4	I support this legislation because I $^{ m Page} 19$
5	live in Lido Beach, which is a Residence B
6	zone in the Town of Hempstead, defined as
7	single-family homes.
8	We have any number of homes in our
9	area that are advertising online, "rent my
10	ground floor apartment," "rent my studio
11	apartment," "three hundred dollars a night."
12	This is not a commercial area.
13	If I wanted to live in a seaside
14	community that was commercial, I would have
15	moved to the Town of Hempstead a number of
16	years ago.
17	This creates all kinds of problems for
18	us with people parking illegally, using our
19	beach when they have no idea what the
20	neighborhood is about.
21	It is a safety issue.
22	It is a health issue.
23	And, I am completely opposed to these
24	one-night rentals.
25	It just doesn't work.

1	I have no problem with people who rent	
2	their home for a month, that makes a lot of	
3	sense or rent their homes for two months,	
4	that makes a lot of sense, but a single-	Page 20
5	family home, renting a room and we do have	
6	places that are advertising "dinner	
7	available," which means they are, now, have a	
8	restaurant, that is completely against the	
9	law.

9	contributed to the systematic decline and	
10	quality of life for Uniondale residents.	
11	From Hofstra houses to illegal	
12	basement apartments to illegal garage	
13	conversion rentals to upwards of fifteen plus	
14	people residing in a single-family home,	
15	Uniondale certainly has its share of illegal	
16	long-term rental issues.	
17	Illegal long-term rental issues in	
18	Uniondale places added stress and burdens on	
19	an already compromised community.	
20	Some examples of how illegal long-term	
21	rentals increases put stress on the Uniondale	
22	community are sanitation collection,	
23	enforcement.	
24	Sanitation workers typically collect	
25	one to two cans of garbage biweekly from a	

one to two cans of garbage biweekly from ${\tt a}$

1	single-family home.	
2	And, single-family homes that fall	
3	under the criteria of long-term rentals,	
4	sanitation workers collects, approximately,	Page 24
5	three times that amount than that of a	
6	typical single-family dwelling.	
7	This fact, alone, is glaring.	
8	Another problematic issue that is	
9	attributed as a result of illegal long-term	
10	rentals is overcrowding on residential	
11	streets.	
12	Homeowners who pay property taxes many	
13	times cannot park in front of and at times	
14	near to their own homes.	
15	The parking solution for some long-	
16	term rentees is to park on the lawn just	
17	painting the picture of a ghetto-type	
18	community.	
19	One of my civic members who lives in a	
20	cul-de-sac says that due to illegal rentals,	
21	her cul-de-sac resembled a parking lot where	
22	cars are frequently parked in rows.	
23	This scenario possess a serious	
24	quality of life issue for Uniondale residents	
25	where emergency service vehicles cannot	

1	Access their homes due to cars that are	
2	illegally parked as a result of illegal long-	
3	term rentals.	
4	Both short and long-term rentals	Page 25
5	create a compromised quality of life for	
6	residents that reside in the Town of	
7	Hempstead.	
8	As a Uniondale Resident, I would hope	
9	that our community's issue of illegal long-	
10	term rentals would be given similar	
11	attention, focus, action that Lido Beach is	
12	receiving.	
13	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: Thank you very	
14	much.	
15	Amy Posner?	
16	AMY POSNER: Good Morning. My name is	
17	Amy Posner.	
18	I live at 2 Royat Street in Lido	
19	Beach.	
20	I want to thank Councilwoman Erin	
21	King-Sweeney for sending notification of this	
22	meeting to her constituents.	
23	Um, we bought our house in 2005 in	
24	preparation for what we were hoping would be	
25	a safe and stable retirement.	

1	Um, now, I have houses closest to me	
2	on Royat Street that are not primary	
3	residents.	
4	The one next door is a rental house	Page 26
5	including short-term rentals including a	
6	fellow who is living in a van in the	
7	driveway, substantially all of last Summer	
8	and similarly this Summer.	
9	He comes and goes and there is loud	
10	music.	
11	If we wanted to live in the middle of	
12	a beach party, we could have saved	
13	substantial property taxes and moved to the	
14	west end of Long Beach but we didn't.	
15	We moved to the dunes area of Lido	
16	and I hope that the Town will take seriously	
17	this issue, um, of folks that are buying up	
18	these houses, sometimes in short sales and	
19	advertising short-term rentals online.	
20	They are easily findable as my	
21	neighbor noted and do something to assure the	
22	quality of life in our communities.	
23	They are precious resources and, um,	
24	not only are the quality of life, aggravation	

just that we will drive long-term permanent

1	Residents out of the jurisdiction, but they	
2	also seriously affect the beauty, safety and	
3	long-term use and quality of our beaches and	
4	our precious beaches on Long Island.	Page 27
5	Thank you very much for your time.	
6	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: Thank you very	
7	much.	
8	Howard Sipzner?	
9	Good Morning.	
10	HOWARD SIPZNER: Good Morning.	
11	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: Name and address	
12	for the record, please.	
13	HOWARD SIPZNER: Howard Sipzner. 70	
14	Garret Street, Lido Beach, New York.	
15	I would like to also thank	
16	Councilwoman Erin King-Sweeney for the	
17	attention she has made to this issue.	
18	She has come down to our civic	
19	association meetings and has been very	
20	constructive on the topic.	
21	As many of my other fellow residents	
22	throughout the County have stated, the	
23	allowance of short-term rentals is	
24	detrimental to local communities.	
25	It violates the premise of long-term	

1	Owners stable tax base, improvements to the	
2	community, civic association and the like.	
3	And, the commercial operators who are	
4	allowed to run these type of businesses often	Page 28
5	illegally and in violation of local laws and	
6	in violation of tax laws, many of these	
7	transactions take place in a non-documented	
8	manner, involve cash transactions and become	
9	Federal issues, as well.	
10	It is very important that the Town	
11	take the necessary steps to control, possibly	
12	prevent these short-term rentals because,	
13	ultimately, they lead to the detrimental	
14	impact on the tax based of our communities	
15	which this Board, which this group is	
16	primarily pledged with holding and	
17	maintaining those tax bases.	
18	So, I applaud the group for taking a	
19	position.	
20	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: Thank you, sir.	
21	Elizabeth Murdy?	
22	Good Morning.	
23	ELIZABETH MURDY: Good Morning. I am	
24	Elizabeth Murdy. I live at 15 South Temple	
25	Street Lido Reach	

1	I am a life-long resident of Lido	
2	Beach.	
3	I have been on the Board of Lido Civic	
4	Association for twenty years and I have been	Page 29
5	the President of the Civic Association for	
6	the past six.	
7	This idea of rentals, we are not	
8	opposed to renting in our Lido Beach	
9	community.	
10	For Over fifty years, I have watched	
11	residents leave in the Summer to go away to	
12	their Bungalow cottages, their Summer camps	
13	or travel for the Summer.	
14	As a child, I had Summer friends that	
15	came in and friends that returned on Labor	
16	Day.	
17	We are not opposed to renting in our	
18	community.	
19	What we are opposed to is these short-	
20	term rentals.	
21	I first became aware of this in June	
22	of 2012.	
23	I received a call from a homeowner	
24	telling me that just yesterday the house next	
25	door to her had been renting for a day and	

1	there was a bachelor party.	
2	She told me stories I could not	
3	believe.	
4	Well, we all heard of bachelor	Page 30
5	parties.	
6	Think of one going on next door to	
7	your home when you are raising your children.	
8	Think ab out pulling your children	
9	inside from their backyard because of the	
10	antics going on in the backyard next to you.	
11	Our homes are not that far apart from	
12	each other.	
13	I was horrified from that day in June	
14	of 2012.	
15	The stories have been increasing.	
16	It has been one day, two days, five	
17	says at a time.	
18	Plus, last year, I was away on	
19	vacation and I received a text from a	
20	homeowner, "help, there is a brothel on my	
21	street."	
22	Now, whether it was really a brothel	
23	or not, this homeowner was seeing coming out	
24	of her house across the street in the middle	
25	of the night and it was concerning.	

1	We are raising our children in this	
2	neighborhood.	
3	We are watching our grandchildren in	
4	this neighborhood.	Page 31
5	It is strictly a residential	
6	neighborhood.	
7	And, again, it is impacting the	
8	safety.	
9	As I said earlier, our homes are not	
10	that far apart from these residents who are	
11	absentee landlords taking proper care to make	
12	sure there are active smoke alarms in these	
13	homes and carbon monoxide detectors and	
14	things.	
15	These are all things that are	
16	regulated in the rental units and they are	
17	supposed to be.	
18	Our quiet residential neighborhood is	
19	becoming an area where we have motels, pretty	
20	much and that is just very concerning and in

3	Unfortunately a number of residents have	
4	taken to short-term rentals, not only for a	Page 33

9	have little or no consideration for those	
10	adjoining or nearby residences in the

6	I know that sounds la-di-da.	
7	I live in a fourteen hundred, um, um,	
8	square foot home.	
9	Got creamed in Sandy. Still	
10	rebuilding.	
11	So, I speak from the heart.	
12	I don't have facts and figures. All I	
13	know is that we had a rental across the	
14	street, um, came out of my car one day and	
15	the young boy with the lights out was about	
16	to sorry, was with a bunch of his	
17	knucklehead friends and shooting bb's at me	
18	in the dark.	
19	We had to call the police.	
20	Um, it was bad. They were awful.	
21	This was a house that somebody bought that	
22	lived in the City and was renting it out.	
23	Um, they terrified the neighborhood by	
24	stealing things and whatever.	
25	But, um, but the beach is my safe	

1	Grace, my asset, um, my life, the community.	
2	My husband has lived in, um, Lido with	
3	his family for sixty years.	
4	I was fortunate enough to live there	Page 36
5	the last twenty-seven years.	
6	I clean the beach every day on a daily	
7	basis.	
8	And, um, I applaud you in helping us	
9	pass this.	
10	It is, um, it is very meaningful to	
11	all of us in the Dunes.	
12	Thank you.	
13	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: Very welcomed.	
14	Thank you for your comments.	
15	Florence Hausman, come on up.	
16	FLORENCE HAUSMAN: Since I am the	
17	oldest one here, you will hear me and I am	
18	allowed to say whatever I think except the	
19	word that starts with an "F".	
20	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: Good Morning.	
21	Name and address.	
22	FLORENCE HAUSMAN: I am Florence	
23	Hausman and I live in Lido Beach for sixty-	
24	six years.	
25	My husband was a Veteran of War.	

1	We lived at the Veterans Housing in	
2	Lido Beach and, um, we saved my money.	
3	My husband was a schoolteacher and we	
4	saw this little house in Lido Beach and we	Page 37
5	bought the house but we couldn't afford to	
6	stay there at the beginning.	
7	So, we rented the house for six years	
8	and I lived in back of a liquor store with my	
9	two children.	
10	So, I know what it is to have a home	
11	and to be safe and to have neighbors that	
12	take care of you.	
13	So, what I see, now, is that it is	
14	becoming a commercial commodity and we are	
15	not commercial.	
16	We are a little safe area.

5	two, they don't rent one person, it is three,	
6	four, six or whatever, they come in and you	
7	don't know who is in your neighborhood.	
8	And, I don't feel safe. I am ninety-	
9	two years old going on ninety-three.

4	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: Good Morning.	Page 40
5	JANE STEIN: I am here to reiterate	
6	everything that has already been said.	
7	Just a few points, we are, as	
8	mentioned, a small neighborhood.	
9	It is the quality of the neighborhood.	
10	We know everybody in the neighborhood	
11	except, now, we don't.	
12	We know different people each week.	
13	It is not a commercial district and	
14	just because the technology allows this to be	
15	broadcast doesn't mean that it is in the best

23	County.	
24	I am talking, today, as a resident,	
25	not as the Storm Recovery Liaison for	

1	Nassau County.	
2	As many of you know, I have been	
3	involved, Day 1, since Day 1 with hurricane	
4	recovery helping over twenty-two thousand	Page 42
5	families on Long Island affected by Hurricane	
6	Sandy.	
7	Four thousand of which I have logged	
8	in, helping within my own assistance group.	
9	Um, the reason I am, here, today is	
10	because one of my jobs, also, is that I	
11	assist with the homeless of Nassau County.	
12	And, as of last week, we had over	
13	twelve hundred homeless people, here in	
14	Nassau County.	
15	Many of which I try to help, finding	
16	additional housing and what I find, there is	
17	no more housing on Long Island that is	
18	affordable.	
19	I had a young lady yesterday with a	
20	six month old baby and Nassau County gave	
21	this young lady a three hundred dollar budget	
22	for her to go find a place for her and her	
23	baby to live and that is real.	
24	Social Services is required by New	
25	York State and limited by HUD as far as how	

1	much they can spend and that budget is	
2	ridiculously below any affordability here on	
3	Long Island.	
4	We are struggling, here.	Page 43
5	When I moved to Long Island, I was a	
6	single individual.	
7	I bought a home and it got washed into	
8	the water, so to speak.	
9	But, I am very much aware of the	
10	challenges here in real estate on Long	
11	Island, right, now.	
12	We don't want to go high.	
13	We don't want to spread. We don't	
14	want to give up vacant land and we still want	
15	to keep our grandparents, here.	
16	We want to let our children grow up	
17	here and stay here once they graduate	
18	college.	
19	And, inventory right, now, on Long	
20	Island is one percent rentability right, now.	
21	Foreclosures are high.	
22	Lis pendens, which means people that	
23	have missed their payments is increasing and	
24	the stress is high, now, not only because of	
25	taxes but because of the economy and	

challenges that we all face out, here.

I am strongly against, tremendously against the concept of Airbnb, Craig's List and the lady and gentleman mentioned it, there is another organization out there, couch surfing and there are WEB sites designed specifically to bring in people, short-term business.

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There is some background checks that are recommended by the sites, but it is overwhelmingly below the community's, by traffic, whether it be by intoxication and need to do other things that young people think is socially acceptable in a beach environment is unacceptable.

I applaud this entire Board for this type of legislation to protect the residents regarding, um, the visiting type of population and those people that are looking for a cheap way in to what is otherwise and expensive Long Island.

The reason I am here, today is to mention one other challenge that is out there, it is short-term and I want to keep it on the radar, we have over four thousand

9	asbestos or other toxins removed from their	
10	home.	
11	All I am asking if this Board, I

5	and also my fiancé, ADA, Susan Bennet,	
6	Esquire.	
7	She couldn't be here, today, but she	
8	is here with me.	
9	So, the first thing I want to address	
10	is I notice a lot of people are, here, are

17	We further suggest that the TOT be	
18	used toward providing affordable housing	
19	options within the Town.	
20	(Whereupon, the five-minute bell rang.	
21	After, the following ensued.)	
22	SENIOR COUNCILWOMAN GOOSBY: Sir, your	
23	time is up.	
24	Please rap up.	
25	SHAUN SKEETE: Yes. So, in closing,	

1	I would like to say that the guests that we	
2	have, they have become an asset to the	
3	community because they spend locally.	
4	They are not going into the City as ${ m Pr}$	age 52
5	much.	
6	They are helping the Town.	
7	They are increasing the economic base,	
8	here, by going to local restaurants, by	
9	patronizing the Roosevelt Field Mall, the	
10	Coliseum for the concerts, so, everything	
11	benefits.	
12	SENIOR COUNCILWOMAN GOOSBY: Thank	
13	you, sir.	
14	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Senior	
15	Councilwoman, can I ask a question?	
16	SENIOR COUNCILWOMAN GOOSBY: Yes.	
17	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Thank you,	
18	sir.	
19	I just want to know, I don't have	
20	Airbnb, if I were to register on Airbnb	
21	SHAUN SKEETE: Correct.	
22	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: I	
23	register right, now, how quickly could I get	
24	into a home?	
25	SHAUN SKEETE: Well, as a first-time	

1	Person to Airbnb, you first have to verify	
2	yourself with the company.	
3	Once you fully go through that	
4	process, then, us, as hosts, we also have	Page 53
5	rules that we abide by.	
6	You first have to be approved by our	
7	rules and once we verify that, you have read	
8	and understood those rules, we will take it	
9	from there.	
10	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Those rules	
11	are your rules?	
12	SHAUN SKEETE: Those are rules that	
13	are both from BNB and we have rules that I	
14	have in place.	
15	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: So, you as	
16	parent would have stricter rules that just	
17	rented their homes?	
18	SHAUN SKEETE: Correct, but the rules	
19	that come with Airbnb are also fairly	
20	stringent.	
21	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: So, someone	
22	gets cleared by Airbnb and they contact you	
23	via their AP or WEB site to rent a room from	
24	your home?	
25	SHAUN SKEETE: Correct.	

1	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: They have been	
2	cleared by Airbnb and they contact you, what	
3	is your next step?	
4	SHAUN SKEETE: My next step would be	Page 54
5	to correspond with them to make sure they	
6	read and understood the house rules.	
7	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Okay.	
8	SHAUN SKEETE: That is the first	
9	thing.	
10	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: And the	
11	second?	
12	SHAUN SKEETE: The second thing is to	
13	verify the days that they are coming, the	
14	time, to make sure that everybody is within,	
15	you know, legal limits that they must do.	
16	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Third step?	
17	SHAUN SKEETE: Third step would be to	
18	have them reserve the reservation and,	
19	basically, wait until that day arrives.	
20	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: So, at which	
21	point, I guess I missed a step, at which	
22	point are you conducting a background check	
23	and checking for the fact that they are not	
24	a sex offender or not?	
25	SHAUN SKEETE: I am doing that during	

1	the correspondence, the correspondence.	
2	Well, Airbnb is doing the sex offender	
3	registry.	
4	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Okay.	Page 55
5	SHAUN SKEETE: When they are doing	
6	their background checks, once you get past	
7	that point, even though you have been cleared	
8	by Airbnb that doesn't mean the host has to	
9	take you.	
10	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Does Airbnb	
11	conduct those background checks on a daily	
12	basis?	
13	SHAUN SKEETE: They conduct that check	
14	every time somebody registers with the	
15	service.	
16	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: I register	
17	with the service, today, two years from now I	
18	contact you on Airbnb to get a room, in those	
19	two year I have been convicted of rape.	
20	SHAUN SKEETE: At that point, you	
21	would have been filed, you come on record.	
22	Airbnb does annual checks.	
23	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Annual checks,	
24	that is once a year.	
25	SHAUN SKEETE: I don't work for	

1	Airbnb.	
2	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Neither do I,	
3	that is why I am asking.	
4	SHAUN SKEETE: I don't know if they do	Page 56
5	it more than annually.	
6	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Do you see	
7	where we find some loopholes in the	
8	situation?	
9	SHAUN SKEETE: Well, sir, I would also	
10	offer to you that those same loopholes can	
11	happen in hotels that are in this very area	
12	and those don't conduct background checks.	
13	And, also in terms of landlords who	
14	are in the area, there was a woman that came	
15	here before, she said she rented her house	
16	out for several years.	
17	We live in our home.	
18	I am not sure if that person was	
19	conducting the same background checks that	
20	this company is	
21	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: I applaud you	
22	for taking the consideration into each person	
23	that you rent into your home.	
24	I think the concern of many of us on	
25	this Board is not everyone is as stringent	

1	with their checks as you are and that leaves	
2	the people that we represent.	
3	SHAUN SKEETE: I would go back to say	
4	in the Town of over eight hundred thousand	Page 57
5	residents, you only have a dozen complaints	
6	and they are usually noise complaints.	
7	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Okay, I am	
8	just pointing this out.	
9	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: Thank you very	
10	much.	
11	SHAUN SKEETE: Have a great day.	
12	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: You too.	
13	Joe Smith.	
14	Forgive me for the damage of your	
15	name, I couldn't read it.	
16	Name and address for the record.	
17	JOE SMITH: Joe Smith, Garfield Street	
18	in Freeport.	
19	So, I just want to say, just,	
20	basically, Nassau County is well known to	
21	have some of the highest taxes in the	
22	Country.	
23	Our real estate taxes are exorbitant	
24	already and this imposition of rental fee is	
25	just equating to another tax.	

1	This is what we are facing, real	
2	estate taxes, we have to scrape together,	
3	every penny to get these monies together to	
4	pay the taxes.	Page 58
5	I live alone.	
6	I have to put it all together by	
7	myself.	
8	A lot of people have a wife or a	
9	husband and they can pool their resources	
10	together to afford the taxes, here, on Long	
11	Island.	
12	Living alone, it is just me by myself.	
13	So, I have an extra bedroom in my	
14	house.	
15	Why shouldn't I be able to put this	
16	extra space to use?	
17	It is helping me to pay the taxes.	
18	It is helping me to maintain the	
19	property.	
20	It is not hurting the neighborhood.	
21	So, a lot of the people with Airbnb	
22	are foreign travelers, I get people from	
23	Europe.	
24	I get people from out-of-State. I get	
25	business travelers and it is not a regular	

1	everyday basis that I have an extra bedroom	
2	rented out.	
3	It is just maybe once a week, maybe	
4	once or two weeks I get one or two people	Page 59
5	coming in.	
6	They are generally very quiet,	
7	respectful and I don't see it as a detriment	
8	to the neighborhood because these people	
9	just, they do what they do during the day.	
10	They come home. They need a place to	
11	sleep at night and they are usually gone by	
12	6:00 or 7:00 o'clock in the morning because	
13	they have to get where they are going.	
14	What I am saying is these people are	
15	actually adding to the local economy, also by	
16	visiting these local restaurants, delis and	
17	also going to the local attractions.	
18	One or two people per night through	
19	Airbnb visiting our area are adding an	
20	economy boost.	
21	And, Mr. Skeete was saying earlier,	
22	they are verified prior to actually being	
23	booked.

3	rules.	
4	You set up your own house rules as he	Page 60
5	spoke of and these people have to abide by	
6	them.	
7	As I said before, it is not hurting	
8	the local neighborhood by having one or two	
9	people come and stay and be on their way in	
10	the morning.	
11	It is a help.	
12	Thank you.	
13	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: Thank you, sir.	
14	Mohammed Atif?	
15	Name and address for the record.	
16	MOHAMMED ATIF: Mohammed Atif. 63	
17	Meadow Street, Garden City, New York 11530.	
18	I am completely against passing	
19	legislation for short-term renting.	
20	I have been living in the Town of	
21	Hempstead for, approximately, eleven years.	
22	I first used Airbnb three years ago in	
23	South America and I found it to be a fabulous	
24	service for young travelers like myself to	
25	get an opportunity to live with the local	

1	Community, with local hosts and be able to	
2	experience things locally rather than staying	
3	a hotel.	
4	I became a host about a year ago and I	Page 61
5	have nothing but amazing experiences to	
6	share.	
7	Every time that I bring or I welcome	
8	someone to my residence, it is me and my wife	
9	and we have plenty of rooms in our house.	
10	We rent one room. I have people	
11	coming for weddings.	
12	I have people coming for work.	
13	I have students that come for short	
14	courses, so, also a spectrum of people that	
15	come and stay with us and never, ever has	
16	there been a situation or a time where there	
17	has been an issue with the individuals that	
18	have lived with us ever.	
19	Just recently as a Sunday, one of my	
20	guests, myself and my neighbor went for a	
21	twelve-mile bike ride.	
22	So, not only, you know, they are	
23	staying with us, but we are communicating	
24	with my neighbors and it has been a really,	
25	really tremendous experience	

1	I understand there has been some	
2	concerns within the Town of Hempstead on the	
3	South Shore and these concerns, um, are	
4	valid.	Page 62
5	People want peaceful, residential	
6	neighborhoods.	
7	They don't want noise.	
8	And, I totally understand that.	
9	But, there is that other side to the	
10	benefit of having short-term rentals.	
11	One of the biggest things that you	
12	have to consider is economic benefits for the	
13	local community.	
14	Forty-two percent of Airbnb guests use	
15	the local community as a way of life, go to	
16	restaurants, go to shops, so, this is	
17	actually bringing in, you know, businesses

11	advantages that are also there for	
12	communities and for economics.	
13	So, if the Town of Hempstead could	
14	come to an agreement where we can all agree	
15	on the benefits along with some of the	
16	concerns to make this Town a better place.

20	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: Thank you very	
21	much, sir.	
22	A. Elaine Williams?	
23	ELAINE WILLIAMS: My name is Elaine	
24	Williams.	
25	We moved out here in Hempstead in	

1	1989.	
2	Um, we bought a home. We were both	
3	working.	
4	In 2014, both my husband and I	64
5	retired.	
6	After we retired, we found it very	
7	difficult, um, to pay the taxes, to keep up	
8	with everything.	
9	We thought we would have enough. It	
10	is amazing how you retire, you go through	
11	funds very quickly.	
12	You think you have money saved and the	
13	next thing you know it is all gone.	
14	Um, we have been known in the	
15	community to be very helpful to many people.	
16	Many people have come through our	
17	homes.	
18	Um, we have friends that come all the	
19	time that spend a week or two weeks with us,	
20	um and they always comment on how comfortable	
21	they feel in our home.	
22	Um, a year ago, there was a family	
23	living in Brooklyn that, um, had to move out	
24	East.	
25	They couldn't find a place to live and	

1	my husband happened to find a room for the	
2	young lady.	
3	So, someone mentioned earlier,	
4	"affordable housing" and how difficult it is	Page 65
5	to find "affordable housing".	
6	This lady came out here with two	
7	children, six and two at the time.	
8	Right, now, they are seven and three.	
9	And, they, um, are in a sad situation.	
10	They have not been able to find	
11	affordable housing.	
12	She is still in that one room, that	
13	one room is cramped with three. It is a very	
14	small room.	
15	Um, the son is having a lot of	
16	problems adjusting to, um, I guess, you know,	
17	being uprooted, very rebellious child and the	
18	school that he was going to threw up their	
19	hands and said, we can't do anything with	
20	this child, you know, the social worker, the	
21	guidance counselor, the teacher were all	
22	saying, "what are we going to do with	
23	everything."	
24	So, we thought, maybe it was because	
25	the Mother did find a new job.	

1	She is a Home Health Aide and she works	
2	3:00 to 11:00.	
3	She, um so, she doesn't make much	
4	money, ten dollars and fifty cents an hour.	Page 66
5	So, we, um, have the children and her	
6	in our home five nights a week.	
7	The children rest and we will not	
8	disturb them and they can go get up in the	
9	morning.	
10	They can have breakfast and the kids	
11	can get off to school.	
12	We have been working with this family	
13	over a year.	
14	And, we have seen changes taking	
15	place.	
16	It is only because they cannot afford	
17	housing that they are still with us.	
18	They still have that one room to rent.	
19	It is not conducive for them to be	
20	there while she is at work, away at work.	
21	So, they are at my house, so, my	
22	house, as I said, giving just a brief	
23	information about that.	
24	I am just trying to show you my house	
25	affords them comfort, rest, rescue.	

1	We have always been helpful-type	
2	people.	
3	Um, people that try to help others.	
4	This legislation would block some of the	Page 67
5	service that we render to other people.	
6	There are students that come in.	
7	We are hosts, as well.	
8	And, there are times when students	
9	will come in, into Hofstra just going for an	
10	interview to get into School of Medicine or	
11	like right, now, I have a student in my home.	
12	He is there for two weeks because he	
13	is taking a Summer course.	
14	Um, we don't have long-term rentals	
15	but we do have short-term rentals.	
16	People do come in and they do	
17	patronize the community.	
18	They do go to the restaurants, here.	
19	They do go to whatever.	
20	I think this legislation would really	
21	block a lot of people.	
22	I understand the problem, they are	
23	having in Lido Beach.	
24	And, I think that this legislation	
25	should not be generalized for the whole Town

2	Where it is needed, it should be in	
3	place.	
4	$ ext{Pa}$ But, I think that for areas where you	ge 68
5	have not had any complaints or very minimal	
6	complaints, this legislation should not be

8	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: Thank you very	
9	much.	
10	(Whereupon, applause from the audience	
11	was heard. After, the following ensued.)	
12	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: Miriam Tauber?	
13	Can you come on up. Good Morning.	
14	MIRIAM TAUBER: Good Morning.	
15	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: Name and address	
16	for the record, please.	
17	MIRIAM TAUBER: Miriam Tauber. 80	
18	Saratoga Street, Lido Beach.	
19	Um, I do recognize there is definite	
20	vacation communities, more, um, residential	
21	communities, as has been pointed out.	
22	I do want to respond to the background	
23	check point that has been raised.	
24	There was an article in the NEW YORK	
25	TIMES last year about somebody who rented out

8	I think this happened less than a year

7	RANDY KAPLAN: I am representing Long	
8	Island Board of Realtors, Director of	
9	Affairs, Randy Kaplan.	
10	I live at 2672 Lincoln Boulevard in

12	Before I start, I just want to thank

14	NORMAN ELLIS: Norman Ellis. 45	
15	Satellite Lane, Levittown.	
16	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: Good Morning.	
17	NORMAN ELLIS: Um, just a quick	
18	comment about the last speaker, what valuable	
19	points, how difficult it is to deal with	
20	people doing parties and so forth but	
21	regulating rentals, short-term versus long	
22	term, I see could have no effect on any of	
23	that whatsoever.	
24	It is a beach town.	
25	People are going to be there for the	

1	Summer.	
2	They are going to have parties at the	
3	Park.	
4	They are going to have trash.	Page 79
5	I just don't think those concerns	
6	relate to the issue at hand at all.	
7	One thing I would like to talk about	
8	is, um, WEB sites are not the issue, here.	
9	The real issue is rentals.	
10	You are going to allow someone to rent	
11	for less than thirty days, twenty-eight days	
12	or more.	
13	That is, as far as I can see, what	
14	this legislation is focused on, what the	
15	discussion is focused on.	
16	And, everyone starts calling short-	
17	term rentals, "hotels."	
18	The definition of "hotel" in the law	
19	has nothing to do with the length of stay.	
20	You know you can go to an extended	
21	stay hotel.	
22	We have one in Bethpage.	
23	You can stay sixty days, ninety days a	
24	year.	
25	A hotel is not defined in law by the	

1	length of stay.	
2	It is by the level of service and you	
3	get bed turndown, concierge, twenty-four	
4	check-in, a house phone, room service, that	Page 80
5	is the list of things, if you have a few of	
6	those in your hotel, bed or breakfast.	
7	Renting out rooms in their homes has	
8	been going on decades and decades.	
9	This legislation will simply hurt	
10	people who really need some extra money.	
11	In my house, I am paying over ten	
12	thousand dollars a year in taxes.	
13	It makes no sense for me not to be	
14	able to rent out one or two rooms in the	
15	house, to get some extra income.	
16	I am a senior citizen. My kids are	
17	gone.	
18	It is very difficult.	
19	This legislation really does nothing	
20	to protect safety, either.	
21	All of the safety concerns that have	
22	been addressed are already addressed in law.	
23	I heard the Supervisor speak on camera	
24	about it, actually, I think it was	
25	Councilwoman Goosby speaking on camera about	

1	needing smoke detectors in every room and the	
2	safety.	
3	This is already covered by law.	
4	We already have law that covered that.	Page 81
5	I did a little bit of work in my	
6	house.	
7	I got a permit.	
8	I made sure that there was a smoke	
9	detector in every room, a CO detector. There	
10	is no additional safety that is needed for a	
11	short-term renter versus a permanent resident	
12	or long-term renter.	
13	Why should there be a higher standard	
14	of safety that is going to rent for fifteen	
15	days versus three months or live there their	
16	whole life?	
17	If you want to protect the safety of	
18	the citizens, look at the people who are	
19	losing touch a little bit.	
20	I am one of them.	
21	I am old, you know, you forget more.	
22	You don't keep your things in good	
23	shape as you did when you were younger.	
24	You don't replace the batteries in the	
25	ampleon dotoaton that garrag livrag	

1	Frankly, people like myself, who are	
2	just a senior citizen not renting to anybody	
3	are the ones that need supervision and safety	
4	checks and inspections or at least help with	Page 82
5	safety.	
6	Someone who is renting out a house or	
7	part of a house and is advertising it is in a	
8	market.	
9	I know, I am a licensed real estate	
10	broker, so, I know about these things.	
11	You have to attract people.	
12	They advertise. They take nice	
13	pictures.	
14	They fix it up.	
15	They are concerned with safety.	
16	A woman spoke about Airbnb, you can't	
17	get in touch with them.	
18	She is slightly wrong, completely	
19	contrary to the fact. They rate you on	
20	safety.	
21	They have boxes for you to check off.	
22	You have safety cards. You should	
23	have a fire extinguisher.	
24	All these WEB sites do that.	
25	A person sitting home alone, doesn't	

1	do that.	
2	This legislation is completely	
3	misguided.	
4	It is going to hurt the people that	Page 83
5	need money the most.	
6	It is asking for things that make no	
7	sense compared to the concerns that are being	
8	expressed.	
9	Um, and, then, finally, what does it	
10	have to do with money.	
11	If you are really concern about the	
12	safety of the citizens, it has nothing to do	
13	with money.	
14	Have you looked into couch surfing?	
15	There are hundreds and hundreds of	
16	people that couch surf.	
17	These are WEB sites just like the ones	
18	that people are complaining about and people	
19	come and stay in other people's houses for a	
20	night or a week or five days or two months	
21	free.	
22	It is a big, big industry but it is a	
23	free industry.	
24	People do it all the time.	
25	Why are we not regulating couch	

1	surfing?	
2	Why does it only have to do with	
3	people renting for money?	
4	None of the issues at all have	e 84
5	anything to do with whether it is for money	
6	or not for money.	
7	I am completely against the	
8	legislation.	
9	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Sir, I would	
10	like to respond to your comments.	
11	First of all, I think that there are	
12	very compelling issues on both sides that	
13	have been raised on both sides of the issues.	
14	But, one of the things that concerns	
15	me and certainly this couch surfing is a	
16	concern for me, whether it is for money or	
17	not.	
18	I think the biggest consideration for	
19	me is the safety issue and I think it is	
20	being minimized.	
21	We are a Town of neighborhoods.	
22	We know who is in our neighborhoods.	
23	We know who is moving in.	
24	We know who the people are that live	
25	on our block.	

1	I am thinking back to something that	
2	occurred just a few weeks ago, a young girl	
3	was getting off the bus in our neighborhood.	
4	She came home from camp and her	Page 85
5	parents were detained at their work and she	
6	didn't have the key to the house.	
7	She knew the people in the	
8	neighborhood to go to where she could go and	
9	be safe until her parents came home.	
10	If someone were to rent their house	
11	out on a daily basis to different people,	
12	that is very transient, that is not the	
13	definition of a neighborhood.	
14	That is more in line with a commercial	
15	enterprise, that quite frankly should be in a	
16	commercial district.	
17	So, when you minimize the safety	
18	issue, forgive me, I think that is the	
19	overriding concern, certainly, quality of	
20	life is important but I think the safety	
21	issue of having transients in a neighborhood	
22	and the fact that we are a Town of	
23	neighborhoods, I think is very struggling.	
24	NORMAN ELLIS: It sounds great but if	
25	you analyze it and I don't believe the	

1	Town has done a study on it, if you try to	
2	find, do a study and find out what level of	
3	criminality has been perpetrated by people	
4	who are residents less than thirty days	Page 86
5	versus those who are residents for more than	
6	thirty days on a per capita and per house	
7	basis, you find there is no support for your	
8	argument at all.	
9	May I finish?	
10	(Whereupon, the bell rang. After, the	
11	following ensued.)	
12	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: I am just	
13	telling you I am just telling you how I	
14	and my neighbors feel we would not be	
15	comfortable having transients in our	
16	neighborhoods.	
17	NORMAN ELLIS: If you are talking law	
18		
19	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: I don't think it	
20	is safe for our children.	
21	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: Mr. Ellis, if you	
22	can make just one last comment, we will move	
23	onto the next speaker.	
24	NORMAN ELLIS: Certainly, thank you,	
25	Supervisor	

1	The Councilman speaks as if allowing	
2	people to continue to have transient rentals	
3	will create and overwhelming effect on the	
4	neighborhood.	Page 87
5	Again, if the Town does a study on	
6	this, I am sure you will find that there is a	
7	very, very limited effect, very few people do	
8	this and for the most part, the renters are	
9	supervised by the people that live in the	
10	homes and, you know, care about their homes.	
11	People are not going to be renting.	
12	People will care. Everyone cares.	
13	We are homeowners. We will care. We	
14	will watch out.	
15	We know that someone who is our	
16	tenant, even for one day, causes harm that is	
17	a liability lawsuit against that we all	
18	know that.	
19	What better than us who better	
20	than us to have our eyes on what is going on?	
21	I think it is just safety talk to	
22	regulate people that want to make a little	
23	extra income, create a red herring.	
24	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: Thank you, sir.	
25	Thank you, sir.	

1	NORMAN ELLIS: Thank you.	
2	(Whereupon, applause from the audience	
3	was heard. After, the following ensued.)	
4	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: Maria Aramanda?	Page 88
5	MARIA ARAMANDA: Hi, good morning.	
6	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: Good Afternoon.	
7	MARIA ARAMANDA: I will be extremely	
8	quick.	
9	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: Name and address	
10	for the record.	
11	MARIA ARAMANDA: Maria Aramanda, 14

6	MARIA ARAMANDA: Is it available to us	
7	to look at?	
8	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: You can FOIL it if	
9	it is available, you can get it.	
10	MARIA ARAMANDA: And, exactly what is	
11	that information?	
12	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: You can FOIL it.	
13	MARIA ARAMANDA: How would I do that?	
14	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: Do a FOIL request.	
15	You do a FOIL request asking for the	
16	information that you want.	
17	MARIA ARAMANDA: That is not what I am

24	I know where you are going with it,	
25	just FOIL the information.	

1	MARIA ARAMANDA: Okay, thanks.	ı
2	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: Thank you very	
3	much.	
		Page 91
4	(Whereupon, applause from the audience	
5	was heard. After, the following ensued.)	
6	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: Cara Castro?	
7	CARA CASTRO: Hi, um	
8	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: Name and address	
9	for the record?	
10	CARA CASTRO: I am sorry?	
11	SUPERVISOR SANTINO: Name and address	
12	for the record.	
13	CARA CASTRO: Cara Castro. And, it is	
14	1310 Times Avenue, Elmont.

5	RORI GORDON: There are thousands of	
6	illegal two-family apartments that exist in	
7	the Town of Hempstead, did you determine	
8	which is more substantially a detriment to	
9	health and safety, the short-term rentals or	
10	the illegal two-family homes?	
11	On Long Island, right, now, there are	
12	over one hundred thousand illegal rentals and	
13	that was done by a study which came out this	
14	week.	
15	It is called "Remedies, accessory	
16	apartments on Long Island, lesson learned."	
17	At the last meeting, Mr. Santino, you	
18	had the Commissioner up, here, who explained

3	Merrick.	
4	This building, here, was built in ${ m Page} $	101
5	1967.	
6	I got my request back, there is no	
7	information.	
8	I mean, how is that possible?	
9	How is that possible?	
10	The Inspector hasn't been to this	
11	building. I mean, it doesn't make any sense.	
12	Here is another building, Inspector	
13	hasn't been to these buildings.	
14	These are hi-rise buildings with	
15	elevators.

21	On Number 11, the CSEA bargaining	
22	agreement, I looked at the previous meeting,	
23	I looked at this meeting, I couldn't find the	
24	details of that document, which is required	
25	by law, that you have, is that contract, when	

1	you contract that you signed with the CSEA?	
2	SUPERVISOR SATNINO: That is correct.	
3	FELIX PROCACCI: You should put that	
4	on the WEB site prior to the Hearing so I can	Page 130
5	discuss it intelligently and not ask you a	
6	bunch of questions and have you say, "oh, go	
7	FOIL it."	
8	Because I shouldn't have to go FOIL

5	third, fourth and fifth year of the

7	There are in the first two years,
