4	Application of 141F REALTY, LLC. to ${ m Page} \mid 18$	
5	rezone from Residence District "B" to	
6	Business District - BALDWIN - east of the	
7	northeast intersection of Grand Avenue and	
8	Seaman Avenue.	
9	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: Good Morning,	
10	sir.	
11	ATTORNEY O'BRIEN: Good Morning,	
12	Supervisor Santino, Members of the Board,	
13	Madam Clerk:	
14	Kevin O'Brien.	
15	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: Name and address	
16	for the record.	
17	ATTORNEY O'BRIEN: Kevin O'Brien from	
18	the firm of Murphy, Bartol & O'Brien with	
19	offices at 22 Jericho Turnpike, Mineola, New	
20	York and on behalf of the applicant.	
21	I also have with me, here, this	
22	Morning, Mr. Chris Tartaglia, P.E. from High	
23	Point Engineering, the design professionals	
24	that have prepared the plans before the	
25	Board.	
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1	And, I also have Mr. Tom Simonelli who	
2	is the Real Estate Manager for the property.	
3	Now, that we have these new electronic	
4	means for the Plans, I don't get to walk	Page   19
5	around anymore.	
6	I think it is better for the Public	
7	and the Board Members.	
8	Inasmuch as these are two companion	
9	applications involving the same set of facts	
10	and circumstances and properties, I request	
11	that they be consolidated as one application.	
12	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: Without	
13	objection, so ordered.	
14	ATTORNEY O'BRIEN: Okay, thank you.	
15	This is an application involving an existing	
16	gasoline service station located at the	
17	northeast corner of Seaman Avenue and Grand	
18	Avenue.	
19	Um, just a little two-second history	
20	of this location, the service of this	
21	location actually, the service station	
22	has been continually operating as a gasoline	
23	service station since 1928.	
24	Back in 1928, there was an application	
25	that was made for, um, the service station,	
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1	at that time, for five hundred and fifty	
2	gallon underground service storage tanks.	
3	They switched them over to three, one	
4	thousand gallon storage tanks.	Page   20
5	It was granted and operated as a	
6	gasoline service station since that time.	
7	Um, throughout the years, there have	
8	been numerous applications before the Town	
9	for the replacement for the removal and	
10	replacement of the underground storage tanks	
11	at this location.	
12	The property owner that is making this	
13	application recently purchased this property,	
14	approximately, three years ago.	
15	Um, the tanks that were existing at	
16	that time exceeded their useful right	
17	pursuant to the Nassau County Fire Marshall's	
18	Office and immediately removed part of the	
19	application.	
20	We have made application also for the	
21	reinstallation of underground storage tanks.	
22	And, what we are proposing, at this	
23	location, is to, um, continue to operate as a	
24	gasoline service station, put the gas back	
25	in, um, physically.	
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1	The site plan that is before you, the	1
2	yellow area is the existing three-bay service	
3	station building which would remain as the	Page   21
4	service bay building.	1  age + 21
5	The office area there, um, would be	
6	utilized as an, um, snack shop.	
7	The shaded area or, I guess, it would	
8	be beige, has what we proposed to be four	
9	pump islands with multi-product dispenser for	
10	the sale of petroleum products.	
11	Those four pump islands would be	
12	covered by a canopy.	
13	The dotted area that you see along the	
14	rear of the property line, um, the property,	
15	itself, is zoned "Business X" but the	
16	property in the rear is zoned "Residence B".	
17	Um, like most thoroughfares in the	
18	Town of Hempstead, typically, what we have is	
19	the "Business X" that extends one hundred	
20	feet from the main from the front	
21	property line, that is the case in this	
22	circumstance, as well.	
23	Um, the business goes to that dotted	
24	line and I believe we are approximately, one	
25	hundred and twelve feet, so that area from	
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	HEMPSTEAD TOWN BOARD 2///1/	
1	one hundred feet to one hundred twelve feet,	
2	that dotted area that is "Residence" that is	
3	why part of the application seeks to rezone	
4	that property, continue to use it as it has	Page
5	been used since 1928, as a gasoline service	
6	station.	
7	Part of the building, as you can see,	
8	exists in that area but principally what it	
9	would be used for is for, um, landscaping	
10	purposes.	
11	As far as the curb cuts are concerned,	
12	the curb cuts are existing.	
13	As a matter of fact, I believe the	
14	County inspected them recently, um, wherein,	
15	they are making upgrades to the roadways in	
16	the area, upgrades, at least, this side of	
17	the street and there are new curbing.	
18	There has been some brick work that	
19	has been done, new sidewalks and the like.	
20	So, I think this, um, will be an	
21	upgrade, um, would be consistent with what	
22	the County is doing along the area.	
23	I know the County hasn't done across	
24	the street yet, but I think that is slated to	
25	be done, as well.	
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1	Originally, it has operated as a	
2	gasoline service station and it continues	
3	we would like to continue operating as a	
4	service station.	Page   23
5	We are seeking to be included in the	
6	"GSS" Zoning District because as part of the	
7	Town Code and I am sure the Board is aware	
8	from seeing applications like this in the	
9	past, um, when they adopted the "GSS"	
10	Ordinance in 1974 will continue to operate	
11	that service station.	
12	We notice that part what we are	
13	seeking is inclusion, the ability to be a	
14	self service at this location, as well.	
15	Mindful of some of the policies	
16	adopted in the past with the operation of	
17	service stations, such as, the policy, we	
18	provide full service between the hours of	
19	8:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m., for those, you know,	
20	seniors and those choosing to operate a self-	
21	service.	
22	So, functionally, um, it will function	
23	pretty much the same.	
24	Actually, there is a good point and	
25	for any sort of operational questions of	
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1	this sort, my engineer is ready to step in at	
2	any time.	
3	But, um, back in the `20's, the late	
4	`20's, I should say the way the pump islands	Page   2
5	were situated, some were pointed toward	
6	Seaman and ran parallel to Seaman, um, and	
7	others were running parallel to Grand.	
8	What we have done is we kept all the	
9	pump islands directionally by Grand, so,	
10	further away from the residential area,	
11	functions better in that proposed way, so,	
12	that is really one of the only changes, let's	
13	say, from some of the past operations.	
14	The way the pump islands over by	
15	Seaman, we have changed and having everything	
16	run parallel but other than that, the	
17	function will remain the same.	
18	I think it will be upgraded.	
19	I think it is reasonable.	
20	One thing that we added and perhaps,

25	landscaping plan.

2	original packet, if you can discuss that Mr.

4	ENGINEER TARTAGLIA: Yes, my	Page   25
5	appearance before the Board, Chris Tartaglia,	
6	Principal owner of the firm, High Point	
7	Engineering. 521 Conklin Street, Farmingdale,	
8	New York 11735.	
9	Um, if we could just on the display	
10	maybe go to the aerial photo, right there,	
11	um, what you can see up on the board, the	
12	site is essentially devoid of any kind of	
13	landscaping or green space.	
14	One of the rules of thumb in Hempstead

16	facilities is to try to get as much green	
17	space as we can.	
18	Essentially, landscape every part of	
19	the property that does not need to be	
20	utilized as a building, circulation aisles.	
21	So, in this instance, what we have	
22	done, if you could go back to the rendering,	
23	please, um, we are adding a significant	
24	amount of green space, a little over two	
25	thousand square feet.	
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1	Another rule of thumb, if we can get	
2	more landscaping than building area, we have.	
3	We find we have a successful design in

7	I am Director of the Many Races	
8	Cultural Foundation and I am a former	
9	resident of Hempstead.	
10	Um, my interest in Hempstead comes out	
11	of my, um, being the Editor of the Freedom	
12	Press and it centers on racial issues which	
13	is the concern of the Many Races Cultural	
14	Foundation.	
15	And, it is through my investigations	
16	that I found, um, not only the IDA of	
17	Hempstead but other groups have given PILOTS,	
18	um, at an extraordinary level to, um, which	
19	has undermined the tax base of the Village of	
20	Hempstead.	
21	And, I was particularly concerned	
22	recently about the wonderful Key Food which	
23	is a retail, um, establishment.	
24	And, yet, um, the PILOT was issued for	
25	that particular area.	

1	The problem was that when I went to	
2	the IDA Board and asked them about that, why	
3	there were people opposing Green Acres on the	
4	grounds that was retail but, then, the IDA	Page   46
5	gave a retail PILOT to Key Foods and, um, the	
6	response of the IDA Attorney, Mr. Ryan was	
7	that, um, there is another, um, issue with	
8	regard to retail, not only, um, as you know,	
9	they claim that Green Acres was a tourist	
10	attraction to justify the retail.	
11	Obviously, Key Food is not a tourist	
12	attraction, either.	
13	So, he said that.	
14	Um, there is also another issue and	
15	that has to do with a depressed area and, um,	
16	that, um, he had documentation that indicated	
17	that Hempstead was considered a depressed	
18	area and it was the only area in all of Long	
19	Island that was considered a depressed area	
20	and I said to him, um, first of all, I would	
21	like to see the law that says that a	
22	depressed area gets special consideration.	
23	And, secondly, I would like to see the	
24	documentation that zeroes in on Hempstead as	
25	being a depressed area.	
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1	And, um, so, he said I said, I	
2	would like to get that under the FOIL	
3	request.	
4	He said yes, you can get that under	Page   47
5	FOIL, so, I put a FOIL request in and I	
6	received a letter, now, denying me that	
7	information that he said publicly that he had	
8	the information and that I could get it under	
9	FOIL and, now, the agency is denying me.	
10	So, I think you should be aware of	
11	that.	
12	Um, in a broader sense, if, in fact,	
13	Hempstead is declared a depressed area or	
14	distressed area, um, that is questionable,	
15	Number 1.	
16	Because the, um, area median income is	
17	fifty-three thousand dollars.	
18	It is not a totally depressed area.	
19	It needs work, yes, but, it is not a	
20	totally depressed area.	
21	The businesses there are making money.	
22	Um, the problem is, as I see it, is	
23	that the, um, over the years, there have been	
24	so many PILOTS for apartment buildings and	
25	apartment buildings do not bring in	
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1	jobs and they instead have depressed the area	
2	economically because they bring in a lot of	
3	people and they, um, ultimately cause the	
4	taxes to go up and so, you give the breaks to	Page   48
5	these apartment building owners, they don't	
6	keep up the buildings, oftentimes and it is	
7	depressing the area.	
8	So, I wanted to present to you a, um,	
9	study.	
10	First of all, I want to give you a	
11	copy of the letter from the IDA rejecting my	
12	request.	
13	And, I also would like to give you a	
14	copy of the Freedom Press from 2009 which,	
15	um, went into an extensive study of the, um,	
16	the number of properties taken off the tax

18	Um, as you will see back in 2009	
19	(Whereupon, the bell rang. After, the	
20	following ensued.)	
21	CATHERINE GARRY: It was already four	
22	million	
23	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: Wrap up.	
24	CATHERINE GARRY: I will finish	
25	four million dollars worth of tax	
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1	revenue to the Village plus another, um,	
2	eight to ten million to the School District	
3	and this is in 2009 because of these	
4	apartment building PILOTS.	Page   49
5	And, I find that the current Board is	
6	totally insensitive to this and this is going	
7	to effect the whole Town of Hempstead	
8	because, now, with supposed new development,	
9	which is quite controversial, they want to	
10	bring in a City into the Center of Hempstead,	
11	which affects the Town of Hempstead and bring	
12	in another ten thousand people into that	
13	community and the developer wants twenty-year	
14	PILOTS on every single apartment building	
15	that he wants to bring in, here.	
16	So, this is very serious.	
17	I am going to give you a special issue	
18

4	DIANE MADDEN: Diane Madden, Pa	ge   50
5	Hempstead, New York.	
6	Um, Item Number 28103.	
7	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: Yes?	
8	DIANE MADDEN: I just have some	
9	questions about this social media policy.	
10	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: Sure.	
11	DIANE MADDEN: It seems like a place	
12	where people can be discriminated against.	
13	I was trying to find out the	
14	consequences and they vary from nothing to,	
15	um, being terminated.	
16	So, who makes those decisions?	
17	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: Well, Albina, if	
18	you would come forward.	
19	This is one of our Deputy Town	
20	Attorneys that is involved in this area.	
21	Albina, identify yourself for the	
22	record.	
23	DEPUTY TOWN ATTORNEY KATAEVA: Albina	
24	Kataeva, Deputy Town Attorney, Town of	
25	Hempstead.	
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1	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: Can you explain	
2	in brief, the policy, what it does.	
3	DEPUTY TOWN ATTORNEY KATAEVA: Sure,	
4	with any policy with the Town, we have to	Page   5
5	give our employees notice, certain actions	
6	that can be disciplined for.	
7	One such area that has developed over	
8	the years is social media and the use of	
9	social media during working hours.	
10	This policy applies to all of our	
11	employees and with any other policy depending	
12	on the nature of the infraction that is what	
13	the discipline will depend on.	
14	DIANE MADDEN: Who makes that	
15	decision?	
16	DEPUTY TOWN ATTORNEY KATAEVA: That	
17	decision is made jointly with the Department	
18	Heads and myself, as Labor Counsel for the	
19	Town.	
20	DIANE MADDEN: Okay and who monitors	
21	these employees?	
22	DEPUTY TOWN ATTORNEY KATAEVA: Well,	
23	as with all our employees, we have	
24	supervisors at all different levels, you have	
25	middle management, the actual	
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1	Commissioners, Department Heads, Division	
2	Heads and they all come down and sit down	
3	with me, the Labor Counsel.	
4	DIANE MADDEN: So, what you are	Page   52
5	saying, all those people that you named can	
6	be on FACEBOOK all day monitoring the people	
7	that they suspect are on social media?	
8	DEPUTY TOWN ATTORNEY KATAEVA:	
9	Absolutely not, it comes to our attention if	
10	the employee is seen using their phones for	
11	accessing social media.	
12	This is not a policy to be put in	
13	place to make sure that our employees are	
14	being monitored on media sites, that is not	
15	the purpose of it, whatsoever.	
16	The purpose of it is that during	
17	working hours, the employees, as Town	
18	Employees, are expected to be working.	
19	They are not free from distraction,	
20	so, if they are walking around with their	
21	cell phone on FACEBOOK posting and liking and	
22	whatever else and that comes to our	
23	attention, as it most often does, we have to	
24	take action, just like we have to take action	
25	for any other thing that we have	
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1	seen, such as, the use of Town vehicles or	
2	any other type of behavior that the employee	
3	should not be conducting.	
4	DIANE MADDEN: Okay, I am confused	Page
5	because what you just said was that the use	
6	of FACEBOOK and social media, that is a	
7	little bit different than the content that	
8	they are saying on social media.	
9	DEPUTY TOWN ATTORNEY KATAEVA: If they	
10	are working and it is during working hours,	
11	which is what the social media policy goes	
12	to, they should not be commenting or doing	
13	anything on social media during those working	
14	hours, that is the purpose of this policy to	
15	give them notice that they are not to be on	
16	social media while they are at work, during	
17	working hours.	
18	DIANE MADDEN: I am not getting that	
19	from this.	
20	I am getting it is more what they are	
21	saying on social media.	
22	DEPUTY TOWN ATTORNEY KATAEVA:	
23	Considering it doesn't mention anything with	
24	respect to what they are posting, it is	
25	simply the policy is very clear on	
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1	its face.
2	It is very direct as to what we are
3	policing, which is when you are at work, you
4	are expected to work free from distraction, $\operatorname{Page} 54$
5	that is the purpose of this policy.
6	DIANE MADDEN: It goes a lot deeper
7	than that.
8	Does it apply to, um, contracted
9	employees?
10	DEPUTY TOWN ATTORNEY KATAEVA: Does
11	this apply to contracted employees?
12	DIANE MADDEN: Correct.
13	DEPUTY TOWN ATTORNEY KATAEVA: They
14	are independent contractors for a reason,
15	they are not employees.
16	DIANE MADDEN: Okay, they are not
17	contracted employees?
18	DEPUTY TOWN ATTORNEY KATAEVA: They
19	are not employees.
20	There is a difference there.
21	DIANE MADDEN: Well, they work for the
22	Town.
23	They are contracted with Hempstead.
24	DEPUTY TOWN ATTORNEY KATAEVA: They
25	are contracted to provide certain services
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1	for the Town.
2	They are not employees. They are
3	different.
4	DIANE MADDEN: They are taxpayer- $ ext{Page} \mid 55$
5	funded contracts that work for the Town of
6	Hempstead, um, how do these reports come in?
7	Are they from the public?
8	DEPUTY TOWN ATTORNEY KATAEVA: It
9	varies, it is case-by-case situation, so,
10	there is really no one situation fits all.
11	It can come from the public.
12	It can come from different source.
13	It really depends.
14	DIANE MADDEN: Ultimately, you make
15	the decision, is that my understanding?
16	DEPUTY TOWN ATTORNEY KATAEVA: We make
17	it in conjunction with the Departments.
18	DIANE MADDEN: In other words, someone
19	could violate this twenty times and not have
20	any repercussions?
21	DEPUTY TOWN ATTORNEY KATAEVA:
22	Absolutely not true.
23	DIANE MADDEN: It seems like there is
24	no real planners, here.
25	DEPUTY TOWN ATTORNEY KATAEVA: Yes,
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1	there are. It can lead to their termination	
2	but like anything else with Labor Law, there	
3	is progressive discipline and the Town is	
4	very good at following progressive Page 56	
5	discipline.	
6	DIANE MADDEN: It all depends who you	
7	are.	
8	DEPUTY TOWN ATTORNEY KATAEVA: No.	
9	DIANE MADDEN: This is the person that	
10	you have determining who the Behavorist was?	
11	God help us.	
12	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Counsel, while	
13	you are up there, I want to make it clear for	
14	the record, that excludes employees that are	
15	directed by their Supervisor or a Member of	
16	the Town Board, for that matter, to do	
17	research or communication on FACEBOOK or some	
18	other social media outlet?	
19	DEPUTY TOWN ATTORNEY KATAEVA: That is	
20	directly in the policy.	
21	It excludes that and the parameters	
22	are posted and how it is being used on Town	
23	time.	
24	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: If it is used	
25	for Town purposes.	
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1	DIANE MADDEN: One more question,	
2	since this is obviously an issue in the Town,	
3	somehow, how about some kind of policy agency	
4	or volunteers for different departments, has	Page   57
5	that been something that the Town Board has	
6	considered because that is part of the	
7	problem.	
8	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: That is not	
9	covered by this policy.	
10	DIANE MADDEN: No, I understand.	
11	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: It is not germane	
12	to this moment right, now, that is not	
13	something we considered at this time.	
14	It is simply a policy to make sure	
15	that employees, when they are here are	
16	working for the taxpayers and it is just	
17	it is analogous to someone who is sitting at	
18	a desk with a deck of cards playing solitaire	
19	or with a phone because, now, you can do it	
20	on a phone or a laptop or an I-pad playing	
21	Solitaire or some other game.	
22	It is covered. It is designed to stop	
23	Town employees who are at work being	
24	employed, being paid by the taxpayers from	
25	doing something other than the work	
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1	for which they are paid, am I right?	
2	DEPUTY TOWN ATTORNEY KATAEVA: Yes.	
3	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: Thank you very	
4	much, Counselor.	Page   58
5	Okay, thank you.	
6	William McCabe.	
7	WILLIAM McCABE: William McCabe. Post	
8	Office Box 334, Rye Park, New York 11040	
9	Members of the Town Board, Supervisor	
10	Santino:	
11	This is in regards to the free air	
12	amendment that is coming up at a Hearing on	
13	February 21 <sup>st</sup> , has that	
14	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: With respect to,	
15	again?	
16	WILLIAM McCABE: That is Number 33 and	
17	Number 46.	
18	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: Hold one second,	
19	okay.	
20	The only thing, obviously, the other	
21	item is about scheduling of the Hearing.	
22	Unless you have an issue with that	
23	particular date, that is not germane at the	
24	moment.	
25	If you want to talk about the SEQRA	
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1	Negative Declaration, that is the only item	
2	on the calendar at this moment on that item.	
3	WILLIAM McCABE: Yes, Supervisor, I	
4	understand that, thank you.	Page   59
5	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: Sure.	
6	WILLIAM McCabe: What is the meaning	
7	and can any background be given to us on	
8	regard to 33, on that?	
9	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: Town Attorney.	
10	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: There are certain	
11	actions taken by the Town Board that require	
12	a SEQRA Resolution that says that the action	
13	considered will not have an adverse impact on	
14	the environment.	
15	Just to be one hundred percent sure,

6	that published?	
7	Can we FOIL?	
8	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: It is called a Type	
9	l Action, yes, you can FOIL it.	
10	WILLIAM McCABE: Okay, thank you and	
11	in regards to the Hearing, where has it been	
12	posted thus far, where the Hearing, you know,	
13	when the Hearing is going to be held and	
14	where?	
15	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: It is posted on	
16	today's calendar.	
17	WILLIAM McCABE: Has it been put into	
18	the business news, Long Island Business News?	
19	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: I do not believe it	
20	has been published, yet, because we are	
21	passing it, today.	
22	It probably will be published on	
23	Friday.	
24	WILLIAM McCABE: Will Trade	
25	organizations be contacted?	
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1	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: It is on our WEB	1
2	site and it will be in the Long Island	
3	Business News.	
4	WILLIAM McCABE: Will Trade	Page   61
5	organizations be contacted?	
6	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: We comply New	
7	York State Law, when we do our Notices and we	
8	will comply with State Law.	
9	WILLIAM McCABE: Trade organizations	
10	were contacted for the original law for March	
11	29 <sup>th</sup> .	
12	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: He has answered	
13	your question.	
14	WILLIAM McCABE: Just clarifying it.	
15	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: You can ask it as	
16	many times as you want, he answered it.	
17	WILLIAM McCABE: It didn't seem that	
18	way. Thank you.	
19	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: Thank you. Felix	
20	Procacci.	
21	FELIX PROCACCI: Felix Procacci. 1165	
22	Barns Street, Franklin Square, New York.	
23	I want to speak on Number 33 and 45,	
24	um, I oppose both of these Resolutions for	
25	the following reasons and, here, are the	
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1	reasons.	
2	I oppose them because they refer to	
3	the modifications the Town so called "free	
4	air law."	Page
5	This law is currently under Court	
6	injunction because the Town failed to follow	
7	the Open Meeting Law, among other things.	
8	Now, in an attempt to circumvent the	
9	injunction, the Town is changing the law.	
10	No changes to this law should be made	
11	until the Courts made its decision.	
12	Also, since there is pending	
13	litigation on this matter, the Town Attorney	
14	will invoke its policy of not commenting on	
15	pending litigation except in cases in which	
16	it concerns the Town Supervisor.	
17	So, if these Resolutions are passed,	
18	in two weeks, a Hearing will be held, in	
19	which, the Town Attorney will claim that no	
20	questions regarding this proposed law could	
21	be answered due to the fact that there is	
22	pending litigation.	
23	And, for the second time in less than	
24	a year, the Town will pass this	
25	unconstitutional law without any	
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1	justification.	
2	Even at the Hearing on March 29, 2016	
3	when this law was first considered, the Town	
4	refused to answer any detailed questions	Page   63
5	regarding the legality of this law.	
6	This law preempted New York State	
7	Business Law.	
8	The Town's current legal argument is	
9	because State Law cited on pricing and	
10	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: You are talking	
11	about merits of the proposal.	
12	FELIX PROCACCI: I am opposing the	
13	law. I am opposing the Resolutions even	
14	being here and I am giving you the reasons	
15	why I am opposing it.	
16	And, it is a miscellaneous law and it	
17	allows the Town to set a price for compressed	
18	air.	
19	These arguments are ridiculous.	
20	There are many laws in New York State.	
21	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: It sounds like	
22	you are arguing the merits.	
23	FELIX PROCACCI: No, I am not.	
24	I am giving you the reason why I	
25	oppose these Resolutions.	
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1	I have detailed it out.	
2	I am not going to	
3	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: You oppose the	
4	SEQRA Negative Declaration for what reason?	Page   64
5	FELIX PROCACCI: For the same reason	
6	it has to do with modifications of this law,	
7	I oppose anything that changes this law.	
8	And, I am giving you the reasons why I	
9	oppose this law.	
10	I wish you wouldn't interrupt me.	
11	Now, you are using up my time.	
12	FELIX PROCACCI: There are many laws	
13	in New York State that mandates a business	
14	who provides a product or service, New York	
15	State Inspections, compressed air, but in	
16	those situations, does the State mandate you	
17	provide that service for free?	
18	And, in no case does it mandate price	
19	through zoning law.	
20	Merely, after one year, the Town has	
21	failed to explain why this health and safety	
22	issue, which they claim is the reason they	
23	are passing this free air law, they failed to	
24	explain why it is a health and safety issue.	
25	It appears that the Town Attorneys	
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1	feel if they say the same stupid thing over
2	and over again, eventually it becomes true.
3	The Town Supervisor says it is a
4	health and safety issue, but refuses to $Page \mid 65$
5	explain why dropping three quarters in an air
6	machine can cause anyone any harm.
7	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: Okay, thank you
8	very much.
9	Councilwoman Goosby, you wanted to
10	address a particular issue?
11	SENIOR COUNCILWOMAN GOOSBYZ: Yes,
12	Supervisor.
13	We have Number 13 which I am
14	supporting proudly and I have had the
15	pleasure of interviewing the person who is on
16	there to be appointed to the Town's IDA
17	Board.
18	I had the pleasure of meeting her and
19	reviewing her qualifications.
20	She has an extensive education on Long
21	Island, a strong member of the Town's IDA
22	Board and will lookout for the interests of
23	our community's Public School Districts and
24	consider applications for IDA benefits that
25	may reduce the tax benefits for schools and
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1	other tax districts effected by the IDA grant
2	of payments in lieu of taxes.
3	It is very important to me and my
4	community, all of the Town's communities, $\operatorname{Page} 66$
5	especially since we have been through too
6	many problems which is affecting our schools.
7	So, I am happy with the appointment.
8	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: Thank you,
9	Councilwoman Goosby.
10	Councilman Blakeman, you had a
11	question about a matter?
12	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Yes, Item 24,
13	Mr. Supervisor, can someone answer questions
14	with respect to that?

22	of the contract is to recycle mattresses and
23	save the Town some money in the process.
24	Our mattresses are currently picked up
25	in the price of around mid seventies dollars
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1	per ton and this contract, we negotiated with	
2	them to get the price down to forty.	
3	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: How many	
4	mattresses do we collect in the Town on	Page   67
5	annual basis?	
6	COMMISSIONER PRITCHARD: Thirty or	
7	fifty a day which translates to three to five	
8	hundred tons.	
9	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: So, with respect	
10	to this particular contract, what happens to	
11	the mattresses?	
12	Is there a storage area in the	
13	recycling facility that this company has?	
14	COMMISSIONER PRITCHARD: Yes, they	
15	have a facility in Oceanside where they	
16	actually pull the mattresses apart and they	
17	sell the by-products; fiber, steel from the	
18	springs and the foam.	
19	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: How long have	
20	they been in business?	
21	SUPERINTENDENT CONROY: They have been	
22	in business two years, now, that I am aware	
23	of.	
24	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: And, who weighs	
25	the mattresses to determine whether or not	
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	HEMPSTEAD TOWN BOARD 2///1/	
1	the price we are paying is accurate?	
2	SUPERINTENDENT CONROY: We will weigh	
3	them on the way out.	
4	They will weight them when they get	Page   68
5	there but we weigh them on our way out.	
6	All trucks are weighed on the way out.	
7	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: So, the	
8	Sanitation Department is going to deliver the	
9	mattresses to a facility in Oceanside, they	
10	already had been weighed?	
11	COMMISSIONER PRITCHARD: Yes.	
12	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Where are they	
13	weighed?	
14	SUPERINTENDENT CONROY: In Merrick.	
15	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: So, they will be	
16	consolidated in Merrick and delivered to	
17	Oceanside to be weighed rather and the work	
18	is actually performed where?	
19	In Oceanside or is it contracted out	
20	by the group we are doing business with?	
21	SUPERINTENDENT CONROY: I don't know	
22	if they contracted anything out.	
23	When I was there, they were performing	
24	the work there.	
25	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Do they have a	
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1	License to do this?	
2	SUPERINTENDENT CONROY: Yes.	
3	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Have we seen the	
4	license?	Page   69
5	SUPERINTENDENT CONROY: What?	
6	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Have we seen the	
7	license?	
8	SUPERINTENDENT CONROY: I have not	
9	seen it, personally.	
10	They need a license from the DEC to	
11	have.	
12	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Are they bonded?	
13	SUPERINTENDENT CONROY: Yes.

2	contract, we are obligated to pay for	
3	mattresses that are collected from outside	
4	the Town, why is that?	Page   70
5	SUPERINTENDENT CONROY: Outside the	
6	Town as far as what mileages?	
7	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: According to	
8	the contract, it says, I believe, we are	
9	obligated to pay them for mattresses	
10	collected within the Town or within fifteen	
11	miles of the Town boundary, why is that?	
12	SUPERINTENDENT CONROY: I would	
13	imagine there are Villages that drop	
14	mattresses at our owner area.	
15	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: No, this refers	
16	to	
17	SUPERINTENDENT CONROY: We have	
18	separate deals with different Villages.	
19	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Okay, do we have	
20	deals with Villages outside the Town of

24	Town of Hempstead or fifteen miles of the	
25	Town boundary will be accepted.	
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1	COMMISSIONER PRITCHARD: That won't

4	contract says.	Page   71
5	You want to take a look at it?	
6	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: This is for	
7	mattresses that we collect on our routes,	
8	correct or that is delivered to us by a	
9	Village within the Town of Hempstead with	
10	which we have an appropriate agreement?	
11	COMMISSIONER PRITCHARD: Town of	
12	Hempstead Mr. Levy has an answer on	
13	that.	
14	MR. LEVY: Supervisor, the contract	
15	was bid two ways, we asked those bidding to	
16	provide prices in two circumstances, one in	
17	which they come to our facility and collect	
18	the mattresses, the other, where we deliver	
19	the mattresses to their facility.	
20	Their facility must be either within	
21	the Town of Hempstead or within the fifteen	
22	miles of a Hempstead Town boundary.
