1	CLERK CABANA: Proposed Local Law to be
2	entitled "Code of Ethics" (To repeal Chapter 38 of
3	the Code of the Town of Hempstead and other Town
4	Board resolutions relating to ethics and enact a $Page \mid 10$
5	new Chapter 38 of the Code of the Town of
6	Hempstead)
7	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Felix Procacci?
8	FELIX PROCACCI: Felix Procacci. 1165
9	Barnes Street, Franklin Square, New York.
10	On Page 16 of this law, um, it says it will
11	periodically reviewed by the Ethics Board to
12	ensure it promotes public confidence, integrity.
13	I can tell you right, now the way it is
14	written, it will promote nothing.
15	It will be just a waste of paper, a waste
16	of law.
17	There are a lot of good things in it, but,
18	there are a lot of things that are so vague that
19	you can run a truck through it.
20	What is reasonable?
21	I don't expect any answers from this.
22	You will waste my time. How about, basing
23	a law for political gain?
24	Would that be a violation?
25	What is the unwarranted invasion of

1	Personal privacy?
2	I have been searching for that answer for
3	months.
4	Joe Ra said something about HIPA and I $_{ m Page} 11$
5	inquired about it.
6	I couldn't find anything.
7	Now, Kovit is working on it and my FOIL
8	request.
9	Unwarranted invasion of privacy is in this
10	ethics law, but it is not defined.
11	What is defined?
12	The Ethics Board doesn't want to be defined
13	and therefore, nothing will get done because when
14	you have language, that is so vague you can't
15	enforce anything.
16	The Town Attorney is going to be part of
17	the Ethics Board. He is Executive Leader for the
18	Franklin Square Republican Club.
19	I mean conflict of interest, major conflict
20	of interest.
21	Once, again, nothing will get done.
22	Um, You know when you did public
23	inspections, when you did inspections or
24	investigation of the Animal Shelter and I asked
25	for those reports, you said, I couldn't examine

1	the reports.
2	I couldn't even be given the dates that
3	those reports were made.
4	They said everything invaded personal Page 12
5	privacy.
6	I don't know if anything got done. Give me
7	a number one and start date and end date.
8	I couldn't get that because it was invasion
9	of personal privacy.
10	I mean this law is a joke. It is really a
11	joke, not that there isn't great stuff in there,
12	but, you are going to give me some excuse because
13	I could write a lot.
14	I could go through the trouble writing the
15	things, complaints right, now.
16	There are a ton of stuff I could do right,
17	now and you could say it is an unwarranted
18	invasion of privacy.
19	It is no good. What you are saying is
20	wrong, but you wouldn't give any reason why it is
21	wrong, so, you are, basically, just, you know,
22	wasting the public's time with this, again.
23	Also, it was never brought to the public.
24	I was done behind closed doors.
25	I advocated for a public discussion of

1	this law way back when it was produced in
2	September that was never done.
3	So, you know, it is nice that you are
4	trying. Page 13
5	I think it is a ploy, a political ploy.
6	It will not do anything.
7	Thank you.
8	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Mr. Procacci, would you
9	like Mr. Leventhal to address your concern about
10	unwarranted invasion of personal privacy?
11	FELIX PROCACCI: Yes.
12	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Mr. Leventhal, do you
13	want to respond to that comment?
14	FELIX PROCACCI: Yes, thank you.
15	The term, "unwarranted invasion of personal
16	privacy," comes from the Public Officers Law.
17	The Public Officers Law is a statute that
18	sets that establishes a code of conduct for
19	State Officers and employees and in particularly
20	the Freedom of Information Act includes certain
21	categories of information that they can discuss in
22	executive session, among those, according to that
23	statute, are matters that would result in
24	unwarranted invasion of personal privacy if
25	disclosed.

1 So, it is true that a term like that 2 requires a degree of interpretation. 3 But, that is also the case with most laws. Page | 14 4 There is judgment that is exercised in 5 implementing them and enforcing them and that is 6 we have an Ethics Board that judges and interprets 7 laws and applies to a particular case and we have 8 a Board of Ethics that will also interpret this, 9 um, law if it is enacted and applied in particular 10 cases. 11 FELIX PROCACCI: Let me ask you a question 12 because I had seventeen seconds left. 13 First of all, you asked for my name and 14 address but, then, you redacted the address of the 15 people on the financial disclosure. 16 You are asking for people's public address 17 at this Hearing and making it available to the 18 public and yet that invasion of personal privacy 19 on the financial disclosure form and in addition, 20 in the Camp Anchor situation, the Town Officials 21 released the addresses of those children and, now, 22 they are arguing in Court that it wasn't an 23 invasion of personal privacy. 24 So, you have a double standard, here where

you are fighting a case, saying it wasn't

25

1	invasion of privacy releasing those addresses and
2	you are taking the other side by redacting the
3	addresses on the financial disclosure form.
4	So, which one is it?
5	And, you are going to have to make up your
6	mind, but it can't be both.
7	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Thank you for your
8	comments, Mr. Procacci.
9	Valerie Lampe?
10	VALERIE LAMPE: Good Morning, Town of
11	Hempstead Board and Elected Officials.
12	I am in the best mood.
13	SENIOR COUNCILWOMAN GOOSBY: Nice mood.
14	VALERIE LAMPE: Thank you, Senior
15	Councilwoman Goosby.
16	I am, here, today for this segment to
17	strictly express my gratitude and my excitement
18	over this.
19	Councilman D'Esposito, um, I know for a
20	long time it has been actually since July, where I
21	believe it was brought to the public's attention
22	that there was a constituent, she came, here,
23	herself, her name is Bonnie Redashaw. (phonetic
24	spelling)
25	And, this constituent was also not just

a hardworking taxpayer of the Town of Hempstead but she was a former Supervisor Gillen supporter on her campaign trail.

One of the few, who, in addition to working 9:00 to 5:00 in the City, commuting through the LIRR, taking care of the fellow cat community, as well as, her family, um, you know, she campaigned and rallied and made every effort possible to help Supervisor Gillen get elected.

So, I don't know exactly what her turning point was, many of Supervisor Gillen's former supporters had their turning points and they varied but she did come here to express when she could - - um, and took off of work to communicate to you, Supervisor Gillen that she was disappointed in her lack of progress and commitment to the Animal Shelter, which is something that many of us supported you on, strictly on that issue.

So, the next thing we know she received a memorandum at her job threatening her livelihood naming you, Supervisor Gillen as the reason for why she was given, asked not to participate in her local government anymore, to not come here and voice or even be able to express her concerns

1	and grievances.
2	And, this is the very fundamental basis of
3	our Constitution.
4	$_{ m It}$ is sad to me that this ethics law even
5	has to be proposed.
6	I mean do we have to have a separate clause
7	to be enforced within America's largest and
8	greatest township?
9	Do we have to go one by one?
10	It is just unacceptable that it even has to
11	come to this.
12	So, it is not the first time we have seen
13	you attempt to silence other people, anyone that
14	criticizes your or disagrees with you.
15	You did it to the Receiver of Taxes when
16	you wouldn't allow his information to be posted on
17	the Town's website.
18	You did it to Councilman D'Esposito when he
19	released a Press Release, when he was bringing
20	attention and hopefully trying to end the parole
21	for a disgusting human being who threw a police
22	officer off a roof and you caboshed it and your
23	administration did not allow that to go into the
24	Town of Hempstead website.
25	That is shameful, that is un-American and

1	you did it to me.
2	(Whereupon, the three-minute bell rang.
3	After, the following ensued.)
4	VALERIE LAMPE: When I shouldn't sit next
5	to Diane Madden or Lucille Defina because they
6	opposed you.
7	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Thank you for your
8	comments.
9	Mr. Leventhal, I have a couple of
10	questions, um, with respect to the ethics code,
11	um, 38-3, I am sorry, actually, 38-2, the
12	definition of "relative," looking at the
13	definition of "relative."
14	It appears that this does not include, um,
15	a person's in-laws.
16	So, it appears to me that under this
17	definition of "relative," my father-in-law, my
18	brother-in-law, my sisters-in-law, all the people
19	that will be sitting at the Easter dinner table
20	and other people will be sitting at holiday dinner
21	tables, they are not related to me under this
22	definition, is that right?
23	ATTORNEY LEVENTHAL: They are not included
24	in this definition of "relative," that is right.
25	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: So, I can hire my

1	Father-in-law and supervise my Father-in-law
2	because he is not related to me under this
3	definition, is that correct?
4	ATTORNEY LEVENTHAL: Actually, the State $^{ ext{Page} 19}$
5	law that governs ethics for local municipalities,
6	Article 18 of the New York Municipal Law does not
7	contain the definition of "relative" and, in fact,
8	expressly permits, um, the spouse, officer or
9	employee of a municipality to be hired by that
10	municipality.
11	The problem is not if a spouse or relative
12	works for the same municipality, the problem is if
13	one relative is in a position to set the terms of
14	employment of another to supervise them and to,
15	um, supervise authority with respect to their
16	relative and that is regulated by this code of
17	ethics.
18	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: But, I am asking you
19	about our Code, under our Code, your in-laws are
20	not your relatives?
21	ATTORNEY LEVENTHAL: Our Code, the
22	definition of "relative" does not include in-laws.
23	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Does everybody on this
24	Board agree that your in-laws are not your

relatives, that your Mother-in-law, that your

25

1	Father-in-law, your sister-in-law, they shouldn't
2	be viewed as relatives?
3	ATTORNEY LEVENTHAL: It is already covered
4	in State law. Page 20
5	State law does not define "relative," but
6	it permits the hiring of a spouse, officer and
7	relative.
8	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Mr. Leventhal I
9	have a question, when was the final draft of the
10	ethics legislation shared with the Supervisor and
11	the Board?
12	ATTORNEY LEVENTHAL: Months ago, there was
13	a bipartisan news conference held at which it was
14	announced to the public and introduced.
15	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Since sorry, go
16	ahead.
17	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: I was going to say we
18	have been discussing it since, then, but, this is
19	a change that I pushed for that I think is really
20	important.
21	The State law may not define "relative,"
22	but we are electing here in our Town Code to not
23	define "relative."
24	To me it is incomprehensible that my
25	Father-in-law and my sisters-in-law and my

1	Brothers-in-law are not my relatives.
2	(Whereupon, applause from the audience was
3	heard. After, the following ensued.)
4	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: So, nobody here has an
5	answer to that?
6	You all think your Father-in-law, your
7	Mother-in-law, your sisters-in-law are not your
8	relatives?
9	COUNCILWOMAN KING-SWEENEY: Well, I don't
10	think this is a question of the definition of
11	"relative."
12	I mean my third cousin twice removed is a
13	relative of mine, but, it is whether or not we
14	need to legislate that role.
15	If anything, in-laws, at least, in my
16	family are often outlaws and we treat them more
17	harshly, so, I think we need to look at practical
18	reality
19	(Whereupon, applause from the audience was
20	heard. After, the following ensued.)
21	COUNCILWOMAN KING-SWEENEY: We have
22	the Atlantic Ocean between my in-laws but looking
23	at what is practical, there is no way the Town of
24	Hempstead is trying to state in-laws are not
25	relatives.

	HEMPSTEAD TOWN BOARD 4/16/19
1	It is whether or not we need to legislate
2	that relationship.
3	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Well, your third
4	cousin, I would agree with you, that is getting $^{ m Page 22}$
5	pretty far afield.
6	I think only when people take a Bar Exam
7	they really understand who is their second cousin
8	or first cousin, ten, once removed is vague but in
9	terms of Father-in-law, Mother-in-law, sister-in-
10	law, I think that is pretty close.
11	I think most people will be celebrating the
12	holidays this weekend, Passover, Easter and I
13	think, generally, on holidays like this, we
14	celebrate with our in-laws.
15	I mean, maybe some families don't get along
16	but the families that do, those are the people
17	that you celebrate with.
18	So, in terms of practical application of
19	the Ethics Law and people that are close in

So, in terms of practical application of the Ethics Law and people that are close in familial relationship, I find it incomprehensible that we are saying our in-laws and you don't have to make it any in-law, Father-in-law, say, people like your Father-in-law, Mother-in-law, sister-in-law, brother-in-law, that certainly is something that could be spelt out in this Code, since we are

1	choosing to define, "relative."
2	ATTORNEY LEVENTHAL: Well, there is no
3	uniformed definition of "relative," among
4	$$\operatorname{\textsc{Page}} 23$$ municipalities, so, while we can have a reasonable
5	discussion about where to draw the line in
6	defining "relative," I respectfully would say that
7	it is an overstatement to say it is
8	incomprehensible to not include in-laws.
9	There is no uniformed definition.
10	It is a question of what definition best
11	achieves the goals of the ethics program and what,
12	um, the policymakers deem necessary to achieve
13	those goals.
14	Um, the line is drawn in various places, in
15	various municipalities.
16	(Whereupon, "the answer is vague," was
17	called out from the audience. After, the
18	following ensued.)
19	COUNCILMAN DUNNE: I would like to move
20	that we pass that as is and if there is any other
21	issues, we can always amend this.
22	I have no in-laws working for the Town or
23	the County or the State or the Federal Government.
24	I have nobody of interest.
25	(Whereupon, calling out from the

1	Audience was heard. After, the following ensued.)
2	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Please, stop yelling
3	from the galley.
4	COUNCILMAN DUNNE: We always end up with
5	another thing to kick the can down the road and I
6	don't want to kick it down the road.
7	Let's pass this as we have it, now.
8	It has been agreed to from July all the way
9	to, now.
10	We finally got the law before us.
11	Let's pass it. If we want to amend it to
12	include in-laws and dogs after, whatever you want
13	to include in it, fine.
14	Let's do it all in one full swoop because
15	piece by piece we are going to miss out on
16	something and last minute bringing it up and I
17	have no interest in this at all, no part of my
18	family, not my in-laws in any municipality, so, I
19	think we should pass this as is.
20	A lot of time and effort went into this
21	since July, since before July and we finally got
22	it before us and we find another little bit.
23	You know what, let's pass on the thing.
24	Amend it later when we have everything together
25	and that is my recommendation.

1	I make a motion that we move the item as
2	is.
3	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: I am not suggesting at
4	all that we should kick this down the road. $Page \mid 25$
5	Certainly, this is something that I
6	advocated along with the not Senior
7	Councilwoman, with Councilwoman King-Sweeny, that
8	is the last thing I am suggesting.
9	We have been talking about making
10	amendments.
11	This is an amendment that I think is very,
12	very important.
13	COUNCILMAN DUNNE: It is last minute.
14	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: It is not last minute.
15	I don't know if you have been participating
16	in any of the discussions but this is an amendment
17	that we have been pushing for consistently and it
18	has just been flatly rejected.
19	And, I don't see any basis to not call your
20	Father-in-law and your Mother-in-law, a relative
21	or your sister-in-law, a relative and I don't know
22	why that is not in the Code and since my proposed
23	amendment to this provision, as well as to some of
24	the other nepotism provisions are not being
25	considered, I have to bring it up, here.

1	And, I have to ask Mr. Leventhal what is
2	the rational basis not to call your Mother-in-law
3	or your Father-in-law or your sister-in-law or
4	your brother-in-law your relative. Page 26
5	I haven't heard one articulated.
6	ATTORNEY LEVENTHAL: Well, it is not really
7	a legal question.
8	It is a policy question.
9	It is a question of where the Board wished
10	to draw the line.
11	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: I mean I could agree
12	with that.
13	I think it is a common-sense question, as
14	well.
15	ATTORNEY LEVENTHAL: I am reading from the
16	Nassau County Code of Ethics, the Nassau County
17	Code of Ethics, um, includes, in particular in-
18	laws; Mother-in-law, Father-in-law, sister-in-law,
19	brother-in-law and grandparents.
20	I am reading from the Town of Huntington
21	Code of Ethics, the Town of Huntington Code of
22	Ethics defines relative as spouse, child, step-
23	child, dependent, parent, step-parent, siblings or
24	step-siblings of a town officer or employee.
25	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: So, I am just

1	wondering, does anybody else on this Board think
2	that your Mother-in-law, your Father-in-law and
3	your sister-in-law and your brother-in-law should
4	be considered your relatives? Page 27
5	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: I don't think that is
6	the issue.
7	I think the issue is that you can start out
8	not having an in-law and end up with an in-law
9	through marriage.
10	People meet people at work, whatever, um,
11	we certainly will take this under consideration,
12	but, I agree with Councilman Dunne.
13	We spent over a year on this and it has
14	been a bipartisan effort.
15	Your office has been intimately involved.
16	Senior Councilwoman Goosby has offered a lot of
17	input into this.
18	We finally have something that we all agree
19	on and if we decide down the road that it is
20	important to amend this, we will do it.
21	Just let's pass it the way it is.
22	I don't want to vote on any amendments
23	without thinking it through to see if possibly
24	there is some problem because we want it to be,
25	um, as clear as possible as to what is permitted

1	and not permitted.
2	People should know where the line is and if
3	somebody like I said ends up marrying somebody
4	that works for the Town or a brother marries $Page \mid 28$
5	somebody works for the Town or a sister marries
6	somebody who works for the Town.
7	Um, I think you got to take it on a case-
8	by-case basis.
9	So, I think you should move this forward
10	and we will take it under consideration for the
11	future.
12	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Thank you, Councilman.
13	I had a slip from Diane Madden.
14	DIANE MADDEN: Diane Madden, Hempstead.
15	Um, I have to agree, I would like to see
16	this passed, this resolution.
17	I especially have to thank you,
18	Councilwoman Erin King-Sweeny.
19	I know you basically gave birth to this a
20	long time ago and talked about ethics a lot and,
21	um, I think that was the path that has brought us
22	here.
23	Councilman D'Esposito, I want to thank you,
24	although I am a little unfamiliar with what you
25	contributed as far as to prevent another

1	Situation like what happened to Bonnie Radashaw,
2	could you, please, explain to me a little bit more
3	about it?
4	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Sure, Section 38-16
5	is that correct, Rich, basically, it is a clause
6	to protect the free speech of Hempstead Employees,
7	Contractors and others to avoid what may or may
8	not have happened with Ms. Radashaw (phonetic
9	spelling) in regards to the memo that was possibly
10	sent to her place of work asking that she stop
11	criticizing the Supervisor.
12	DIANE MADDEN: I thank you for that.
13	What I would like to see and that is an
14	outreach is made to anyone else that may have been
15	victimized in the same way Ms. Radashaw was, um,
16	you know, that is important.
17	I happen to know that there are people that
18	were intimated by Laura Gillen including Ryan Cook
19	from the SPCA.
20	Um, a few red flags went out even when
21	Samantha Levine no longer worked for the Town had
22	some very strange tweets following her
23	resignation, um, so, I think that there could be
24	other victims out there.

And, I think it is important to find

1	that out.
2	As far as this resolution, I agree that it
3	can be amended in the future.
4	$$\operatorname{Page} 30$$ In fact, I hope my proposal to Councilwoman
5	Sweeney's office, in fact, I know it is continued
6	to be worked on with regard to anyone because I
7	believe it starts at the applicant level.
8	Um, I think the candidate that tries to get
9	a job, here, to me, it isn't the biggest concern
10	about who they are related to, it is the
11	qualifications.
12	It is the honesty and hiring process. Are
13	they ethical?
14	Do they have integrity?
15	That is the basis for hiring employees and
16	certainly, it is a concern about relatives,
17	absolutely, but, the only concern to me, as a
18	taxpayer, is if they are not qualified, if they
19	are highly qualified, then, I never have an
20	argument.
21	Again, please, do pass this. Let's get it
22	started and, um, I am sure you will be hearing
23	from other constituents on what they would like
24	amended.

And, thank you so much.

SUPERVISOR GILLEN: I do not have any other
slips on this Public Hearing, is there someone
that would like to be heard?
META MEREDAY: Meta J. Mereday, Baldwin Page 31
resident.
The fact that we have to discuss the
division and the breakdown and the family chain
calls to the forefront the problems that we have
had in this area, in this region with regard to
the nepotism, cronyism and patronage and applaud
the efforts going forward with this.
Um, but, I think that once, again, we are
putting something on the table that is not
prepared.
It is like putting raw meat on that table
and saying, yeah, okay, let's just deal with it

insides, we will try to fix it later.

23	um, practice by the Town of Hempstead.
24	I do believe that everyone that comes for a
25	job anywhere should be considered solely on their

1	qualifications, not on their family connections.
2	Thank you.
3	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Thank you, Ms. Jacobs.
4	All right, I do not have any other slips on $^{\mbox{Page} 34}$
5	this Public Hearing, is there anyone else that
6	would like to be heard?
7	ATTORNEY LEVENTHAL: May I just add
8	something?
9	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Sure.
10	ATTORNEY LEVENTHAL: It is important to say
11	and that is that this Code of Ethics if it is
12	adopted by the Board will be a vast improvement
13	over the existing Code of Ethics in this Town.
14	The existing Code of Ethics was originally
15	adopted well, what occurred in the 1960's the
16	State adopted the Statewide Code of Ethics,
17	Article 18 of the New York General Municipal Law.
18	It is a barebones statute.
19	It is really inadequate.
20	It authorized local municipalities to adopt
21	their own local codes and most municipalities like
22	the Town of Hempstead quickly did but generally
23	municipalities adopted a Code of Ethics that
24	really didn't do much more than State law.
25	The only really major, um, change to the

1	Code of Ethics that occurred over the years, since
2	not only the Town of Hempstead but elsewhere, as
3	well, was in 1990 with the adopt of financial
4	disclosure as a result of legislation enacted by $$^{\mbox{\sc Page} 35}$$
5	the State in the late 1980's.
6	Um, this Code of Ethics has a whole variety
7	of sources.
8	It incorporates all the requirements of
9	State law.
10	It incorporates judicial decisions that
11	have been made.
12	It incorporates the literature by scholars
13	and commentators that have written about the
14	subject of government ethics over the year.
15	Um, it incorporates experiences that have
16	occurred in this Town and elsewhere and warrants
17	being addressed by the law.
18	It is organized in a way that is clear and
19	comprehensive.
20	It has a section dedicated to the Code of
21	Conduct, a separate section dedicated to
22	disclosure requirements and a final section that
23	establishes the powers and duties of the Board of
24	Ethics.
25	It is worth noting for the first time ever

1	in the history of this Town, there will be a
2	requirement of bipartisan membership on the Board
3	of Ethics for the first time, ever, in this Town.
4	The Board of Ethics will have authority to $Page \mid 36$
5	impose fines, ever, up to ten thousand dollars for
6	violations of the Code of Ethics.
7	This is a law that was vetted with, um, the
8	Supervisor's Office, the Senior Councilwoman's
9	Office, the Majority Caucus and the Town
10	Attorney's Office.
11	There were many meetings.
12	It went through several revisions.
13	This has been carefully considered and
14	developed and like all such laws, I think it
15	should be considered to be a work in progress.
16	We take a step forward. We keep our eyes
17	and ears open.
18	We determine what improvements can be made
19	in the future and we proceed and make improvements
20	and improve both Town Government and also the
21	services and advances of Town Government for the
22	residents and business people in the Town.
23	And, I think, um, I would respectfully ask
24	the Board to enact this law.
25	And, I think every single member of this

1	Board can feel very proud in having done so.
2	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Thank you, Mr.
3	Leventhal.
4	Madam Clerk? Page 37
5	CLERK CABANA: Supervisor Gillen?

4	575 Underhill Boulevard, Syosset, New York.
5	This is the application of Shady Point, LLC
6	for a Special Exception to permit operation of an
7	automobile shop at the premises in Franklin
8	Square.
9	The premises under application is located
10	on the southerly side of Hempstead Turnpike,
11	295.12 feet West of Claflin Boulevard in Franklin
12	Square.
13	It has a street address of 855, 863
14	Hempstead Turnpike and also known as Section 35,
15	Block 106, Lots 11 and 234 on the Nassau County
16	Land and Tax Map.
17	The premises has a frontage of 61.05 feet
18	on the southerly side of Hempstead Turnpike and
19	extends southerly to the northerly side of Liberty
20	Place.
21	The total lot area is 17,215.26 square feet
22	or approximately .4 acres.
23	The parcel of property under application is
24	zoned partially Business District and partially
25	Residence C District on the Town of Hempstead

1	Official zoning map.
2	The Business Zone portion is to a depth of
3	approximately, one hundred feet southerly from
4	Hempstead Turnpike. Page 43
5	It is developed with a two-story concrete
6	brick and stucco building and attached one-story
7	masonry building.
8	The two-story portion that is being
9	utilized for retail stores and offices and fronts
10	on the southerly side of Hempstead Turnpike.
11	The one-story concrete block, um, portion
12	is to the rear and utilized for automotive repairs
13	presently.
14	The existing structures have the benefit of
15	building permits and Certificates of Occupancies
16	issued by the Town of Hempstead.
17	The existing one-story concrete block
18	building behind the storefront portion of the
19	building was legalized by virtue of a
20	nonconforming approval by the Building Department
21	in 1987.
22	Um, the application is for that and
23	approval was attached to the application documents
24	filed with the Board.
25	That was under Application NC-87-81,

which represented a nonconforming application to maintain a nonconforming commercial garage in the one-story masonry building.

Page 2 of that decision states, "building Page \mid 44 permit Number 49205 was issued in 1947 for a rear addition to the garage and extension of Business use throughout the property."

As a result, the extension of Business use approval covered the entirety of the property and authorizes use of the entire parcel for business purposes.

The applicant, now, seeks approval from this Board authorizing general automotive repairs to the premises within the one-story concrete block building, in addition, any proposed addition in accordance with the site plan and plans on file with the Building Department and, of course, with the Town Board.

20	ATTORNEY AVERTINE: Certainly will.
21	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Is it a long letter,
22	can you read it.
23	ATTORNEY AVERTINE: I certainly can read
24	it.
25	It is a letter dated April 8, 2019

1	Addressed to the Town of Hempstead, Department of
2	Buildings.
3	It says, "To whom it may concern; On
4	$$\operatorname{Page} 46$$ behalf of the Board of Fire Commissioners of the
5	Franklin Square and, Munson Fire District, I am
6	writing this letter in support of the application
7	for public garage to permit the operation of an
8	automobile repair shop for Shady Point, LLC., 855
9	through 863 Hempstead Turnpike, Franklin Square,
10	New York 11010.
11	"The Board has been notified of a Public
12	Hearing on April 16, 2019 at 10:30 a.m. Please,
13	contact me if you require additional information.
14	Respectfully signed by Joseph Tellegroso,
15	Chairman."
16	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Would you had that
17	in.
18	We want to be assured that there will be no
19	shady activity on the property.
20	(Whereupon, laughter was heard. After, the
21	following ensued.)
22	ATTORNEY AVERTINE: I can't speak to that.
23	I think it will be all in accordance with
24	the law.
25	I do have copies for the Board

1	Members of that letter, as well.
2	COUNCILMAN DUNNE: A quick question, if I
3	might, Bruce.
4	I don't see it on the map, we like – – we $$^{ m Page} 47$$
5	are losing men and women overseas in war and they
6	come home to their families, I don't see an
7	American Flag in the gas station.
8	ATTORNEY AVERTINE: Absolutely, the
9	American Flag will be proudly displayed on either
10	the façade of the building or on the roof of the
11	building where it will be as visible as possible.
12	COUNCILMAN DUNNE: Thank you.
13	ATTORNEY AVERTINE: You're welcome.
14	I also would like to submit a letter of
15	support from the abutting property owner directly
16	to the South at 856 Liberty Place.
17	It is dated April 1, 2019.
18	I won't read it into the record, but, it is
19	in full support of the application.
20	I will submit a copy of that, as well.
21	And, I do have photos that I would like to
22	hand in, um, these depict, um, the remediation

11	in favor of you hiring more employees if you
12	expand your business.
13	ATTORNEY AVERTINE: Actually, if the demand
14	requires it, I am sure my client would be happy to

16	I also like to address, at this time, if I
17	may Resolution Number 10279-18 of the Nassau
18	County Planning Commission in connection with this
19	application and it had a recommendation for
20	modifications.
21	I would just like to address those so that
22	the Board can consider that as part of its

25	the first one says that the site plan show no

1	Off-street parking, so, the Planning Commission is
2	looking for provisions of some parking.
3	I respectfully submit, in light of the
4	available, um, municipal field, surrounding the $^{ m Page 50}$
5	premises and Mr. Sean Mulryan is here.
6	He will be briefly testifying about
7	available parking that is required on site.
8	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Do you want to make
9	that part of the record?
10	You don't have to read the whole thing.
11	ATTORNEY AVERTINE: The Resolution?
12	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: The Resolution part.
13	ATTORNEY AVERTINE: Sure, I will submit a
14	copy.
15	In addition to the Planning Commission
16	suggested that the proposed addition be reduced in
17	size.
18	Unfortunately, to do that, it would really
19	diminish the ability of my client to effectuate
20	what he is intending to effectuate from the
21	project.
22	I will submit a copy of that resolution.
23	Um, as the Board may or may not be aware,
24	the facility that my client is relocating from to
25	come here was at 124 Covert Avenue in New Hyde

1	Park, that is a building that was, um, taken in by
2	eminent domain to accommodate the third track for
3	the Long Island Railroad.
4	The business is in a temporary facility, $^{ ext{Page} 51}$
5	now and really needs to, um, complete this process
6	and hopefully if the Board is favorably inclined
7	in connection with this applicant can move this
8	process along so he can build his addition at his
9	operation, here.
10	In that regard, we would request if, at all
11	possible, that the Board take action on this
12	today, if it is feasible for the Board to do so.
13	We also have to go to the Board of Appeals
14	for certain variances including parking in the
15	event the Board is inclined to approve this
16	application.
17	At this time, if I may, I have Sean Mulryan
18	who will make a brief statement.
19	SENIOR COUNCILWOMAN GOOSBY: Before he makes
20	his statement
21	ATTORNEY AVERTINE: Sorry?
22	SENIOR COUNCILWOMAN GOOSBY: I would like
23	to know if you have any place there for flowers,
24	trees, planters so you can make the place nice?
25	What do you plan on doing there?

1	ATTORNEY AVERTINE: Well, there is really -
2	- don't know, Councilwoman Goosby, my client just
3	advised that in terms of the rear of the property
4	where the public really doesn't go, it is really
5	just an area where the boys are, that is not
6	suitable for that.
7	It wouldn't have any positive impact, but,
8	on the Turnpike, there are existing trees and
9	there are beds of earth around those trees that
10	can be fortified with flowering plants and things
11	of that nature which my client would be happy to
12	provide, that would be acceptable.
13	SENIOR COUNCILWOMAN GOOSBY: It looks like
14	worn in front of the building, the sidewalks. It
15	doesn't look nice. Would you be able to do
16	something about that?
17	ATTORNEY AVERTINE: I am sorry, I couldn't
18	hear that.
19	SENIOR COUNCILWOMAN GOOSBY: In front of
20	the building.
21	ATTORNEY AVERTINE: In front of the
22	building, my client advises me the front of the
23	building on Hempstead Turnpike, I have some photos
24	that depict that it was recently done.
25	And, since we are on

1	Hempstead Turnpike, we would require State DOT
2	approval to do anything, to do the sidewalk in
3	front of the building.
4	I can submit these to you, Councilwoman $^{ ext{Page} 53}$
5	Goosby, a view of the front of the building.
6	It does create a positive aesthetics on
7	Hempstead Turnpike.
8	SENIOR COUNCILWOMAN GOOSBY: I don't see
9	what I am asking for.
10	ATTORNEY AVERTINE: Photos of the front of
11	the building on Hempstead Turnpike.
12	SENIOR COUNCILWOMAN GOOSBY: I am sorry,
13	this is your building? (Indicating.)
14	ATTORNEY AVERTINE: Correct.
15	SENIOR COUNCILWOMAN GOOSBY: Okay, okay, I
16	don't see any flowers. Can you put some planters
17	there.
18	ATTORNEY AVERTINE: We can certainly do
19	that.
20	SENIOR COUNCILWOMAN GOOSBY: You can do
21	that?
22	ATTORNEY AVERTINE: Absolutely, thank you.
23	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Just echoing what
24	Senior Councilwoman Goosby said, so, would you
25	make part of your application that you would

1	put planters in and maintain them in a healthy
2	state?
3	ATTORNEY AVERTINE: Of course.
4	Page \mid 54 COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Thank you, because we
5	share Hempstead Turnpike and we are all trying to
6	improve that corridor.
7	I am glad that you brought that up, Senior
8	Councilwoman.
9	ATTORNEY AVERTINE: Absolutely.
10	SEAN MULRYAN: Good Morning. Sean Mulryan,
11	Engineering Offices at 1225 Franklin Avenue in
12	Garden City, New York.
13	I will try to keep this brief, one of the
14	things that I think that is coming up today is
15	that there is essentially two halves to this
16	building.
17	The front half is storefronts that are
18	directing on Hempstead Turnpike on the sidewalk,
19	in the rear of the property is an existing auto
20	repair building that the applicant is looking to
21	expand.
22	And, once, again, it is due to eminent
23	domain or a closure of the existing facility that
24	they use or use to use on Covert Avenue.
25	Covert is closed. It will be closed

1	for several months and that delay has been raised
2	in order to provide for construction of those
3	improvements.
4	The applicant does have repair, here. $Page \mid 55$
5	It will continue that operation.
6	The operation has vehicular access onto
7	Hempstead Turnpike.
8	It, of course, has an access agreement so
9	the property that fronts on Hempstead Turnpike,
10	the driveway on Hempstead Turnpike has a cross
11	access agreement with the neighboring properties.
12	This site does have access onto Liberty
13	Place.
14	Liberty Place is one block South of
15	Hempstead Turnpike.
16	It leads directly into the firehouse.
17	The firehouse, now, subdivides Liberty
18	Place where the trucks will pull in from one side
19	and pull out the other side.
20	So, on this side of Liberty Place, the
21	trucks will exit and open their doors.
22	One is the entrance door and there are fire
23	truck doors on the opposite side of the building.
24	There are three doors and fire trucks can
25	pull straight in with the ambulance backing

1	into the building.
2	Access to the site is provided on Liberty
3	Place and through cross access directly onto
4	Hempstead Turnpike. Page 56
5	As is mentioned, this is primarily for the
6	vehicles that are operated by the applicant.
7	The applicant has several taxicab companies
8	that he operated.
9	This is the facility which those cars are
10	maintained, in order to maintain those cars, deal
11	with the schedule when they come and when they go,
12	so, he is able to control the traffic flow in and
13	out of the site.
14	He doesn't look to overburden his own
15	facilities so he has them come in, um, when lifts
16	and other mechanical equipment is available.
17	There are places on the site for vehicles
18	to park, however, they do not need the standard
19	criteria dimensions of standard parking spaces
20	that you have in a shopping center or somewhere
21	else, so, they are not included in our
22	calculations.
23	They are not provided as to site parking.
24	However, you can store cars in front of the
25	overhead doors and within the buildings.

1	As we have mentioned
2	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: None of your vehicles
3	will block the ingress and egress of the emergency
4	vehicles and fire vehicles? Page 57
5	SEAN MULRYAN: Absolutely not, that is a
6	street that is behind our site, there are parking
7	restrictions on that street and once, again, this
8	is an existing operation that will expand but we
9	are trying to maintain the same traffic flow in
10	and out of that site and those trucks will be
11	directly out onto Liberty Place behind the site
12	and we haven't had any issues.
13	The applicants have been there over twenty
14	years.
15	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: In your opinion,
16	would this application, if approved, have any
17	deleterious effect on traffic?
18	SEAN MULRYAN: No, it would not.
19	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Thank you.
20	SEAN MULRYAN: Thank you.
21	ATTORNEY AVERTINE: That completes our
22	application.
23	We have representatives of the applicant,
24	Lawrence Blessinger, who is a principal of Shady
25	Point, LLC.

1	We also have Anthony Depursio, who is the
2	project architect.
3	Unless the Board has any questions that
4	will complete the application. Thank you. $ \begin{array}{c} \text{Page} \mid 58 \\ \end{array} $
5	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Thank you.
6	Anthony Depursio?
7	ATTORNEY AVERTINE: He is the project
8	architect, if the Board has questions.
9	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Okay, what about John
10	McCarthy?
11	JOHN McCARTHY: Hi, John McCarthy from the
12	MTA. 2 Broadway, New York, New York.
13	Um, I am just, here to provide background
14	on this application, um and in support of
15	consideration of this application.
16	Just a little background, just as you
17	heard, the relocation is, basically, um, because
18	of the, um, work we are doing on Covert Avenue in
19	order to replace what we consider at grade
20	crossing which is, at times, dangerous and
21	certainly causes loud noises, so, the applicant
22	has been working close with us and New York State
23	DOT and Nassau County and other entities to find
24	relocation.
25	We made a commitment at the beginning

1	of our project when we began grade crossings on
2	the third track on the mainline that we would, um,
3	completely have zero residential property takings
4	and limit any commercial property takings. $ Page \mid 59 $
5	We have been fortunate to limit it only to
6	four full takings.
7	And, in case of this applicant, we are
8	taking a partial easement, um, a partial taking
9	and temporary easement to the building had to be
10	taken down and the business relocated, but, our
11	commitment is to keep this business in Nassau
12	County, Town of Hempstead and we respectfully
13	request you consider this application.
14	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Thank you, Mr.
15	McCarthy, I am glad you are here, today because it
16	gives me an opportunity to raise an issue with you
17	with the MTA.
18	The people of Elmont, Franklin Square and
19	North Valley Stream are without a train station.
20	It is a big hardship.
21	You're talking about a lot of people in
22	Elmont, Franklin Square and North Valley Stream,
23	probably close to seventy, eighty thousand people
24	without a train station.

We are one of the few communities that

25

1	do not have a train station.
2	You have a site at Belmont Park. I know
3	they are talking about developing it.
4	Page \mid 60 But, I would love if the MTA would consider
5	whatever happens at Belmont Park that we get a
6	fulltime train station with dedicated parking for
7	the people of Franklin Square, Elmont, North
8	Valley Stream.
9	So, if you can bring that back to the MTA,
10	um, I would be very happy.
11	I know my constituents would.
12	JOHN McCARTHY: I appreciate that.
13	I will bring that back to the MTA and the
14	President.
15	It certainly is something that we are aware
16	of the needs in that area.
17	It is a very commutable area if you have
18	train service.
19	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: I think that is under
20	consideration right, now, is that correct?
21	COUNCILWOMAN KING-SWEENEY: We need to do
22	something about congestion pricing, you are taxing
23	the Town of Hempstead to death.
24	JOHN McCARTHY: I will also bring that
25	back.

1	COUNCILWOMAN KING-SWEENEY: Thank you.
2	JOHN McCARTHY: Councilwoman, we have a big
3	capital program coming up and there is a major
4	commitment to Long Island Railroad in that as you
5	know, the existing commitment is there, six
6	million dollars over the last two capital
7	programs.
8	There is a lot of work. We hope the
9	result will be a terrific railroad.
10	COUNCILWOMAN KING-SWEENEY: We should have
11	had a terrific railroad to start off considering
12	the taxes that we pay here in the Town of
13	Hempstead with passing a four percent tax cut and
14	we live within our budget.
15	We hope the Governor would do so.
16	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Aren't you glad you
17	came here. Come back soon.
18	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: I do not have any slips
19	on this public hearing, is there anyone else that
20	would like to be heard?
21	(Whereupon, no response was heard. After,
22	the following ensued.)
23	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Hearing none, may I
24	have a Motion.
25	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Yes, Supervisor, I

1	move that the Public Hearing be closed and the
2	item be adopted.
3	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Second.
4	CLERK CABANA: Supervisor Gillen? Page 62
5	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Aye.
6	CLERK CABANA: Councilman Blakeman?
7	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Aye.
8	CLERK CABANA: Councilman D'Esposito?
9	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Aye.
10	CLERK CABANA: Councilman Dunne?
11	COUNCILMAN DUNNE: Aye.
12	CLERK CABANA: Senior Councilwoman Goosby?
13	SENIOR COUNCILWOMAN GOOSBY: Aye.
14	CLERK CABANA: Councilwoman King-Sweeney?
15	COUNCILWOMAN KING-SWEENEY: Aye.
16	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Madam Clerk will you
17	call our next Public Hearing.
18	CLERK CABANA: Application of JAV GASOLINE
19	ENTERPRISES, INC., to convert an existing
20	automobile repair building to construct a canopy
21	over existing pump islands as well as maintain
22	existing i.d. sign & operate self-service station
23	- (nr) Island Park - northwest corner of Austin
24	Boulevard & Kingston Boulevard.
25	ATTORNEY O'BRIEN: Good Morning, Supervisor

1	Gillen, Honorable Members of the Board, Madam
2	Clerk:
3	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Good Morning.
4	ATTORNEY O'BRIEN: Kevin O'Brien from the $^{ m Page} 63$
5	firm of Murphy, Bartol and O'Brien with offices at
6	22 Jericho Turnpike, Mineola, New York.
7	A quick side note, congratulations on the
8	adoption of the Ethics regulations. Great to see
9	the Board work together.
10	And, also, you know it is great to see.
11	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Thank you, Mr. O'Brien.
12	ATTORNEY O'BRIEN: I also have, here, this
13	morning, Marc Pilotta, he is a licensed,
14	professional Engineer.
15	He is from Prime Engineering Design
16	Professionals that prepared the plans.
17	We are before the Board and if I may, this
18	is an application which involves an existing
19	gasoline service station which is located at the
20	northwest corner of Austin Boulevard and Kingston
21	in Island Park, also know as 4240 Austin Boulevard
22	in Island Park.
23	And, obviously, it is in the unincorporated
24	area giving the Board jurisdiction of this
25	location.

And, essentially, the applicant, who is the owner of the property we are representing is here to convert the existing bays to be used for repair for motor vehicles and have a canopy over the $\frac{Page \mid 64}{Page \mid 64}$ direct pump islands.

I would just like to give a brief overview, a mini history of the location and certain why the need - - why we are here for, essentially, it is an existing service station, typically 1950's, '60's station with eighteen hundred square foot building, um, built in around 1960 located in the underlying "X" Zoning District.

They did come before the Board in the 1980's, um, for a Town Board resolution including the subject property within the GSS Zoning

District which is the correct zoning district for gasoline service stations.

At that time, they made an application to replace some of the existing underground service storage tangs and, um, the premises that operated pretty much with the similar operator for quite an extensive period of time.

Um, it did get Sandy hit, did get damage to a certain extent. Wasn't horrendous but it wasn't good but, um, the operator of the

Service station, which is, essentially, operating the, um, the quick lube facility, um, purchased the property to the North, um, built a facility for just, um, quick lube, okay, no gas station. $\frac{Page \mid 65}{Page \mid 65}$

This premises remained, um, he operated the business to the North.

There is an existing gasoline service station about two years ago in accordance with the County's requirements to replace um, single wall underground gasoline storage tanks with double wall fiberglass storage tanks, two underground storage tanks will be installed in this location, one, thirty thousand gallons and one, fifteen thousand gallons which is a compartmentalized tank for both premium and, um, diesel.

So, the premises is currently situated and it is configured, um, as four pump islands, one multi dispenser island for use of whatever grade of motor fuel the motoring public would desire including premium and including diesel.

Just a little bit more about the site, this site has two curb cuts on Austin Boulevard with one curb cut on the side street, which is Kingston and actually behind us, um, there

1	is, um, actually three street frontages.
2	There is Industrial Place behind us and
3	sort of is the name, sort of restricting the
4	area, itself is principally a commercially $Page \mid 66$
5	utilized and improved area.
6	So, mostly other businesses, um, like
7	across the street you have the Speedway, there
8	is another service station to the southeast of
9	us.
10	There is a restaurant and a lot of auto
11	body type of uses, auto related uses in this
12	typical area.
13	So, as I was mentioning, so the proposed
14	improvements in this location would be a canopy
15	over the existing pump islands.
16	There are four pump islands that will not
17	change and convert the interior into a, um, into
18	a retail space.
19	There will be no servicing of automobiles
20	in the proposed at this at this
21	location.
22	Um, we did say that there was an inspection
23	of the premises.
24	There were a couple of violations on site.
25	A number of them, I would just

1	categorize as paperwork and I tried to explain
2	this to my clients with limited success, in that
3	when the underground storage tanks were put in,
4	they never closed out the permits. $Page \mid 67$
5	There is some closed out type of things,
6	um, and, then, I did notice, um, there were some
7	things with respect to in between the means of
8	ingress from the building.
9	They had storage of cardboard boxes and the
10	like, which could present as a hazard.
11	It has all been cleaned. I don't like to
12	see anything impeding the egress of a building,
13	so, we have addressed those concerns, also.
14	But I think there is some stuff cluttered
15	around some of the fire extinguishers and it has
16	all been addressed but that so that is
17	really what we are seeking to do in a nutshell.
18	The building, itself, the perimeter of the
19	building, itself, will remain the same.
20	We are not going to change that.
21	I have and one thing, a little bit of
22	work in progress, I am trying to work with the
23	architect on this.
24	This is just me and I could be wrong with
25	this one, inasmuch as we are approaching

1	Beach community over there.
2	My recommendation to the client in
3	connection with this is a hearty plant or
4	something like that, give a little bit, sort of
5	a feel to it when you have sort of have multiple
6	layers recommending against a stucco type of
7	building, which you see a lot, typically, so, I
8	am working on that.
9	I think it would be a nice gateway into
10	Island Park over there in the beach community.
11	So, we are in that process. We are not
12	changing the physical aspect of the building,
13	but, I guess, I personally would like to see
14	some sort of architectural upgrade.
15	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: That would be
16	great.
17	Just a couple of questions.
18	ATTORNEY O'BRIEN: Sure.
19	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: So, the tenant to
20	the north, the applicant is also the owner of
21	that?
22	ATTORNEY O'BRIEN: Previously that owner
23	owned this particular piece of property.
24	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Okay.
25	ATTORNEY O'BRIEN: Didn't own it, he was

1	a tenant at this piece of property.
2	He bought the property to the North, so, he
3	is no longer the tenant, here.
4	He independently owns and operates that $^{ m Page} 69$
5	location to the North.
6	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Okay.
7	ATTORNEY O'BRIEN: No relation to this
8	particular piece of property other than as
9	former tenant.
10	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Now, in the
11	building, the parcel that we are discussing,
12	you're keeping the pro bays?
13	ATTORNEY O'BRIEN: Um, well, what we are
14	proposing on doing is eliminating all service
15	bays, all repairs and having the entire inside
16	of the building inside the building is
17	approximately, well, I should say, four corners
18	of the building is eighteen hundred square feet
19	when you get down to the interior space it is
20	utilized as a convenience utility room, restroom
21	and the like, so, probably end up with the
22	neighborhood of twelve hundred and fifty square
23	feet of usable retail space.
24	But, there will be no repairs or
25	lubricating of motor vehicles at this location.

1	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: How many pumps are
2	you keeping?
3	ATTORNEY O'BRIEN: There will be four
4	multi-product dispensers. Page $\mid 70$
5	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Same location as
6	they are, now.
7	ATTORNEY O'BRIEN: Same location.
8	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Just a couple of
9	questions
10	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: I just wanted to ask a
11	few questions, you mentioned stucco for the
12	interior of the building, this structure, are
13	there plans to use and enhance the beauty and
14	appearance of this station?
15	I know Senior Councilwoman Goosby asked the
16	last applicant to put in planters, um, something
17	to could make this a little bit more attractive?
18	ATTORNEY O'BRIEN: Absolutely, what we are
19	looking at with our design professionals, like I
20	said, me, I kind of like the beachy sort of
21	thing.
22	In the corner, we can put some beach grass
23	or something like that.
24	I recognize and discussed this with our
25	design professional, we do have limited site

1	side and building, nevertheless, I still think he
2	will do something out the front and a little bit
3	towards the back and the landscaping between as
4	well as underneath the canopy, some have put $^{ extstyle{Page} 71}$
5	some pots or stuff, he said needs sunlight.
6	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: We do like Palm
7	trees in Island Park.
8	ATTORNEY O'BRIEN: So, I think that on the
9	exterior of some of the pump islands, we
10	possibly those would in the pots, have
11	something there, but, certainly agree because it
12	makes all the difference in the World.
13	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Just to address
14	some of the violations that are on the site,
15	right, now, I mean there is a bunch here, to go
16	through them all, are they being taken care of?
17	ATTORNEY O'BRIEN: They are all being
18	addressed.
19	Like I said, a number of them, for
20	instance, they said, we are operating a
21	convenience store; we do sell, quite frankly,
22	cigarettes and lottery tickets and Snapple.
23	To me but, we are here to address
24	that.
25	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Especially,

1	the safety issues, I guess there was no fire
2	extinguishers, electrical hazards.
3	I am not sure if you are aware of this, less
4	than a year ago, there was a tanker fire $Page \mid 72$
5	directly across the street from this location.
6	ATTORNEY O'BRIEN: I am very aware of that.
7	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Yes.
8	ATTORNEY O'BRIEN: I saw the videos on
9	that, unfortunately.
10	The beauty of this day and age that we live
11	in right, now, is that technology is incredible,
12	so, now, that could have been devastating, now,
13	you have those breakaway hoses and all of that
14	stuff, so, that could have been devastating.
15	Actually, the Island Park Fire Department
16	did a tremendous job in taking care of that,
17	but, fortunately, nothing really happened.
18	I looked. It was the first thing that I
19	went to when I saw a violation.
20	Safety is, obviously, paramount.
21	There were fire extinguishers that were
22	there, but, there was stuff underneath them.
23	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Okay.
24	ATTORNEY O'BRIEN: Three foot clearance.
25	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: As long as

1	the violations are getting taken care of.
2	Along that corridor of Austin Boulevard is
3	a tough area to keep clean.
4	Page \mid 73 I ask that, you know, local businesses do
5	their best to maintain in front of their stores.
6	You are in an area where you have Jimmy
7	Haze next door. You have the Pearl Restaurant
8	that just opened across the street.
9	There is a Bran Paradiso. You are right in
10	the area of businesses, Artie's Collision,
11	Kumas, they all really do a great job keeping
12	their storefronts clean.
13	I know Industrial Boulevard that is
14	immediately to the rear, you guys there is an
15	issue.
16	We have trouble with the fire trucks
17	getting down there when there is a fire, so, my
18	office is pretty hard on Industrial Place.
19	So, you know, please don't keep cars back
20	there.
21	Please don't keep garbage back there.
22	And, do your best to keep the area clean,
23	have plants, flowers, you know, Island Park is a
24	beautiful community.
25	I was born and raised there.

1	I lived there my whole life. We encourage
2	new local businesses, but, we want to make sure
3	they are keeping our communities clean, the
4	$\overline{\text{Page} 74}$ sidewalks clear of obstruction, so, bike riders
5	can make their way to Long Beach and enjoy the
6	boardwalk.
7	ATTORNEY O'BRIEN: Absolutely.
8	COUNCILMAN DUNNE: If I may, I know you are
9	short space, is there room for an American Flag?
10	ATTORNEY O'BRIEN: Already done, I already
11	got between eighteen and twenty foot pole and
12	flag.
13	COUNCILMAN DUNNE: God Bless you. Thank
14	you.
15	ATTORNEY O'BRIEN: Is there anything
16	further for myself or my expert, otherwise
17	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: I am sorry, one
18	more thing.
19	ATTORNEY O'BRIEN: Surely.
20	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: The clothing box.
21	ATTORNEY O'BRIEN: Believe it was removed,
22	if it wasn't, but, it will be.
23	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: I will pass by.
24	ATTORNEY O'BRIEN: I believe it was too
25	small, slightly noted, like I said, I

1	want this one to be the one that stands out and be
2	proud of.
3	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: It will be.
4	ATTORNEY O'BRIEN: Agreed. Thank you so $^{ ext{Page} 75}$
5	much.
6	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Thank you, gentlemen.
7	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: You know, I
8	mentioned before, it wasn't in the actual plan,
9	if you can submit it sometime in the future is
10	the landscaping plan, whenever you get a moment,
11	please, submit it, so we have it.
12	ATTORNEY O'BRIEN: I have over two hundred
13	and fifty signatures in support of the
14	application.
15	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Please, submit it.
16	ATTORNEY O'BRIEN: Thank you.
17	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Thank you.
18	I do not have any slips on this Public
19	Hearing, is there anyone else that would like to
20	be heard?
21	(Whereupon, no response was heard. After,
22	the following ensued.)
23	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Hearing none, may I
24	have a Motion.
25	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: I move that the

1	Public Hearing be closed and we reserve decision.
2	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Second.
3	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Madam Clerk?
4	CLERK CABANA: Supervisor Gillen? Page 76
5	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Aye.
6	CLERK CABANA: Councilman Blakeman?
7	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Aye.
8	CLERK CABANA: Councilman D'Esposito?
9	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Aye.
10	CLERK CABANA: Councilman Dunne?
11	COUNCILMAN DUNNE: Aye.
12	CLERK CABANA: Senior Councilwoman Goosby?
13	SENIOR COUNCILWOMAN GOOSBY: Aye.
14	CLERK CABANA: Councilwoman King-Sweeney?
15	COUNCILWOMAN KING-SWEENEY: Aye.
16	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: That concluded our
17	Public Hearings, Madam Clerk, will you, please,
18	call the Administrative Calendar.
19	CLERK CABANA: Yes, Supervisor, on the
20	Administrative Calendar, there are Items 10
21	through 43.
22	I also have a Resolution that is of an
23	urgent or emergency nature, this Resolution is a
24	Resolution authorizing the interim municipal
25	agreement with the North Merrick Fire

1	District for the purchase of a used 2006
2	Chevrolet, Trailblazer.
3	This will be Item 44 on the calendar.
4	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Would any of the $Page \mid 77$
5	Council Members like to sever any of the Items
6	on the calendar?
7	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: If I could give an
8	explanation of 44.
9	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Sure.
10	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Why it is an
11	emergency, Number 44 is an intermunicipal
12	agreement between the Town of Hempstead and the
13	North Merrick Fire Department to purchase one of
14	their old Chief's cars, um for our EMS
15	Department.
16	Um, they are in need of a car, a vehicle
17	and instead of purchasing brand new, this is
18	coming from the North Merrick Fire Department at
19	a cost of, I believe, twenty-five hundred
20	dollars and already has the, you know, stickers
21	and lighting on it, that it will need and with
22	the Summer season coming, we just don't like to
23	see the truck be sold to some other person or
24	municipality.
25	COUNCILMAN DUNNE: North Merrick Fire

1	Department is in my District and we are more than
2	happy to support this.
3	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Okay, may I have a
4	Motion on the Administrative Calendar. $Page \mid 78$
5	SENIOR COUNCILWOMAN GOOSBY: I move the
6	Administrative Calendar from 10 through 44 with
7	the exception of Item Number 20 which I move
8	adjourned without date.
9	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Second.
10	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: I have a number of
11	slips that would like to be heard.
12	Valerie Lampe?
13	VALERIE LAMPE: Could you tell me what
14	number 23 is?
15	I am sorry, I was in the ladies room.
16	Thank you, so, I understand that, um, Mr. Thomas
17	Muscarella is up for appointment to take over
18	Mr. Ambrosino's seat, correct?
19	Is that happening, today?
20	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Yes.
21	VALERIE LAMPE: Okay, um, I know that there
22	has been a lot of discussion in the past
23	regarding this very issue and special elections.
24	Um, I don't really have a clear
25	understanding in terms of the cost benefit

1	Analysis.
2	I do know that my Mother has, um, worked
3	for the Board of Elections every election for as
4	far back as I can remember and every location, I
5	know, they pay those people who work there all
6	day, right?
7	So, every location has, I don't know, how
8	many employees and I believe there is additional
9	cost after that for the counting of the votes,
10	right?
11	Can anyone tell me how much a special
12	election would cost in a District, ballpark?
13	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Roughly, one hundred
14	thousand dollars per Councilmanic District.
15	VALERIE LAMPE: Okay and that usually
16	brings out how many voters, one hundred thousand
17	brings out how many?
18	No, we don't know?
19	I know it is a small turn out, right,
20	usually for special elections.
21	Okay, um, you know what, I have to say
22	this, I am not trying to insult anyone, here,
23	really, I am not.
24	I am just trying to give you kind of what I
25	think is a clip of reality.

1	Most people don't know who their local
2	representatives are, they don't.
3	And, I have this, um, weird approach that I
4	take and I just ask people random questions. $^{ m Page} 80$
5	I could be standing on line at CVS. I
6	could be walking into a meeting and I just ask
7	random people, I am curious, "do you know who
8	your local representatives are?"
9	Most people don't know who the Secretary of
10	State is or if you watch News 12, they ask, "Who
11	is the Vice-President?"
12	A lot of people don't know that, on the
13	highest level.
14	So, my point is, um, I hope the Board does
15	appoint him because what I don't think is good
16	for a Councilmanic District is to have no
17	representation.
18	And, if this is the option, then, I think
19	it is a good thing for people to have someone to
20	call and have someone to email and for me, I
21	would like to meet with Mr. Muscarella, assuming
22	he does get appointed, specifically, about the
23	Animal Shelter, even though it is not his
24	District, he will be voting on these things.
25	So, um, I am just saying, let's have the

1	representation in the District.
2	And, as far as everyone getting their name
3	out there, I am happy to talk to you about some
4	idea I have in terms of helping people know who
5	you are.
6	Thank you.
7	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Aubrey Philips?
8	AUBREY PHILIPS: Good Afternoon.
9	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Good Afternoon. State
10	your name and address for the record, please.
11	AUBREY PHILIPS: Aubrey Philips, Elmont,
12	New York.
13	I am here as Vice-President of the Parkers
14	Civic Association a small civic association of
15	nine hundred families.
16	And, um, Ms. Joe Stone who left because she
17	had to do parking tickets not parking
18	tickets but, certainly parking filling
19	meters.
20	I am here on behalf of those families to
21	say that we reject the idea that you will
22	appoint Mr. Muscarella, a familiar family name,
23	in light of what we heard, Item 5 of the, um,
24	discussions earlier.
25	I would like to ask a question and the

1	question is if there is anyone sitting behind me
2	that is a Member or a resident of the $2^{\rm nd}$
3	Councilmanic District, um, any of you voted for
4	any of the Members of this Board? $ Page \mid 82 $
5	Okay, good, so, there is one.
6	The point, here, is I certainly and neither
7	did any or most of residents of my District did
8	not vote for any of you, whether we share some
9	kinship or not.
10	As such, we don't see how any of you can
11	decide for us who represents our District.
12	We understand that as a Body, you come
13	together and you make decisions for the Town of
14	Hempstead.
15	So, my job, here, today is to say that
16	since none I certainly have not asked or
17	had the ability to cast a vote for any of you as
18	an individual, I certainly am here, today to say
19	that, in addition to not having voted for any of
20	you as an individual, I want to make it clear
21	that as a collective body, I do not grant you
22	permission as a voter to tell me who should
23	represent me in my Councilmanic District.
24	Thank you.
25	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Thank you, Mr. Philips.

1	Tammie Williams?
2	TAMMIE WILLIAMS: Good Afternoon. I am
3	Tammie Williams, also a Board Member of Elmont
4	Parker Civic Association. Page 83
5	Um, just want to say good afternoon and
6	thank you for having me here, today, speaking on
7	Item Number 23, the appointment of Thomas
8	Muscarella, Council Person for the $2^{\rm nd}$
9	Councilmanic District.
10	As you know, I speak quite fluently in the
11	language of gerrymandering.
12	Elmont has two Council Members representing
13	them, Councilman Blakeman and, um, no longer
14	with us, Edward Ambrosino.
15	Can we wait until November?
16	Yes, we can.
17	Do we need a special election?
18	No, we don't.
19	Why?
20	Because neither gentlemen represented
21	Elmont to the fullest because of partisan
22	gerrymandering.
23	If we need to get a problem resolved in the
24	Town in Elmont, we call the Commissioner
25	directly.

1	If we need our garbage picked up, we call
2	Sanitation directly.
3	We have a good-working relationship with
4	the Commissioners.
5	If there is an issue in Elmont, can we rely
6	on our Councilmanic District representatives?
7	No, we cannot.
8	Gerrymandering has let us to one taxation
9	without representation.
10	Our Parks look bad.
11	Erin King Sweeney mentioned on her Facebook
12	that she is going to get two brand-new Parks.
13	Well, Elmont has not received one, that is
14	due to gerrymandering.
15	So, on special elections, you can save the
16	one hundred thousand dollars, maybe invest in
17	Elmont Park.
18	As far as representation, again, we can
19	wait.
20	You don't see a lot of us here because a
21	lot of our families work during the day.
22	Can you come to Elmont and ask them their
23	opinion?
24	Can you come to Valley Stream, North Valley
25	Stream and ask their opinion?

1	Come at nighttime when most people are
2	available and the ones that are not available is
3	because we are law enforcement. We have health
4	care workers.
5	We need a fair process.
6	Democracy is about fairness.
7	And, anyone who votes to appoint someone to
8	a Board lacks integrity in my eyes because I
9	have not seen the majority of this Board walk
10	through my community.
11	I have seen the Supervisor walk through my
12	community.
13	If I need something, I go to my Senior
14	Councilwoman, who doesn't even represent Elmont,
15	to get things done.
16	So, the realty is you haven't represented
17	us in decades.
18	Don't do us any favors by voting someone.
19	Either you can wait until November or wait to
20	fair districting and what you can do for the
21	last fifteen seconds that I have is fix the
22	Charter when it comes to fair districting.
23	Give people a voice. We have the
24	intelligence to pay our taxes.
25	We have intelligence to vote. Thank you

1	very much.
2	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Ms. Williams, I would
3	like to state, for the record, that I have no
4	recollection of you ever calling me to $$\operatorname{\textit{Page}} 86$$
5	accomplish any of the things that you would like
6	to accomplish.
7	Other people in Elmont have called me.
8	As a matter of fact, yesterday, I spent
9	five hours on Elmont talking about various
10	issues that concern the people in that
11	community.
12	And, by the way, we have spent millions of
13	dollars on Elmont Road Park, a place that I grew
14	up playing basketball in almost every day
15	because I lived in adjoining Valley Stream, so,
16	if you feel that you are not being represented,
17	pick up the phone, call my office.
18	I am happy to help you.
19	TAMMIE WILLIAMS: Okay, I am in Edward
20	Ambrosino's District because, as I stated before
21	
22	(Whereupon, the three minute bell rang.
23	After, the following ensued.)
24	TAMMIE WILIAMS: We are gerrymandered,
25	um, od you have a woman in your office that

1	Begins with the letter "D"?
2	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Yes, Debbie.
3	TAMMIE WILLIAMS: So, I have her email. I
4	actually did call your office in regards to $^{ m Page} 87$
5	Tudor Manor section, which you represented and
6	she was able to get the business owner to cut
7	the grass and landscaping.
8	Yes, that is one issue because I had to go
9	outside of my District, which is Ambrosino's
10	District and call your District to get someone
11	to maintain a certain property.
12	So, you and I can exchange our numbers and
13	we can have a conversation about Elmont, but, I
14	see just putting someone on the Board just to
15	have them on the Board is not fair
16	representation.
17	We have to handle gerrymandering first and
18	foremost so
19	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: We can agree to
20	disagree on that, but, thank you so much and
21	feel free to contact me.
22	TAMMIE WILLIAMS: Got it, thank you.
23	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Thank you.
24	Thomas Tweedy?
25	THOMAS TWEEDY: Good Morning. Thomas

1	Tweedy, Floral Park, New York.
2	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: You need to disclose
3	that you are a candidate for this seat.
4	THOMAS TWEEDY: I am the Democrat for $Page \mid 88$
5	District Council 2.
6	Resolution 23 states that by reason of
7	Ambrosino's resignation, that a vacancy exists
8	on the Town Board.
9	The Resolution fails to mention that
10	however as a convicted felon, he was required to
11	vacate the office.
12	While they did not wait until his actual
13	sentencing, the fact is that his constituents of
14	our communities have not had someone qualified
15	to represent us for, at least, the last three
16	years.
17	To suggest that we cannot wait until
18	November for a full and fair election by "we the
19	people," is both erroneous and offensive.
20	One compromise would be to hold a special
21	election in conjunction with the June Primary
22	elections that are already scheduled and
23	budgeted for, so, there would not be the
24	expenses which the Board Members claim are not
25	the reason for holding such a special election.

1	"We the people," want to make our voting
2	decisions.
3	It is also disappointing that we are, once,
4	again, going to get another example of the same $^{ m Page 89}$
5	old nays and ayes being played out.
6	Demonstrating the nepotism, cronyism and
7	paid favoritism which is corrupt in our Town.
8	During this most Holy of weeks, the State
9	of this tainted site and this tainted process
10	will not be washed away, today, but "we, the
11	people," will raise up in November to win this
12	Town's long nightmare.
13	The Resolution goes onto say the temporary
14	appointee is qualified to fill the vacancy.
15	The record shows that he maybe the least
16	qualified person ever proposed to the Board
17	since six Council Districts were set up.
18	The review of his public statements and
19	engagements suggests that his most public
20	service is being involved in Little League
21	Baseball.
22	Tommy Lasorda said "there are those that
23	make it happen, those that watch it happen and
24	those who wonder what happened."
25	When it comes to stepping up

1	to the major leagues in the Board, the Republican
2	Candidate has, at best, been a disengaged
3	spectator to our important public discord.
4	Most of his public life, his adult life, $^{ ext{Page} 90}$
5	unlike Teddy Roosevelt, he gets no credit for
6	being in the public arena.
7	The Republican candidate may have been a
8	fine Little League leader, but for the major
9	issues facing our Town of Hempstead, he has not
10	been in the Hearing Room, never mind the
11	microphone or in the middle of the debate.
12	The Republican candidate has been missing
13	in action. The fact is there are hundreds of
14	current and former elected officials within our
15	Town who have been fully scrutinized and go
16	through the election vetting process from Fire
17	Districts, Fire District Members and elections
18	and Village Mayors, State and Federal elections.
19	For the other Board Members to represent
20	us, someone who has not even been the president
21	of his neighborhood civic association is
22	pathetic.
23	I, again, implore you to consider the
24	compromise, special election in June

(Whereupon, the three minute bell

25

1	rang. After, the following ensued.)
2	THOMAS TWEEDY: With the great arbiter, the
3	ballot boxes, the voters opinions are heard.
4	$rac{Page \mid 91}{SUPERVISOR}$ GILLEN: Thank you, Mr. Tweedy.
5	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Mr. Tweedy, before
6	you step away, I have a couple of questions for
7	you.
8	On April 11^{th} , you state "that every single
9	GOP Councilman on the Town of Hempstead Board
10	was placed there before being elected."
11	This is a quote from your FACEBOOK page.
12	"This is exactly why I am running for the
13	Town Council. We need to restore integrity to
14	local government. Laura Gillen was the
15	beginning of that restorative process. Elect me
16	in November and I will help that process along."
17	A day later the Supervisor described and
18	appointment to the Town Board as "disgraceful
19	and un-American."
20	You gave your comments today and you quoted
21	Tommy Lasorda and an important part of that
22	quote where you said "wonder what happened."
23	Well, I wonder what happened when you gave
24	that statement you failed to tell the community
25	you failed to tell the Town of Hempstead

1	and you failed to tell the people of the 2^{nd}
2	District, that you, in fact, yourself was
3	appointed to the Floral Park Village Board, not
4	only were you appointed Page 92
5	(Whereupon, applause from the audience was
6	heard. After, the following ensued.)
7	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: You were appointed
8	by Mayor Ann Corbin in May, 2001 and following
9	your appointment you rose through the ranks and
10	in April, 2011 you appointed Kevin Fitzgerald to
11	fill your unexpired term and, then, you ran,
12	again, in November, 2014, after Mary Grace
13	Tubecki resigned.
14	You then appointed, Lynn Pombonyo.
15	So, my question to you is in 2011 or I
16	should say 2001 when you were appointed to the
17	Village Board, obviously, it was a little
18	different because you were rising up in power.
19	You were gaining a seat and there were no
20	complaints.
21	Again, I find it erroneous and disgraceful
22	and un-American and quite frankly, completely
23	hypocritical
24	(Whereupon, applause from the audience was
25	heard. After, the following ensued.)

1	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: That you are
2	critical of this appointment.
3	THOMAS TWEEDY: May I respond?
4	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Absolutely, I think
5	the facts say it all.
6	THOMAS TWEEDY: There is a significant
7	difference from a two-term versus a four-year
8	term.
9	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: We are talking
10	about the appointment to a Board.
11	Let me finish, we are talking about the
12	appointment to a Board, okay, the months that
13	you were appointed, you were appointed in April.
14	Why not have a special election?
15	You were appointed. Why not have a
16	special election?
17	And, I know the Village Elections are
18	different than the General Elections.
19	THOMAS TWEEDY: Therefore the election is a
20	two-year process.
21	Dom Longobardi, for instance, was elected
22	in December I am sorry, in, um, March.
23	His two terms, each of those two terms, he
24	had a full Board.
25	In my situation with Ann Corbet, when she

1	was elected, I was not running for election, there
2	were no seats available to run for.
3	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: When you were
4	appointed, when you were appointed $Page \mid 94$
5	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Councilman D'Esposito,
6	let the gentleman finish.
7	THOMAS TWEEDY: This year, however, the
8	election was held in March, the first Monday in
9	April or when Village appointments are made at
10	that point, there was an opening in the Village
11	Board of two-year elections and I was appointed,
12	not an election, election.
13	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: You were okay with
14	the appointment, then?
15	THOMAS TWEEDY: I accepted the appointment.
16	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Let's be clear, I
17	actually give credit to the Supervisor, because
18	she is against appointments, but, at least, she
19	owns it.
20	You do not.
21	You're against appointments when it doesn't
22	benefit you.
23	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Since you said, "un-
24	American," for him to accept an appointment
25	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: I am quoting you

1	said it is disgraceful.
2	You said that. You said that accepting an
3	appointment is disgraceful and un-American, so
4	worded the Supervisor Page 95
5	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: I do believe you
6	misquoted me but, again, but you said it was
7	disgraceful.
8	We can look at the record. Maybe you can
9	read the record back.
10	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: No, I was quoting
11	you. I said it was completely hypocritical.
12	It is hypocritical, that he was being
13	appointed himself and appointing two people to
14	the Village Board but now because he is not the
15	one being appointed he is against it.
16	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Hypocritical,
17	disgraceful and un-American, so, if it is
18	hypocritical, disgraceful and un-American then I
19	guess you will be voting against this
20	appointment since
21	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Absolutely not, I
22	agree with appointing people to the Board and -
23	-
24	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Because you were
25	appointed.

1	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: That is fine.
2	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Supervisor Santino, you
3	Father was his Chief of Staff.
4	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Okay, my Father Page 96
5	didn't have a vote. I don't know what that had
6	to do with it.
7	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: We are talking about
8	being appointed to seats.
9	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: You said my
10	appointment, obviously you think that the terms
11	and office differ from appointments.
12	The issue is the appointment, that is the
13	issue and that is that.
14	(Whereupon, applause from the audience was
15	heard. After, the following ensued.)
16	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Michael Turi is the
17	next slip.
18	(Whereupon, "that is what you get for
19	giving her a compliment," was heard yelling out
20	from the audience. After, the following
21	ensued.)
22	MICHAEL TURI: Hi, there, thank you very
23	much, Madam Supervisor.
24	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Just state your name
25	and address.

1	MICHAEL TURI: Michael Turi, Woodmere.
2	Um, how many people sitting on this Board
3	were elected to their first election when they
4	filled they filled this office?
5	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Two.
6	MICHAEL TURI: Show of hands, please.
7	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: She is not on the Town
8	Board.
9	She is the Town Clerk. Three people
10	sitting on the dais.
11	MICHAEL TURI: Town Board Members, how many
12	people?
13	SENIOR COUNCILWOMAN GOOSBY: Okay, I just
14	wanted to straighten you out. I got here
15	through a lawsuit that went to the Supreme Court
16	of the United States of America, that is how I
17	got here.
18	Are you familiar with that?
19	(Whereupon, applause from the audience was
20	heard. After, the following ensued.)
21	SENIOR COUNCILWOMAN GOOSBY: Are you
22	familiar with that?
23	MICHAEL TURI: I am, yes, the creation of
24	at large councilmanic districts, I am aware of
25	it.

1	SENIOR COUNCILWOMAN GOOSBY: That is how I
2	got, here, otherwise, I would not be here and
3	neither would they.
4	MICHAEL TURI: Okay, well, is the, um, $Page \mid 98$
5	potential incoming appointee in the room, today?
6	Is Mr. Muscarella, here?
7	We are asking the Board to vote on someone,
8	essentially, a job.
9	Did he show up?
10	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: I believe he is here.
11	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: If he is approved by
12	this Board, he will be sworn in immediately.
13	He will take a seat and he will sit through
14	Public Comment.
15	MICHAEL TURI: But, he didn't feel a need
16	to sit through this public comment to hear from
17	people before he took an oath of office?
18	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: I am confident that
19	he is watching or both, listening.
20	MICHAEL TURI: I am less confident.
21	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: I have a little
22	better knowledge than you, let's say ninety
23	percent that he is either listening or watching.
24	MICHAEL TURI: Let me continue on.
25	How many people from the legislative

1	District that he will potentially be appointed to
2	have spoken already at this point, today, anyone
3	know? Right, you were asking their addresses.
4	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: I believe, two and $Page \mid 99$
5	maybe you.
6	MICHAEL TURI: I am not in his district.
7	I couldn't speak to that, per say.
8	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Mr. Philips is from
9	Elmont.
10	SENIOR COUNCILWOMAN GOOSBY: Not in his
11	District.
12	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Ms. Williams is from
13	Elmont and she said she was in Mr. Ambrosino's
14	District. Mr. Tweedy is here from the District
15	and I don't know if you are, Mr. Turi.
16	MICHAEL TURI: I am not.
17	I am from Mr. D'Esposito's district, so,
18	two people have been on record, maybe three that
19	will stand on the record about this potential
20	appointment.
21	How can we be talking about putting up
22	American Flags and yet enfranchisement about
23	what the American Flag stands for, does not seem
24	to be in the course of action when you fill
25	people to seats that they are about to be

1	or wish to be elected to.
2	I can say that someone will be elected to
3	it. I do believe that someone has incumbency
4	advantage prior to their election. $\overline{Page \mid 100}$
5	They are given an unfair layup into the
6	seat.
7	I fear that will happen with Mr.
8	Muscarella.
9	I don't know what his particular
10	qualifications are.
11	I believe he runs just what I read, he
12	runs an insurance company.
13	He is a Little League Coach.
14	Those are good qualities. I don't know
15	exactly how they make someone qualified to be a
16	Town Board Member.
17	That being said, I will stop it there.
18	The people have the right to choose who
19	their representative are.
20	They don't necessarily want people telling
21	them who they are going to have.
22	Finally, I just want to ask a question on
23	an item while I am here, Item 18 about North
24	Lawrence and Inwood Overlay, Mr. Blakeman, I was
25	fortunate enough to attend the Town community

1	Forum that was held at my kindergarten
2	(Whereupon, the three minute bell rang.
3	After, the following ensued.)
4	MICHAEL TURI: It says there is going to be
5	a HUB hearing, was it on May 7 th ?
6	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Yes.
7	MICHAEL TURI: So, the May $7^{ m th}$ meeting as of
8	right, now, as is this one, as the one after it,
9	are all in the morning, would you say that the
10	majority of the residents that live who live
11	in that District can get off of work to come
12	here and put their opinion on the record for the
13	trans-overlay?
14	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Well, that is a very
15	good question and as you said, you were at the
16	meeting that we held, so, we held an evening
17	meeting.
18	MICHAEL TURI: That is right, it was very
19	informative.
20	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: We are not required
21	by law, but, I thought it was important not only
22	did we hold a meeting in the evening, we went
23	the extra step and provided direct notice to the
24	surrounding community by sending them a letter
25	informing them of he meeting so that they

1	would be available.
2	We also had an evening meeting with key
3	stakeholders.
4	We met with, um, the MTA. We met with NICE $^{ m Page} 102$
5	bus.
6	We met with the Mayor of Lawrence.
7	We met with the Mayor of Cedarhurst. We
8	met with the Inwood Civic Association, the
9	Lawrence/Cedarhurst Fire Department, the Inwood
10	Fire Department and a variety of other
11	stakeholders in the community which we had at
12	night and we had a meeting.
13	At that point, we discussed it.
14	With respect to your specific question, we
15	have found that there is no material difference
16	whatsoever in attendance at meetings in the Town
17	Hall for regular Board Meetings, whether it be
18	at night or during the day.
19	It is usually the same amount or pretty
20	close to the same amount of people.
21	So, um, we did have evening meetings and,
22	um, the public has been informed and we have had
23	no secret about what we want to do.
24	I am happy that my unofficial poll is at
25	ninety-five percent of the people that live

1	in that community are for it.
2	MICHAEL TURI: Okay, I don't directly live
3	there, so, I couldn't speak to that, but, I will
4	say that I felt the meeting was informative. $Page \mid 103$
5	I appreciate that things were sent out to
6	inform the community of the meeting.
7	I guess would it be possible to send things
8	out to where all the residents about the May
9	$7^{ m th}$ Public Hearing so they could potentially come
10	to that, if they don't know about it already?
11	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Well, we will think
12	about that, but, we don't want to get in the
13	practice of doing that.
14	It is very expensive. We wanted to do it
15	one time before we have the Public Hearing so we
16	would get the community's input if we had to
17	tweak anything and we have tweaked some of the
18	plans based on some of the public comments.
19	If We start doing that, it would get too
20	expensive.
21	Every application you could say we should
22	mail to people and it is about, I think, .50
23	cents a letter.
24	So, it is kind of expensive. So, thank you
25	for bringing that up.

1	I appreciate it.
2	MICHAEL TURI: Thank you for taking the
3	time to hear me speak and have a lovely day.
4	Thank you. Page 104
5	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Thank you.
6	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Thank you.
7	Mr. Conroy, would you, please come forward
8	for a moment.
9	Good afternoon, Mr. Conroy. So, I just
10	have a couple questions about some of the
11	personnel actions that are in this agenda and I
12	just wanted to confirm with you that all of the
13	personnel items that have been put forward by
14	the Parks Department, you signed off, that there
15	are no funds, is that correct?
16	COMPTROLLER CONROY: I did and I wanted to
17	add my responsibility is to determine if there
18	are funds available and it is limited to funds
19	available.
20	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: There are no funds
21	available for any of the personnel actions that
22	are proposed by the Parks Department?
23	COMPTROLLER CONROY: Right.
24	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Also, I have brought
25	with me a copy of the budget.

1	Ms. Hanson, would you please hand this to
2	the Commissioner.
3	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Excuse me,
4	Supervisor, if I might interject, there are no
5	funds directly in the Parks Department, but, as
6	you explained at the last meeting, at the end of
7	the year we settle up between various
8	departments.
9	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: I didn't explain that,
10	maybe you explained that.
11	I didn't explain that.
12	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: I didn't say "you,"
13	he did. He did. You explained that it is
14	normal operating procedure for most
15	municipalities to settle up at the end of the
16	year.
17	We are looking at various departments, some
18	will have a surplus, some will have a slight
19	deficit and we settle and we prepare the next
20	budget, correct?
21	COMPTROLLER CONROY: Correct.
22	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: It is not we don't
23	have the money, it is just it might not be in
24	that particular place and if there is a need
25	that we didn't anticipate when we pass the

1	Budget, we shouldn't be paralyzed about that if
2	there are sufficient funds in, at least, that we
3	can settle up with at the end of the year, is
4	that correct? Page 106
5	COMPTROLLER CONROY: Yes.
6	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: But, is it fair to say,
7	Mr. Conroy, that the reason you develop a budget
8	is to project where you would like to be in and
9	the amount of money you like to spend each year
10	and as individual homeowners, as individuals, as
11	a municipality, we should try to live within a
12	budget because we set a budget because that is
13	the expectation of what you are supposed to be
14	spending each year?
15	COMPTROLLER CONROY: A budget, Supervisor,
16	in all due respect is a projection.
17	It is exactly what you just laid out.
18	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: It is a projection,
19	yes.
20	COMPTROLLER CONROY: It is a projection.
21	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: But, it is a
22	projection, do you make projections so you can
23	just say we don't care about these numbers and
24	spend and spend and it doesn't matter?
25	COMPTROLLER CONROY: Absolutely, no,

1	the Comptroller's Office puts forth a very
2	responsible projection, a budget, in fact, we
3	have been cited often as to our conservative
4	practices regarding our budget. Page $\mid 107$
5	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: And, would you say it
6	is conservative to try to live within the
7	projections in your budget?
8	COMPTROLLER CONROY: I am sorry?
9	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: In the conservative
10	practices to try to live within the projections
11	that are in a budget, is that fiscally
12	responsible?
13	COMPTROLLER CONROY: That is fiscally
14	responsible based on how you laid out your
15	projections, things change during the course of
16	the year.
17	One thing we don't know, I don't have it in
18	front of me, how many retirements happened in
19	the Parks Department.
20	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: If you could pause
21	for one moment, I think, Mr. Sammon delved into
22	the issue to determine whether there would be
23	money available.
24	Mr. Sammon, would you come forward and tell
25	us why you signed off on this?

1	DIRECTOR SAMMON: Good Afternoon,
2	Supervisor, Members of the Board:
3	I have been Director of Human Resources for
4	32 years. Page 108
5	Each year we have, obviously, um, approved
6	personnel changes to the current budget at the
7	time.
8	It has never been a problem historically
9	because as Councilman Blakeman just described,
10	there is a reconciliation that takes place at
11	the end of the year where money is moved around
12	to cover unanticipated expenses in the personnel
13	lines.
14	Life has a way of interfering with the best
15	laid plans and we adapt to them and we have
16	methods to adapt to it.
17	In this particular instance, there were
18	five resolutions from the Parks Department in
19	the Personnel Calendar.
20	I took a look at the retirements, so far to
21	date, I looked at the less savings that were
22	projected for the Parks Department, it was 1.4
23	million to date.
24	I believe there is almost eight hundred
25	thousand in retirements that have been realized

1	and we are not even halfway through the year.
2	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: In the Parks
3	Department?
4	DIRECTOR SAMMON: Right, so, I believe the $^{ m Page} 109$
5	Town of Hempstead will function correctly and
6	appropriately with having to amend the budget,
7	here and thereto meet the needs of the Park.
8	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: But under the concept
9	of less savings, we are taking money out of the
10	budget because people are retiring and we are
11	not supposed to be replacing those people, so, I
12	don't understand how you are saying because they
13	are retirements, there is additional money in
14	the budget because we are not supposed to be
15	spending the money under the theory of less
16	savings.
17	DIRECTOR SAMMON: Any of these amounts are
18	less than we are realizing from the retirements.
19	As, I said, historically, there is year-end
20	reconciliations.
21	To my knowledge, there has never been a
22	problem.
23	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: So, projections don't
24	really matter?
25	We don't have to live within a budget?

1	Let's throw everything out, there with
2	respect to the budget.
3	Ms. Hanson, do you have the budget?
4	Mr. Conroy, could you, please take a look
5	at the budget.
6	I tried to flag the area.
7	Could you, please, tell me where in the
8	budget, if anywhere, a second Deputy
9	Commissioner in Senior Enrichment is budgeted
10	for?
11	This move was not discussed with my office.
12	The work order came over on Thursday.
13	Could you, please, tell me how there is funding
14	to support this move for Ms. Pugliese from
15	Councilman Blakeman's Office to become a Deputy
16	Commissioner in Senior Enrichment?
17	It was based on the current employees
18	fulltime payroll in Senior Enrichment is over
19	budgeted by three million dollars and because of
20	less savings, only 2.8, roughly is budgeted.
21	So, how can you say there is funding for
22	this move?
23	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Mr. Conroy
24	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: I am asking a question.
25	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: I understand that.

1	And, certainly acknowledge your right to
2	ask that question.
3	I am sure he will answer, but beforehand, I
4	just like to set the stage for what occurred. $^{ m Page} 111$
5	First of all, um, Debbie Pugliese has
6	worked for me in excess of two years.
7	She worked more than forty-hour weeks.
8	She probably worked fifty to sixty-hour
9	weeks.
10	She is the lowest paid Chief of Staff or
11	Executive Assistant or whatever the title is for
12	any Member of the Board.
13	And, basically, um, I discussed with her a
14	raise and I discussed with her additional duties
15	and she indicated to me that it was her life-
16	long dream to work with our senior citizens.
17	And, that she had an affinity towards
18	working in Senior Enrichment.
19	As a matter of fact, unfortunately, a close
20	friend of hers that she took care of in the
21	community, I think she is ninety years old,
22	passed away.
23	Debbie was the primary care giver.
24	This is something that she wanted to do and
25	I enthusiastically support her, although,

1	I am going to be very disappointed and at a
2	disadvantage not having her working for me
3	because she was outstanding in her work,
4	especially constituent work, as Ms. Williams $^{ extsf{Page} 112}$
5	indicated.
6	So, um, she had this dream. My
7	understanding was the money was available, that
8	the title was available and certainly people who
9	excel here in the Town of Hempstead should be
10	entitled to pursue their dreams and advancement.
11	So, I enthusiastically support it.
12	So, Mr. Conroy, you can answer the
13	question, but, that is the premise of why and I
14	will tell you she was by far the lowest paid
15	person doing the same work that anybody else did
16	on the $4^{ t th}$ floor.
17	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: I will respond to that;
18	maybe all of that maybe true.
19	Certainly I support workers of the Town of
20	Hempstead seeing their dreams and their career
21	advancement fulfilled.
22	Eight Tozner people were rejected by this
23	Board last week.
24	Their dreams were not fulfilled because
25	they have been waiting for years to become

1	Fulltime from part-time.
2	And, um, in terms of Ms. Pugliese, this is
3	no comment on Ms. Pugliese.
4	$_{ m Page} 113$ She could be the most fantastic worker that
5	we have here.
6	What I am asking is nowhere in the budget
7	is there a request for a second Deputy
8	Commissioner and I never heard anything about
9	these dreams until right, now.
10	And, this wasn't discussed with me until
11	Thursday when I got the paperwork for this.
12	Um, I do have to correct something, I think
13	I misspoke the current payroll in Senior
14	Enrichment is budgeted and projected to be over
15	three million dollars because of less savings
16	only 2.8 million is budgeted so we are adding
17	another employee.
18	So, I think I may have misspoke.
19	I just want to clarify that.
20	So, just if you could tell me is there
21	anywhere in that budget a salary for a second
22	Deputy Commissioner in Senior Enrichment
23	budgeted?
24	COMPTROLLER CONROY: Supervisor, can we
25	just go back to the numbers.

1	You just cited, I kind of disagree with
2	what you just said.
3	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Could you, please, step
4	over. Thank you.
5	You can respond.
6	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Why don't you let him
7	answer and she can add.
8	COMPTROLLER CONROY: The total budget in
9	the Senior Enrichment for the labor dollars,
10	salary and wages, the grand total is three
11	million two hundred and eighty-seven thousand
12	dollars.
13	Part and parcel to that is less savings.
14	Less savings being retirements we
15	anticipate during the course of the year, that
16	we will avoid those salaries that is three
17	hundred and twenty thousand dollars.
18	Prior to less savings, had that not been
19	factored in, the total salary would be 3.6
20	million dollars.
21	I think you mentioned a number of 2.6.
22	I just wanted, for the record, to clarify
23	that.
24	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Mr. Sammon, will Ms.
25	Pugliese be the lowest paid Deputy Commissioner

1	in the Town of Hempstead?
2	DIRECTOR SAMMON: Yes, sir.
3	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Thank you.
4	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: It is not about her, $Page \mid 115$
5	what her pay is comparative to other Deputy
6	Commissioners, it is about whether or not if
7	this is something in the budget, whether this is
8	something we anticipated.
9	The Commissioner of Senior Enrichment
10	didn't say when we did the budgeting process, I
11	need a second Deputy Commissioner.
12	We are creating a position that is not
13	budgeted to fill Ms. Pugliese's dreams.
14	I have no problem with her having her
15	dreams fulfilled and moving over to Senior
16	Enrichment, but, we have to have the money for
17	it.
18	And, there has to be a position available.
19	Ms. Smith, can you speak to those numbers,
20	please.
21	(Whereupon, "use the microphone," was heard
22	calling out from the audience. After, the
23	following ensued.)
24	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Mr. Sammon, would you
25	let Ms. Smith sit there, please.

1	MS. SMITH: Good Afternoon, Members of the
2	Board.
3	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Please, speak into the
4	microphone, Ms. Smith. Page 116
5	MS. SMITH: Sure, so, adopted budget has a
6	total budgeted payroll, now, payroll has several
7	components that are not budgeable; longevity,
8	part-time and, um, the buy backs, so, all of
9	that is included in the 3.2 million currently
10	budgeted for Senior Enrichment.
11	The line for fulltime, which is where we
12	are, um, adjusting for less savings because
13	presumably it is the fulltime folks that are
14	expected to leave.
15	That number was grossed in the budget at
16	3.17 with less savings which is three hundred
17	and thirty thousand.
18	The budgeted number, the new budgeted
19	number, is, now, 2.8 million looking at the
20	folks who are on staff, today, which will end
21	the year at three million, so, we are trending
22	to go over budgeted strictly on the fulltime
23	line.
24	So, now, if you take payroll, no, we are
25	not there, yet.

1	If you look at the fulltime, which is where
2	the less savings adjustments come from, you will
3	be over budgeted on the Senior Enrichment
4	fulltime line. Page 117
5	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Thank you.
6	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: So, Ms. Smith, I have
7	a question for you, you are the person
8	responsible for preparing the Supervisor's
9	budget, is that correct?
10	MS. SMITH: The Supervisor doesn't have a
11	different budget.
12	There is only one budget.
13	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: No, the Supervisor
14	has to propose a budget under Town Code.
15	MS. SMITH: Correct.
16	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: She will propose a
17	budget, correct?
18	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: In conjunction with our
19	Comptroller.
20	We work collaboratively with our
21	Comptroller and every Commissioner in the Town
22	of Hempstead to come up with a budget.
23	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Ms. Smith is your
24	representative in that group, correct?
25	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Ms. Smith is my

1	Financial Advisor.
2	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Okay, let's not play
3	games, she is, right?
4	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: There are no games. $Page \mid 118$
5	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: I am not just
6	questioning your qualifications; you are the one
7	that is responsible?
8	MS. SMITH: Sorry?
9	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: You are the one that
10	is responsible to bring it all together, to put
11	forth the Supervisor's budget?
12	MS. SMITH: Not again, I work with the
13	Comptroller's Department, yes, to put it
14	together.
15	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Yes?
16	MS. SMITH: Yes.
17	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: It is not a trick
18	question.
19	MS. SMITH: Okay.
20	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Basically, you
21	anticipate based on what you have seen so far in
22	the first four-plus months, that the Supervisor
23	will be proposing a tax increase or will the
24	Supervisor be proposing a flat tax?
25	MS. SMITH: I have no idea.

1	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: We are not preparing
2	our budget.
3	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Let me finish, if we
4	are in danger, do you anticipate that at the end
5	of the year that the Supervisor will propose an
6	increase in taxes?
7	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Ms. Smith, I will tell
8	you not to answer that question.
9	We are not going to make a guess.
10	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: I am sorry, she got
11	up at the microphone.
12	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: And, she is talking
13	about the numbers in the budget.
14	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: She is qualified.
15	Don't act as her lawyer.
16	(Whereupon, applause from the audience was
17	heard. After, the following ensued.)
18	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: I am sure you can
19	answer the question.
20	MS. SMITH: With the adjustment of 8.1
21	million that was made by the Board, looking at
22	the payroll every week has been becoming
23	something that we are doing to make sure that
24	the Supervisor gets to what the Board has
25	restricted as the amount of payroll.

1	Um, that means, perhaps, she has to cut
2	back on some of the spending in order to get
3	there.
4	I don't Page 120
5	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Get where? Get
6	where?
7	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Live with the less
8	savings budget that you put in the budget.
9	MS. SMITH: Live with the 8.1 million that
10	was adjusted to the amounts that total the
11	fulltime salaries, um, in October
12	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Do you know who the
13	rating agencies are?
14	(Whereupon, "oh, my God," was heard calling
15	out from the audience. After, the following
16	ensued.)
17	MS. SMITH: Um, are you speaking of
18	Moody's?
19	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Yes.
20	MS. SMITH: Yes, I am familiar.
21	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Their outlook was
22	positive.
23	MS. SMITH: Absolutely.
24	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Is there any reason
25	why you disagree with them?

1	Do you think we will have a positive
2	outlook this year?
3	MS. SMITH: Again, respectfully, you have
4	to mange the budget and part of what the $Page \mid 121$
5	Supervisor is doing is managing the budget.
6	The budget doesn't happen
7	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Excuse me, I am
8	sorry, I am interrupting
9	MS. SMITH: No, no, the Supervisor can't
10	just sign off, at least, I am the person that
11	gives her some guidance on financing matters.
12	She can't continue to sign off on positions
13	that were not budgeted and expect to be where
14	the Board would like her to be based on the
15	adopted budget.
16	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Thank you, Ms. Smith.
17	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: There is nothing
18	right, now, that is alarming, correct?
19	MS. SMITH: No, let's not say that.
20	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Other than the fact
21	that you know the State wanted to take four
22	million-dollars-worth of aid from the Town.
23	There is nothing that is alarming.
24	MS. SMITH: If we look on a departmental
25	basis, there are some departments because

1	of significant payouts that are in trouble,
2	frankly.
3	Hopefully spending, um, restrictions and
4	pending restrictions in other areas will get u $^{\mbox{Page} 122}$
5	to where we should be for the Town.
6	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Thank you.
7	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: I just have a quick
8	question, if I may.
9	Mr. Conroy, obviously, knowing your
10	history, um, I have full faith in the work that
11	you do.
12	Ms. Smith, I don't know you that well. I
13	know from your resume you worked in other
14	Democratic Administrations, just asking both of
15	you, in the years in municipalities, practicing
16	municipal financing and putting together
17	municipal budgets, is end of year reconciliation
18	accepted practice?
19	COMPTROLLER CONROY: It is.
20	Can I make a few comments regarding what
21	has been said here in the last few minutes with
22	regard to less savings, it is interesting that
23	we bring that topic up, now, because I was going
24	over the numbers with my staff this morning,
25	less savings in the budget was 8.2 million

1	Dollars which is a reduction in the salary line,
2	what we anticipate to be retirements and/or
3	those who leave service with the Town of
4	Hempstead. Page 123
5	We are better than halfway home.
6	We are more than four million dollars in
7	voided salaries and that is only after the first
8	quarter of the year.
9	(Whereupon, applause from the audience was
10	heard. After, the following ensued.)
11	COMPTROLLER CONROY: I think and I argue
12	vehemently my budget process, the appropriate
13	thing to do is factor in less savings because we
14	know in the course of the year and we have
15	history in this regard, that we will have
16	retirements and the budget does not call for a
17	partial budgeting of a position.
18	It calls for the full year, so, less
19	savings is, in fact, the appropriate thing to
20	do.
21	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Actually, Mr. Conroy,
22	when you prepared the budget with us, we took
23	less savings out.
24	COMPTROLLER CONROY: Right.
25	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: It was Mr. Mastromarino

1	who put less savings back in.
2	COMPTROLLER CONROY: I agree with the
3	decision that he took then and I stand behind
4	that and the numbers will, in fact, prove it $^{ m Page} 124$
5	out.
6	In fact, in the prior budget 2018 budget,
7	which factored in ten million dollars for less
8	savings, the actual number and Supervisor, I
9	have a meeting with you next week, it is eleven
10	million dollars.
11	We did one million dollars better than we
12	had projected and that is in line with the
13	conservative budget practices.
14	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: That is because I was
15	managing the budget, that is, in fact, true.
16	Thank you, Mr. Conroy.
17	Thank you, Ms. Smith.
18	I like to thank you for keeping a careful
19	eye on payroll and trying to make us live within
20	our budget.
21	Thank you, Ms. Smith.
22	Mr. Procacci?
23	FELIX PROCACCI: Felix Procacci. 1165
24	Barnes Street, Franklin Square, New York.
25	Since we are talking about budgeted

1	positions, Edward Ra and his wife were both given
2	job positions that didn't exist in the budget
3	prior to their hire and his wife actually two
4	times when she got transferred to the Civil $Page \mid 125$
5	Service Department.
6	That position did not exist, so, you know,
7	that is a fact.
8	Then, Mr. Blakeman, who represents anybody,
9	I called him five times during the budget week
10	and he didn't respond to any of the calls.
11	So, I am not represented any way, so that
12	is a fact.
13	And, I don't want to hear from you.
14	I don't want to hear from you.
15	COUNCILMAN DUNNE: You never called me or
16	my office, so, don't come here and lie.
17	Your credibility is shot.
18	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Let Mr. Procacci
19	finish, please.
20	FELIX PROCACCI: Go away.
21	I agree with all the comments, Tammie an
22	Aubrey made, um, the cost of a special election
23	would be cost prohibited, especially, in this
24	case where there would be an election seat in
25	November.

1	The fact of holding onto Michael Deery for
2	an additional nine months, holding onto Cheryl
3	Petri, she has held four different positions, I
4	$_{ m quess}$ guess, in the last eighteen months, so, we don't
5	know where to put her, that was one hundred
6	thirty-five thousand dollars, one hundred and
7	fifty thousand.
8	At least, Michael Deery, not including the
9	benefits that more than paid for many special
10	elections, we can have, but we are only budgeted
11	for stuff that we care ab out and we don't care
12	about special elections.
13	And, as far as leaving it vacant, everybody
14	here was fine when Angie Cullen for six months
15	was absent without leave, so, the idea we care
16	about
17	COUNCILWOMAN KING-SWEENEY: Angie Cullen,
18	she has since passed away.
19	She was an amazing public servant. You are
20	out of line.
21	FELIX PROCACCI: I am not criticizing her.
22	COUNCILWOMAN KING-SWEENEY: You are out of
23	line.
24	FELIX PROCACCI: I am not criticizing her.
25	COUNCILWOMAN KING-SWEENEY: You are out

1	of line. Stop and apologize. She was sick.
2	FELIX PROCACCI: And, you replaced her in
3	July. You knew she was sick.
4	Anyway Page 127
5	COUNCILWOMAN KING-SWEENEY: The
6	Councilwoman Angie Cullin, there are HIPA law.
7	Please, be respectful. You have crossed the
8	line and you are rude.
9	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: I believe Mr. Procacci
10	was making the point her seat was vacant. I
11	don't think he was insulting Ms. Cullin.
12	COUNCILWOMAN KING-SWEENEY: It was not
13	vacant. She was there. She happened to be
14	going through some medical issues that were none
15	of your business.
16	It has nothing to do with you and she has
17	since passed away.
18	She was an amazing public servant. So,
19	stop being rude.
20	(Whereupon, applause from the audience was
21	heard. After, the following ensued.)
22	FELIX PROCACCI: The Gillen versus the
23	Town of Hempstead litigation that the Town is,
24	now, thinking about appealing is going to cost
25	tens of thousands of dollars, one hundred

1	thousand dollars.
2	This is more money that is not necessary
3	and erroneous about this.

17	out the cost of special elections, that is the
18	statement made by in Newsday, people who
19	are for this
20	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: You are just
21	talking about
22	FELIX PROCACCI: Oh my God, oh, my God.
23	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Mr. Procacci, please,
24	calm down.
25	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Felix

1	FELIX PROCACCI: On the Ethics law just
2	shut up, just shut up.
3	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Happy Easter.
4	FELIX PROCACCI: Go to hell. Page 129
5	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Mr. Procacci, speak out
6	like that one more time, I am going to have to
7	ask you to leave.
8	(Whereupon, "shut up," was heard yelling
9	out from the audience. After, the following
10	ensued.)
11	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Please, let's behalf in
12	a civilized manner. Please, do not speak out
13	from the gallery.
14	If you scream out, once, you will get a
15	warning. If you scream out, again, you will be
16	asked to leave.
17	Barbara Thomas?
18	BARBARA THOMAS: Good Morning, Barbara
19	Thomas, Massapequa, New York.
20	And, I am here to support Ashley Behrens.
21	I am very excited about this, um, Resolution to
22	hire her at the Town of Hempstead.
23	She has a proven record of success. She is
24	also awesome with people.
25	She is awesome with animals and she

1	has a tremendous support system here on Long
2	Island and I support the resolution and I thank
3	you. She is awesome.
4	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Thank you, Ms. Thomas. Page $\mid 130$
5	Brett Murray? Michael Lasore?
6	Meta Mereday?
7	META MEREDAY: Meta Mereday, Baldwin
8	resident.
9	We are on the Administrative Calendar?
10	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: We are on the
11	Administrative Calendar.
12	META MEREDAY: Yes, with regard to my
13	ongoing request, on these contracts that I asked
14	it is a simple, simple request for these
15	contracts that are being awarded, if we could
16	possible designate if it MBE, WBE, service
17	disabled owned business, so, I can, at least
18	have some hope that there is diversity.
19	With regard to the procurement process,
20	overall, I have a question about Number 28, I
21	just wanted to get some details.
22	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: So, on that Item
23	Number 28, you already approved, um the sale of

20	META MEREDAY: For thirty-two thousand
21	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: It is underwater
22	property.
23	META MEREDAY: As most of our residents are
24	aware and does that remove us from the
25	responsibility as to the taxes?

1	(Whereupon, "it is municipality property,"
2	calling out from the audience. After, the
3	following ensued.)
4	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: It is municipality Page 132
5	property and it is, now, going to be conveyed to
6	Long Beach.
7	(Whereupon, "it was never on the tax roll,"
8	was heard calling out from the audience. After,
9	the following ensued.)
10	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: It was never on the tax
11	roll.
12	META MEREDAY: Okay, okay, I encouraged
13	with regard to the upcoming overlay projects,
14	um, but, again, my request is consistent with
15	having procurement that is inclusive and
16	hopefully that is within the Code of Ethics
17	since the discussion is focused more so on
18	employment and family relations.
19	I am hoping that the vetting process is
20	under review, that the process entails that with
21	regard to procurement and that we look at
22	qualifications and diversity inclusion versus
23	the family relationships.
24	The upcoming Hearings, I am also very
25	encouraged by that and look forward

1	to working with all respective entities for the
2	Hearings on May $21^{\rm st}$ and those further as it
3	pertains to development efforts that are
4	inclusive of, um, other aspects, residents who $$^{\mbox{\sc Page} 133}$$
5	are trying to make a difference within the
6	community.
7	So, I am encouraged by all of that, okay.
8	Thank you.
9	COUNCILMAN DUNNE: Ms. Mereday, before you

14	META MEREDAY: Sure, no problem.

6	But, I also appreciate your efforts with
7	regard to the budget.
8	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Thank you, Ms. Mereday.
9	Diane Madden?
10	DIANE MADDEN: Diane Madden. I would also
11	like to speak on the Hearing of Ashley Behrens
12	from Brookhaven.
13	I do support this Resolution, um, I think
14	that many of us have been on the edge of our
15	seats because we were told that Christie Bronty
16	applied for this position.
17	I think this Board has come a long way and,
18	um, you know, I think, also that she is going to
19	need our continued support.
20	She is going to need authority.

18	job I hope that is not her plan.

20	continue the pattern of sending her animals from
21	one cage to a crate to warehouse somewhere.
22	I am hoping hat her philosophy, um, matches
23	ours and that her standards and her expectations
24	and animal care an welfare are aligned with the
25	people that have come here since 20110 to speak

1	on their behalf.
2	I, um, I also hope that she would bring
3	even further transparency.
4	I am concerned that everything needs to be $^{ m Page} 136$
5	in the open.
6	Nothing should be in secrecy.
7	Nothing should be in the back out of the
8	hands of people that care about those animals.
9	That shelter should be transparent and it
10	should start tomorrow when she starts.
11	Hopefully, that is the direction I hope
12	this Board will go.
13	Um, I do hope that they will keep their
14	commitment if Ashley does the job that everyone
15	is expecting her to do to move Mr. Pastore out
16	of our animal shelter and move him.
17	I don't care where you move him.
18	I don't want to pay his salary and keep him
19	as far away from animals as far as you can.
20	Lastly, I, um, I hope that Ashley
21	understands that although the many people that
22	come here and speak about animals primarily
23	speak about dogs, they actually have cats.
24	We actually care about those cats. We want
25	those cats to have equal opportunity for

1	medical treatment, for placement and anything that
2	those cats need, equal to what the dogs have
3	been receiving. Thank you and I encourage you
4	to pass this resolution and look forward to $^{ m Page} 137$
5	moving forward.
6	(Whereupon, the three-minute bell rang.
7	After, the following ensued.)
8	DIANE MADDEN: I hope Ashley will pick up
9	the phone first thing and demand there is no
10	politicizing our animal shelter anymore.
11	Number 2, that she gets on the phone with
12	two people that are out, right, now, that are so
13	distraught emotionally from what is going on at
14	that shelter, animal lovers and I hope she will
15	pick up the phone and say, I want you to return
16	because we are, now, on the upswing.
17	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Mary Ellen Kreye?
18	MARY ELLEN KREYE: Mary Ellen Kreye. 436
19	Locust Avenue, Uniondale.
20	Two items, I never been in favor of the
21	appointments to political positions and so I
22	definitely oppose this particular appointment.
23	And, I think that the suggestion of putting
24	the special election or a special election with
25	a Primary, would work very well.

1	The other item is Number 27 which is about
2	the Saint Michael's home, we have been very much
3	involved.
4	I am in favor. Thank you.
5	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Thank you, Ms. Kreye.
6	Ms. Defina?
7	LUCILLE DEFINA: Good Afternoon. I am also
8	here speaking about Item 32, about the hiring of
9	Ashley Behrens for the Assistant Director's
10	position.
11	Um, I do not know her.
12	I am just reading different comments about
13	here and listening to what people know of her
14	and it sounds very promising.
15	My concern is anytime you hire someone, how
16	is it going to work when you still have the
17	majority of people in there, who are working

control or always had the control of information
and feed people lines and brainwashed the entire
staff, is that going to happen, again?

So, I do not understand how anyone can be successful under that roof until you removed the poison that has taken over that shelter and it starts with Pastore.

3	I do not have any other slips on the

6	(Whereupon, no response was heard. After,
7	the following ensued.)
8	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Supervisor, at this
9	time, I would like to move the Administrative
10	Calendar with the exception of Item 20 and that
11	be adjourned without date.
12	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Second.
13	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Madam Clerk, will you,
14	please, call the roll.
15	CLERK CABANA: Supervisor Gillen?

12	candidate the power of incumbency.
13	Unfortunately, that proposal was voted
14	down.
15	Today, the majority has put forward, Mr.
16	Muscarella, a declared candidate for the Town
17	Council.
18	I urge all of the Members of this Board to
19	reconsider appointment by appointment is wrong
20	in many ways.
21	Business as usual should not happen.
22	Voters have the right to choose their
23	elected officials, not you.
24	Granting incumbency to someone already on
25	the ballot sends a message that this Town does

1	not want to change but our residents know and they
2	want better.
3	They will see through this move as they
4	have seen so many tings things that are going on $^{ m Page} 142$
5	in Hempstead and the Administration that wants to
6	be accountable and transparent to residents.
7	I do not support this move to tip the
8	scales in November.
9	I also on Item Number 32, I vote yes to
10	everything except for all of the personnel actions
11	related to the Parks Department as the Comptroller
12	indicated, there is no money in the budget for
13	these, um, moves.
14	Um, I have the responsibility to administer
15	the budget and try to live within the budget that
16	we have.
17	The fact that we can move money around at
18	the end of the years is no comfort to me.
19	I also vote against the transfer of Ms.
20	Pugliese to the Senior Enrichment Department.
21	Again, I have no issue with Ms. Pugliese
22	and this is no comment on her work performance,
23	but, the Senior Enrichment Department has
24	projected to be overbudgeted on fulltime salaries.
25	This addition will put them further

1	Overbudget and all my discussion with the
2	Commissioner over the last year plus the
3	Department of Senior Enrichment has repeatedly
4	asked for us to help them, folks to deliver $$\operatorname{\textsc{Page}} 143$$
5	services to our Seniors.
6	They asked for bus drivers.
7	They have asked for programing. They have
8	asked for people to deliver services to residents
9	and I agree with that focus.
10	The budget put forward by the Town Council
11	cut fulltime payroll and Senior Enrichment by
12	three hundred and thirty thousand dollars, making
13	it difficult for us to serve our Seniors as we
14	needed the monies going to be spent.
15	If we are going to be moving money around
16	after the fact, it should be spent on service
17	delivery staff, not unbudgeted management
18	positions, so, I vote no on that.
19	And, yes on everything else.
20	(Whereupon, applause from the audience was
21	heard. After, the following ensued.)
22	CLERK CABANA: Councilman Blakeman?
23	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Aye.
24	CLERK CABANA: Councilman D'Esposito?
25	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Before I vote,

1	I just want to make another comment on the
2	appointment of Mr. Muscarella, much has been said
3	recently by Supervisor Laura Gillen and Mr. Tweedy
4	regarding the desirability of holding a special $^{ m Page} 144$
5	election to fill the vacant 2^{nd} Councilmanic seat.
6	However, it is fair to ask the Supervisor
7	and Mr. Tweedy where they stood and what actions
8	they took on the issue of appointments to vacant

20	Supervisor Gillen congratulated Underwood in
21	tweets.
22	Kirsten Gillibrand was appointed to the
23	United States Senate by Governor Patterson in
24	January of 2009 to fill a vacancy created when

Hillary Clinton was appointed Secretary

1	of State.
2	Peter Zuckerman, North Hempstead Councilman
3	for the $2^{ m nd}$ District was appointed to the North
4	Hempstead Town Board in January, 2004.
5	And, like I said before, I did leave a part
6	out, Ms. Gillen's running mate, Thomas Tweedy was
7	appointed to his first public office as a Floral
8	Park Trustee by former Mayor Ann Corbet in April,
9	2001, then as a Mayor, Mr. Tweedy not only
10	appointed two Members of the Village Board, as I
11	state earlier, one, Kevin Fitzgerald, April, 2011,
12	Second Lynn Pombonyo, who was appointed in
13	November of 2014, but there was a third to fill
