADDEN: That is it, that is	
19	where the no-show job takes place.	
20	Um, the next item is Item Number 5,	
21	the Comptroller stated in October of 2016,	
22	eighty thousand dollars included in the 2017	
23	budget for fulltime Behaviorist, how did you	
24	come up with one hundred and nine thousand	
25	dollars?	

1	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: I believe that she	
2	is getting sixty dollars per hour, that is	
3	what it is based on.	
4	DIANE MADDEN: That is about what	Page 86
5	doctors and lawyers make.	
6	So, we have an Animal Shelter Director	
7	that is getting thirty dollars an hour on	
8	Long Island.	
9	(Whereupon, "woe" was heard from the	
10	audience. After, the following ensued.)	
11	DIANE MADDEN: Sixty dollars an hour	
12	and that is why it came out to because	
13	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: That is what it is	
14	based on.	
15	DIANE MADDEN: Topped out on eighty,	
16	you are paying this Behaviorist who is less	
17	qualified one hundred and nine thousand	
18	dollars a year plus thirty thousand dollars a	
19	year to send more dollars somewhere else	
20	where she won't handle or can't handle.	
21	Um, I think the public needs to know	
22	that and I think the Board should have looked	
23	into this before they are sitting, here,	
24	ready to approve this kind of money.	
25	Did anyone contact Laura Miller	

1	because she sits on the Town's only Civil	
2	Service test for seventy-five thousand	
3	dollars?	
4	Handle both cat and dog rescue	Page 87
5	behavior.	
6	She has run departments before.	
7	She trained under Laura Gorber (as	
8	heard).	
9	Did anyone reach out to her for this	
10	position?	
11	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: I don't know the	
12	answer to that question.	
13	DIANE MADDEN: The Town is using a	
14	total of one hundred and thirty-nine thousand	
15	to relocate animals.	
16	Why wouldn't they hire a fulltime on-	
17	staff-qualified Behaviorist capable of	
18	restoring all the progressive programs that	
19	are gone?	
20	Isn't the point of hiring a	
21	Behaviorist so you address the issues	
22	preventing the animals being transported out	
23	of the facilities in the first place?	
24	The Board is about to approve spending	
25	a one hundred and nine thousand dollar	

1	contract for the least qualified candidate to	
2	select a portion of the dogs to get sent to	
3	an Upstate facility for additional taxpayers'	
4	cost of thirty thousand dollars, that is one	Page 88
5	hundred and thirty-nine thousand dollars.	
6	Kick the can down the road or seventy-	
7	five?	
8	An expert who can handle it all, has	
9	handled it all and it has been a success	
10	before this Administration.	
11	The contract is vague, yet, Supervisor	
12	Santino said this would require fulltime	
13	hours.	
14	What are the hours of this position?	
15	It is not online.	
16	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: I believe she is	
17	hired to work thirty-five hours a week,	
18	going to provide thirty-five hours.	
19	DIANE MADDEN: Provide, right, so that	
20	leads me to my next question, is that on	
21	property, on-staff hours or is that work at

1	She devoted two hours on-staff for	
2	that.	
3	There were no road trips at our	
4	expense.	Page 91
5	Having said publicly, Ms. Fanti is	
6	resigning her position for the animal shelter	
7	control job and the other government	
8	shelters, is that still the case.	
9	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: Yes.	
10	DIANE MADDEN: Who makes the	
11	determination of which dogs get sent up to	
12	Yorkville and what happens to the dogs that	
13	don't get sent up to Yorkville?	
14	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: The Department will	
15	decide which animals go.	
16	DIANE MADDEN: Who, in the Department?

5	for and will pick dogs she can't handle.	
6	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: I am saying FOIL	
7	the information.	
8	DIANE MADDEN: I was provided Christie	
9	Fanti's resume in September of 2016, was that	
10	the only resume she ever submitted or was	
11	there an additional resume when there is a	
12	second RFP?	
13	(Whereupon, the bell rang. After, the	
14	following ensued.)	
15	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: Thank you very	
16	much, Ms. Madden, your time has expired.	
17	Is there anyone else that would like	
18	to speak on the Administrative Calendar on a	
19	specific item on the Administrative Calendar?	
20	Sir, in the back.	
21	Name and address for the record.	
22	DAVE HANSON: Dave Hanson. 47 Fordham	
23	Road, Hempstead, New York.	
24	I am involved in Uniondale and	
25	Hempstead.	

1	(Whereupon, "speak into the	
2	microphone" was heard screaming out from the	
3	audience. After, the following ensued.)	
4	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: Is this on a	Page 93
5	specific item?	
6	DAVE HANSON: Yes.
