1	DAVE FATTIZZO: Good Morning, my name is
2	Dave Fattizzo and I am, here, on behalf of the
3	Long Island Association.
4	Page   16 Our President and CEO Kevin Long could not
5	make the event this morning, there, I will be
6	reading a letter on his behalf.
7	"Dear Supervisor Gillen and Members of the
8	Hempstead Town Board:
9	"The Long Island Association/LIA support
10	the approval of the local law establishing Chapter
11	74 of the Code of the Town of Hempstead entitled
12	"Community Choice Aggregation Energy Program,"
13	otherwise known as "CCA."
14	"The LIA supports CCA as it to be a useful
15	program to reduce energy costs for businesses and
16	residents in the Town of Hempstead.
17	"It is National Grid, our local gas utility
18	will still deliver gas to the customers' homes and
19	businesses and CCA will focus on the cost
20	reductions to the supply of gas in the Town.
21	"To that extent, competition is a
22	worthwhile deal to pursue.
23	"We wish the Town of Hempstead success with
24	this new initiate."
25	Thank you.

1	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Supervisor, I have a
2	couple of questions.
3	Thank you for coming, today.
4	Um, a couple of questions; first of all, $^{ m Page} 17$
5	who would be leading the negotiations?
6	DAVE FATTIZZO: These types of questions,
7	unfortunately, are above my pay grade, so, I would
8	appreciate if all questions would just be directed
9	to Kevin Long at a different time.
10	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Mr. Pitnick, would you
11	come up and Mr. Haber.
12	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Can they answer the
13	question?
14	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: I think they can.
15	SENIOR COUNCILWOMAN GOOSBY: That is what I
16	want to know, who negotiates?
17	ATTORNEY PITNICK: Good Morning, Counsel to
18	the Supervisor; the question is who would be doing
19	the negotiations with respect to what?
20	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: The Resolution says
21	that it would authorize the agent to negotiate and
22	enter into energy supply agreements with energy
23	service companies.
24	ATTORNEY PITNICK: So, the way the process
25	would work is the Town Board would establish

1	the ability to who established the $program$ ,
2	that is what this Local Law is and, then,
3	subsequently, there would be an RFP that would be
4	issued and come back to the Town Board for $Page \mid 18$
5	approval to award the RFP to the administrator,
6	who would be an agent on behalf of the Town to act
7	on our behalf to review the program to establish
8	an implementation program, um or plan and other
9	requisites that are required, um, by the public
10	service commission.
11	And, then, depending on how the Town Board
12	wants to act, either the agent from direction of
13	the Town Board would negotiate
14	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: This is enabling
15	legislation that if we wanted to set up a Board
16	that we could.
17	But, it is not setting up the Board.
18	I don't see the details with respect to the
19	Board.
20	Who would be on this Board?
21	ATTORNEY PITNICK: When you say, "the
22	Board", I am no sure actually what you are talking
23	about.
24	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: You indicated that
25	there would be a Board set up to administer this

1	or administer, you said.
2	ATTORNEY PITNICK: The Town would.
3	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Who is the
4	administrator?
5	ATTORNEY PITNICK: Town Board.
6	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: So, coming back as a
7	Resolution?
8	MR. HABER: Similar to the process of cost
9	control associating where the Town saved two
10	hundred thousand dollars, we, basically, passed a
11	Local Law and we went out for and RFP to hire the
12	administrator.
13	The Administrator goes and procures the
14	third party that provides gas through a
15	competitive open process and you approve those
16	rates.
17	And, the only way you would approve this is
18	if the Town saved a fair minimum of five percent.
19	We are looking to save for residents, one
20	hundred and thirty per resident.
21	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Before any action is
22	taken, there will be another resolution that will
23	come before the Board in full detail?
24	MR. HABER: Yes.
25	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Is there anything in

1	here that addresses the shortage of gas supply to
2	the Town, which I am hearing from a lot of
3	constituents is causing major problems with
4	respect to, um, economic growth, here?
5	MR. HABER: It is a big problem of supply.
6	There isn't enough natural gas for new
7	construction.
8	This just replaces currently supply with
9	National Grid.
10	There is no additional supply that is
11	coming in.
12	Basically, National Grid's bill has two
13	parts; a supply part, which is where they procure
14	the gas and the piping, where they administer,
15	they make their money on rates set by the State.
16	On the administration, they don't care
17	where the gas comes from, if they don't provide it
18	they, they will provide it from another third
19	party.
20	There is no additional gas coming into the
21	system.
22	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Well, that is a big
23	problem and we need to address that in the future.
24	I don't have any further questions.
25	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: So, I just want

1	to clarify, Mr. Haber, so this is exactly like the
2	kind of CCA Program that we approved last year so
3	we can negotiate better rates on behalf of the
4	Town. Page   21
5	And, this is just enabling us to negotiate
6	collectively on behalf of residents and businesses
7	within the Town to kind of what we did to set
8	benefits and savings for the Town.
9	This will help us to pass on savings for
10	the Town.
11	This will help us to pass on savings to
12	residents but, at this point, all we are doing is
13	passing enabling legislation that would allow us
14	to put out an RFP and, then award a contract to an
15	agent to negotiate for us and come back before
16	this Board, once, again.
17	MR. HABER: And, nothing gets approved
18	unless it is savings and we don't move forward.
19	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Thank, you.
20	Michael Watts?
21	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: Supervisor, that is t he
22	letter that you have.
23	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Michael Watts left.
24	Thank you, Mr. Ra. He did submit a letter dated
25	August 6, 2019, that said, "My name is Michael

"Watts. I am Executive Director and Founder of the LIINCS Organization, in association with three hundred-plus young professionals committed to establishing their roots on Long Island, many of  $\overline{Page \mid 22}$  whom currently reside in the Town of Hempstead.

"I am here to speak on the proposed Local
Law entitled, "Community Choice Aggregation Energy
Program."

"The LIINCS would be here, themselves, but, they are not in a position to take time away from their jobs to attend municipal hearings held during the workday.

"These young men and women come from many different walks of life but share a common love for the region where they were raised, the challenges they face and endeavor to settle here have been well documented; student loan debt, savings, starter homes with prices north of four hundred thousand dollars, multi-faceted taxes and fees of more than one thousand dollars a month and when the time comes, child care costs that can only be described as daunting all add up.

"So, it is incumbent upon our elected leaders to demonstrate doing all they can to mitigate all the costs associated with living

1	here and in some cases operating a small business,
2	especially, when those efforts involve minimal
3	change to our daily routine.
4	"Failure to support this measure sends a $^{ m Page} 23$
5	message to these young people that government
6	doesn't care about their challenges and by
7	extension whether they stay or go.
8	"The hope here is that the Town of
9	Hempstead not only adopt this measure, also uses
10	it as a springboard to explore other areas where
11	costs can be driven down for competitive bidding.
12	"The Long Islanders who comprise the LIINCS
13	Organization understand it costs more to live here
14	and for the most part facing value working a
15	little harder and smarter to live here but the
16	siren call of the South and the southwest of low-
17	cost housing and taxes at a fraction of what they
18	can expect to be paid, here in New York can be
19	deafening, especially when it comes from friends
20	and love ones who already made the move.
21	"With that in mind, please, pass the
22	proposed law Number 30146."
23	I will submit this also.
24	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Supervisor, can you
25	repeat that, please.

1	(Whereupon, laughter was heard. After, the
2	following ensued.)
3	SENIOR COUNCILWOMAN GOOSBY: For all of us
4	should have an opportunity to read that. Page $\mid$ 24
5	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: My understanding is he
6	intended to read this, but, he had to leave.
7	Joyce Stowe?
8	JOYCE STOWE: Good Morning, everyone.
9	My name is Joyce Stowe, President of the
10	Tudor Manor Civic in Elmont, New York.
11	I am here this morning to lend my support
12	to the Town of Hempstead in this natural gas
13	initiative in seeking competitive prices for
14	natural gas suppliers and our carrier.
15	I was made to understand that National Grid
16	is seeking a raise increase, such increase would
17	be burdensome at this time to our senior citizens
18	on fixed income or working citizens and, of
19	course, small businesses.
20	Competitive pricing is the hallmark of
21	doing business in any society, and, so, I commend
22	the Town of Hempstead in bringing this formula to
23	seek and secure better natural gas rates for our
24	people.
25	Again. I thank you for inviting me, here

1	this morning. Thank you.
2	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Thank you.
3	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Supervisor, thank you
4	so much for coming, but I just want to get back to $^{ m Page} 25$
5	my original point that there is a natural gas
6	supply crisis, now, on Long Island and it seems to
7	me that another measure will drive the price will
8	to increase the price and I understand that the
9	regulating authorities, here, in the State have
10	not allowed additional gas resources to be placed,
11	here on Long Island.
12	So, I think we also have to address that in
13	the future because it seems to me that if there
14	were more of a supply, the rise would be down.
15	But, thank you for coming in, here, today.
16	JOYCE STOWE: Thank you.
17	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Thank you, that is a
18	real concern, the shortage of supply, but pre-
19	existing customers, the ones that we have, I think
20	we have a real opportunity, here, to deal with
21	emergency savings which they desperately need.
22	Cheryl Lee?
23	CHERYL LEE: Good Morning, everyone, my
24	name is Cheryl Lee.
25	I am the President of the Parkerhurst Civic

1	Association representing nine hundred families and
2	also, today, I am representing Bob Barker from
3	Locustwood-Gotham Elmont Civic Association.
4	He represents twelve hundred families. Page $\mid$ 26
5	Now, while sitting there, today, I just
6	realized I just learned that without enabling
7	legislation is like putting the cart before the
8	horse.
9	Anyhow, since I am, here, I am here to
10	support the competitive bid.
11	However, what use is it if the residents
12	are not properly informed.
13	We are concerned because we are the
14	majority/minority community.
15	As a result, we would like clarification.
16	And, I mean detailed clarification among
17	everything because we read everything.
18	Now, what are we getting into?
19	We need more details. We would like to
20	ensure that there are no deficiencies in this
21	third-party bidding process, Number 1.
22	Number 2, we would like proper
23	representation at the table should you go forward
24	with this.
25	And, Number 3, community outreach; example

1	Local leaders, etc.
2	Number 4, each homeowner should be
3	notified.
4	$_{ m And}$ , Number 5, information should be send
5	out in several languages.
6	Thank you.
7	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Thank you. I think you
8	raise serious points.
9	We are at the stage, now, that this
10	resolution will just give us the power to go out
11	and issue an RFP and get an agent to negotiate
12	with us.
13	That hasn't happened yet, but, once we go
14	forward, we will reach out to the communities and
15	to the civics to let them know what is going on to
16	let them know that every resident that they can
17	choose to participate or they cannot.
18	They will have the options to operate out
19	and provide all the information they need for the
20	rates.
21	And, if they choose to opt out, the way
22	they can do that easily.
23	CHERYL LEE: Thank you very much.
24	We would like hardcopies because our
25	people, a lot of our seniors do not use a

1	Computer.
2	Thank you.
3	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Thank you.
4	Susan Ryan? Page   28
5	SUSAN RYAN: Good Morning, everybody, um, I
6	would just like to
7	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: State your name and
8	address for the record?
9	SUSAN RYAN: Susan Ryan. 100 Inwood
10	Avenue, Point Lookout.
11	Um, I would just like to support the idea
12	of an RFP.
13	The constituents in the Town of Hempstead,
14	I just think this sounds like a great way for, um,
15	the Town of Hempstead to kind of leverage their
16	support and their power in terms of helping, um,
17	to provide low cost for the constituents.
18	So, um, you know, I support this fully.
19	I, also, think that, um, you know, that the
20	idea of announcing it, now and moving forward in
21	the future, giving everybody in the local
22	communities a lot of information about this is
23	good, you know, good government.
24	So, I endorse it and help my community. We
25	have to, okay. Thank you.

1	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Thank you.
2	Next we have Pearl Jacobs.
3	PEARL JACOBS: Good Morning, Pearl Jacobs,
4	President of the Nostrand Gardens Civic Page   29
5	Association, Uniondale.
6	Um, first, and foremost, I would like to
7	express my opposition to the proposed Nat Grid
8	rate increase.
9	Um, I hear that infrastructure improvement
10	costs are being passed onto consumers and that is
11	clearly unacceptable.
12	Infrastructure improvements should be
13	included in National Grids capital budget.
14	And, as President of the Civic Association,
15	I hear all too often the financial struggles that
16	middle class residents and especially our Seniors
17	encounter on a monthly basis just to survive in
18	Nassau County.
19	So, when it comes to an opportunity to save
20	money on reaffirming monthly bills, I am open to
21	all possibilities.
22	I can tell you for a fact that Uniondale
23	residents would welcome the opportunity to save on
24	their monthly expenses.
25	When competition is introduced into the

1	mix, corporations always step up their game,
2	especially, when it comes to quality and pricing.
3	If residents can realize lower rates by
4	operating into a Community Choice Aggregation $Page \mid 30$
5	Program to save money than why not.
6	The only change to the current process
7	would be regarding the supply part of the, um,
8	process.
9	This CCA option appears to be a win-win.
10	There is no cost to enroll and a resident
11	can opt out at any time and switch back to the
12	National Grid as gas supply.
13	If Town of Hempstead residents can realize
14	a potential eight to ten percent reduction in gas
15	supply than why not?
16	It sounds like a great option.
17	Thank you, Supervisor Gillen and all
18	involved for renting this cost saving initiative
19	to the Town of Hempstead residents.
20	Thank you.
21	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Just about the supply,
22	I have been given a note that National Grid is in
23	the process of reapplying for the underwater
24	connection required to increase the gas supply to
25	Long Island and apparently Governor Cuomo is

1	coming to Hempstead Library at 1:45 today to
2	discuss this.
3	He will be here if you want to ask
4	questions, he will be here at 1:45 in Hempstead. $^{ ext{Page} 31}$
5	I don't know if it is going to be about this, but
6	you can talk to him.
7	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: I thought by podcast
8	and he heard me say we should do it.
9	(Whereupon, laughter was heard. After, the
10	following ensued.)
11	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Nancy Skeete?
12	NANCY SKEETE: Good Morning everybody.
13	My name is Nancy Skeete, Uniondale
14	Community Council Civic Group.
15	And, I am here because I just found out
16	very shortly ago that this process was about to
17	take place.
18	Now, I am upset because I didn't know we
19	could have been informed.
20	We should have known this was happening.
21	Nothing has gone out and I also want to
22	know let you know that when you do your
23	mailers, okay sometimes you have to do things in
24	larger print because we have people that are
25	visually impaired.

1	And, I really would appreciate that being a
2	parent of highly blind son.
3	I also think that because of the expenses
4	here on Long Island, you know, how do we know we have
5	are going to save money?
6	How do we know that National Grid is not
7	going to increase their delivery prices because
8	they are not making the volume of money that they
9	wanted to make?
10	We don't know that.
11	So, I am really not for it, okay, because
12	this has happened in the past.
13	I know things quite a few years ago and it
14	didn't, um, warrant any savings without gas.
15	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Let's see if I could
16	address some of your questions.
17	You raise a good point about the larger
18	print and certainly we could talk to people in our
19	mail shop and see if we can do that with respect
20	to the mailers.
21	With respect to the gas prices, we can't
22	guarantee that National Grid, rather won't
23	increase their rates with response to delivery.
24	But there are two components of their bill,
25	one is delivery and one is supply.

1	And, we haven't done anything, yet.
2	All this legislation would do is allow us
3	as a Town to explore this option.
4	And, we will only we will have an agent $^{ ext{Page} 33}$
5	to go out and negotiate better rates on supply
6	rates and only agree to do is come back to the
7	Board, again.
8	And, we will have community outreach if
9	this goes forward.
10	It will allow them to negotiate rates only
11	and only be approved if they are, in fact, lower
12	than what National Grid is proposing.
13	We can't tell you what those rates are,
14	yet, because, right, now, we can't do that unless
15	we have enabling legislation.
16	Um, I don't know if I made that clear to
17	you, but, if you want a deeper explanation, I
18	would be happy to have Mr. Pitnick or Mr. Haber
19	explain it to you in a little bit more detail if
20	that would help you.
21	NANCY SKEETE: Okay, this was not, um,
22	mailed out this change or possibility of it was
23	not advised to the people.
24	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: There is really nothing
25	to advise you yet because there is no rate change.

1	We did this last year.
2	And, we negotiated better rates for the
3	Town.
4	And, we are saving over one hundred and $^{ m Page 34}$
5	fifty thousand dollars a year on our energy costs
6	by going out into the market and competing on the
7	supply side.
8	So, what this legislation would do is allow
9	us as a municipality to negotiate for residents.
10	Right, now, we can't even do that.
11	If we pass this today and we are able to do
12	that, what we are going to do is put out requests
13	for proposals to see if there is companies that
14	have experts in this field and then they would
15	apply to us to represent us and, then, it would
16	come, again, before this Body to see if we are
17	getting the best agent to negotiate on our behalf
18	and, then, go out in the market place.
19	There are different companies that supply
20	gas, not just National Grid.
21	They are called ESCO's and they would
22	negotiate.
23	And, the thing is as a community, we would
24	negotiate on behalf of one hundred and seventy-
25	four thousand households and small businesses.

1	We have stronger negotiating power, so, we
2	can try to get the best rates possible for rate-
3	holders.
4	We will keep the community informed of all $^{ m Page} 35$
5	of that going forward, but, right, now, we have to
6	pass this enabling legislation in order for us as
7	a municipality to even begin the process.
8	So, nothing is even really stared and
9	nothing can start unless we pass this legislation,
10	today.
11	NANCY SKEETE: When we get things, is it in
12	the mail or on the internet? Are they on the
13	website?
14	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Once we move forward,
15	we will reach out to the community in a number of
16	different ways to make sure that they are informed
17	of what is going on with this.
18	NANCY SKEETE: I thank you.
19	MR. HABER: I would just add the copy of
20	the proposed local law is on the website together
21	with the public service commission order which
22	authorized the program throughout the State.
23	Um, and, then, there is a summary of that
24	order.
25	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: If you want

1	a hardcopy, we can print one out for you, Ms.
2	Skeete and send it out to you or give it to you,
3	today.
4	NANCY SKEETE: Thank you. Page   36
5	ATTORNEY PUTNICK: I just want to add what
6	the public service commission put in place
7	requires and they use the term, "robust public
8	outreach" and you know there are a lot of
9	information that will go out there that is part of
10	the process.
11	There is sufficient timeframes that are
12	required by the order, um, in order to allow
13	residents to be informed and to get the
14	information.
15	This is just enabling the process.
16	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Right, what Mr. Pitnick
17	is saying, basically, there are a bunch of rules
18	that apply if you embark on this process to make
19	sure that residents get the proper notice of what
20	is going on, what the rates are, how they can
21	participate or not participate.
22	So, there are rules that will guide us in
23	addition to our own willing to inform the public.
24	We would have to adhere to certain

standards to make sure that the public knows

25

1	what is going on.
2	NANCY SKEETE: Also supply and demand being
3	addressed.
4	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: This is just talking $^{ ext{Page} 37}$
5	about the gas supply that is available to pre-
6	existing customers with respect to getting more
7	gas supply into Long Island.
8	This does not address that, that is a
9	separate issue, okay.
10	NANCY SKEETE: All right.
11	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Thank you.
12	If you have any other questions, you can
13	ask Mr. Pitnick or Mr. Haber.
14	They would be happy to help you, all right.
15	Lynn Arthur?
16	LYNN ARTHUR: Thank you for the opportunity
17	to be here.
18	My name is Lynn Arthur. I am Energy Chair
19	I am from Oceanview Parkway in South Hampton.
20	I am the Energy Chair on the Sustainable
21	South Hampton Advisory Committee.
22	So, we adopted the CCA legislation in
23	February or the Town Board did, um, and it was two
24	years ago that we went to a conference up in
25	Westchester and we learned about the results

1	of the first pilot in Westchester which you guys
2	seem very well informed but for the benefit of
3	those in the audience, they saved fifteen million
4	dollars over two years.
5	And, so, we saw that and said, gee, why
6	shouldn't we try to do that, here?
7	So, we saw this as a tool, the Town Board
8	and we have been studying for two years.
9	We did an extensive amount of outreach to
10	tell you upfront, personally, I delivered thirty-
11	two presentations to various community groups,
12	collected over three hundred and fifty signatures
13	of support.
14	The only dissenting person from East
15	Quogue, she was actually reprimanding me because I
16	didn't emphasize the reduction in greenhouse gases
17	over the cost reduction.
18	Just a couple of points, I don't want to go
19	over what I heard others say, um, this is a chart
20	that shows over the course of the last two years,
21	the rates that we have been paying for electricity
22	supply.
23	I know you are focusing mostly on gas, but
24	this is electricity supply over the last two

years.

1	We see it fluctuates month to month and on
2	the bottom, those horizontal lines are the prices
3	that they get in Westchester for electricity under
4	their CCA. Page   39
5	And, I am not suggesting that we will be
6	able to get those rates, but, even if we got to
7	nine cents, we would still double the amount of
8	financial benefits in half the time.
9	So, the Board felt that, you know, a loan
10	was very helpful in moving both forward in the
11	desire to investigate this further.
12	On the process, on one chart, here, I used
13	these charts as part of the outreach effort, that
14	is why it was so easy for me to bring them.
15	This is the process on one chart and it
16	starts with the enabling legislation.
17	And, again, for the purpose of those that
18	have spoken before me, it is really the enabling
19	legislation that authorized the Town Board to
20	investigate a process.
21	It does not cost the Town Board anything.
22	It does not commit the Town Board anything
23	until you get to the very end.
24	In fact, it is on the day that you issue
25	your, um, your RFP, your competitive bid for

1	gas or for electricity that is the day that the
2	commitment becomes binding; not before that.
3	And, of course, in the competitive bid, you
4	are specifying what your conditions are, what is $\overline{{ m Page} 40}$
5	the term of the agreement, what price you are
6	expecting.
7	In our case, we are looking at electricity,
8	so, we have one hundred percent
9	(Whereupon, the three-minute bell rang.
10	After, the following ensued.)
11	LYNN ARTHUR: Objective for renewable
12	energy, how much we can get.
13	We are very supportive of your efforts and
14	more than happy I have sent contacts to Mr.
15	Haber.
16	So, we are more than happy to answer
17	questions and help you go forward.
18	SUPERVIOR GILLEN: Thank you for your
19	comments.
20	I do not have any slips on this Public
21	Hearing, is there someone that would like to be
22	heard?
23	Ms. Kreye?
24	MARY ELLEN KREYE: Mary Ellen Kreye. 436
25	Locust Avenue, Uniondale.

1	We had an ESCOS. We had it for several
2	years. I think maybe it was called "Allergen."
3	I am not sure. We would still have them if
4	they hadn't left the area, so, they cancelled the
5	contract.
6	I am very much in support of this effort
7	to, um, explore possibilities and I think it is a
8	really good idea because we save money and
9	whatever their prices were over what, um, LIPA, at
10	the time, charged, then, we got a check from them.
11	So, it worked to our advantage in a lot of
12	different ways.
13	Thank you.
14	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Thank you, Ms. Kreye.
15	Is there anybody else that would like to be
16	heard on this Public Hearing?
17	(Whereupon, no response was heard. After,
18	the following ensued.)
19	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Hearing none, may I
20	have a Motion.
21	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: I move that the
22	Hearing be closed and the item be adopted.
23	COUNCILMAN MUSCARELLA: Second the motion.
24	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Madam Clerk.
25	CLERK CABANA: Supervisor Gillen?

1	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: I wholeheartedly
2	support this resolution and this effort to save
3	money for our residents.
4	I just want to also add that it was $Page \mid 42$
5	recommended by Sustainability Leadership Team
6	Leadership Team in the Town of Hempstead which is
7	a bipartisan group that employees some Members
8	from our Department of Conservation and Waterways
9	an also supports the Supervisor of this Town, so,
10	I vote, yes.
11	CLERK CABANA: Councilman Blakeman?
12	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Aye.
13	CLERK CABANA: Councilman D'Esposito?
14	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Aye.
15	CLERK CABANA: Councilman Dunne?
16	COUNCILMAN DUNNE: Aye.
17	CLERK CABANA: Senior Councilwoman Goosby?
18	SENIOR COUNCILWOMAN GOOSBY: Aye.
19	CLERK CABANA: Councilwoman King-Sweeney?
20	COUNCILWOMAN KING-SWEENEY: It is a great
21	idea, aye.
22	CLERK CABANA: Councilman Muscarella?
23	COUNCILMAN MUSCARELLA: Aye.
24	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: I thank the Members of
25	the Town Board for supporting this initiative.

1	Thank you very much.
2	Madam Clerk, will you call the next Public
3	Hearing.
4	CLERK CABANA: Proposed Local Law Re:
5	"Animal Shelter and Control Division, in order to
6	establish formal procedures and controls for
7	adjusting waiving or discounting fees charged by
8	the Animal Shelter (To amend Chapter 152 of the
9	Code of the Town of Hempstead)
10	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Okay, I have a number
11	of slips on this Public Hearing.
12	First, we have Valerie Lampe.
13	VALERIE LAMPE: Oh, okay, Valerie Lampe,
14	Saint Augustine, Florida.
15	With regards to this, um, new, um,
16	procedure, this is saying it is going to establish
17	a formal procedure and controls for adjusting,
18	waiving or discounting fees by the Animal Shelter,
19	um, is this something that was recommended?
20	Was this precipitated by the audit?
21	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: It is a recommendation
22	from the County Comptroller and we are taking that
23	recommendation.
24	VALERIE LAMPE: Okay, and so, um, what about
25	all of the other recommendations.

1	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Mr. Loccarubba.
2	MR. LOCCARUBBA: That is not part of this
3	Public Hearing.
4	$_{ m We}$ have issued a policy memo to the Shelter
5	with regard to the other recommendations from the
6	Comptroller and we also did an RFP which we
7	received two responses to do an operational
8	assessment which was a recommendation from that
9	review, as well.
10	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Thank you, Mr.
11	Loccarubba.
12	VALERIE LAMPE: It is an operational
13	assessment, is there a difference between that and
14	the operational audit?
15	MR. LOCCARUBBA: An audit is more financial
16	and an assessment is more on the operational side,
17	looking at everything from our staffing levels to
18	scheduling.
19	I would be happy to supply you with the RFP
20	to see what we requested.
21	VALERIE LAMPE: I would appreciate that
22	because also the Comptroller did, um, raise
23	concerns and publicly stated there was a
24	significant amount of obstruction with regard to
25	a financial audit conducted at the Shelter.

1	So, um, I am wondering if you guys ever got
2	your hands on the operational chart.
3	MR. LOCCARUBBA: There is an operational
4	chart for the Shelter that the Department of $\overline{ ext{Page} 4\%}$
5	General Services has it.
6	VALERIE LAMPE: When did they get it, is
7	that new?
8	MR. LOCCARUBBA: Is it new?
9	I have no idea if it was new.
10	VALERIE LAMPE: Because it wasn't available
11	to the auditors. They wouldn't let them see it.
12	MR. LOCCARUBBA: The auditors, by Court
13	Order, were limited to do a financial review of
14	the Shelter.
15	It was not operational.
16	They received everything that they were
17	obligated to see.
18	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Any other comments on
19	this resolution that is before the Town Board?
20	VALERIE LAMPE: Yep, so, I appreciate that
21	very much, can you send over to me the RFP's, as
22	well as I can see the memo with regard to what you
23	are following in terms of the recommendations?
24	MR. LOCCARUBBA: The policy document
25	sent to the Shelter, sure.

1	VALERIE LAMPE: All right I would like to
2	see that.
3	Do I have to FOIL that or can I get that
4	through an email? Page   46
5	MR. LOCCARUBBA: No, we will send that to
6	you.
7	VALERIE LAMPE: Okay.
8	Um, let me go back to this for one second;
9	these, um, new provisions, I am confused as to
10	what they are actually going what is the
11	difference between what is, now, um, being
12	introduced, here?
13	It says to establish formal procedures,
14	does that mean formal procedures were not there?
15	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Mr. Loccarubba?
16	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: There are times either
17	the Commissioner or Deputy Commissioner would
18	waive fees for various reasons.
19	What we are doing is codifying that certain
20	Members of the Administration at the Animal
21	Shelter can, now, do that.
22	So, there is no question whether or not
23	they have the authority to waive the fees.
24	VALERIE LAMPE: And, that is on a case-by-
25	case basis?

TOWN ATTORNEY RA: Well, everything is on a case-by-case basis.

The point is that if there is a point that comes an emergency and there is a problem, we gave  $\frac{Page \mid 47}{Page \mid 47}$  certain people the authority to waive fees.

VALERIE LAMPE: Okay, I am just, you know, as always, I am concerned with people treatment and, you know, what is the criteria that someone would have to meet in order to be able to obtain these fees being waived?

And, you have to realize - - excuse me, you have to realize, Mr. Ra, that we are all up in arms because of the recent tragedy because there was nothing short of that in regards to animals being paid to be shipped off into conditions that were worse than a death sentence.

So, when you hear things about fees being waived for adoption which very commonly goes wrong because hen people can get free dogs, they often end up in abusive situations or they are taught and bread to fight, so, you know, we don't take this lightly.

We don't just want anybody with certain titles to be able to waive fees for whatever reason that they see fit.

1	We have seen a lot of things go wrong with
2	the Shelter.
3	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: Well, as far as the
4	adoption goes, we have a strenuous policy where we
5	review the backgrounds of people that adopt our
6	animals, so, other than that, I can't
7	VALERIE LAMPE: Strenuous, okay, well, I am
8	sorry, I disagree because you also just recently -
9	-
10	(Whereupon, the three-minute bell rang.
11	After, the following ensued.)
12	VALERIE LAMPE: Released several pit
13	bulls, unaltered back to the owners which goes
14	against your own law.
15	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Thank you, Ms. Lampe.
16	Diane Madden?
17	DIANE MADDEN: Diane Madden, Hempstead.
18	That is interesting, Mr. Ra, that you just
19	said that because
20	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: You need to disclose
21	you are a candidate for Town Supervisor, correct?
22	DIANE MADDEN: I am very proud to say I
23	will take every single opportunity to say that,
24	full disclosure of all my statements are no
25	different than they have been since 2010

1	Challenging either Party, including yours, um, due
2	to your conduct and what you did to Bonnie
3	Radashar (phonetic spelling) and how you hired two
4	million nearly two million Page   49
5	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Do you have something
6	to say about this Public Hearing, Number 9?
7	DIANE MADDEN: I certainly do, but I wanted
8	to answer your question.
9	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: I didn't ask any
10	question.
11	I just said that you need to disclose you
12	are a candidate for office.
13	DIANE MADDEN: I certainly will.
14	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Leave your comments to
15	Public Comment.
16	DIANE MADDEN: You criticized Santino.
17	Otherwise, I am running for Hempstead
18	Supervisor, 2019, November 5 <sup>th</sup> , Vote Madden.
19	In any case, you sent animals recently
20	around two hundred cats to a location out of State
21	that has the most minimal policy pay, pay pickup
22	for cats.
23	So to say that you are so stringent on
24	adoptions, well, our taxpayers should know you
25	hand these animals out, out of State to places

1	that have the worst policies of any and that is
2	how animals end up in laboratories.
3	I like to know since you are taking this
4	initiative to follow the audit and it is $$\operatorname{Page} 50$$
5	interesting, Mr. Loccarubba, that you, basically
6	discredit the Comptroller because he said
7	something just the opposite that his audit was
8	impeded financially.
9	He found it very difficult to get the
10	information that he needed to do a third
11	comprehensive audit and you are disagreeing with
12	that, if I am correct in what you just said.
13	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: There was a Supreme
14	Court case decision that limited the Nassau County
15	Comptroller's authority to audit the Animal
16	Shelter.
17	DIANE MADDEN: Okay, according to the
18	Comptroller, according to the Comptroller, the
19	Town impeded a comprehensive financial review.
20	In any case, um, this recommendation that
21	you took is there any chance that you took the
22	recommendation where the County Comptroller
23	immediately urged the Board to bring in an
24	outside, independent animal care expert to the

Animal Shelter has that been done?

25

1	Because, basically, this is crumbs, this
2	gives the appearance that you are doing things
3	that the audit asked for.
4	This is mismanagement is what it is. $Page \mid 51$
5	But, have any outside, independent animal
6	care experts been brought into the Animal Shelter?
7	It has been over two months.
8	MR. LOCCARUBBA: Again, what the Nassau
9	County Comptroller presented to the Town of
10	Hempstead was a financial review.

14	based on the consumption over the past year.
15	It is based on future rates.
16	It is based on Grant opportunities that we
17	have, all of those things are figured in when the
18	Comptroller's Office figures the tax rates.
19	PEARL JACOBS: So, can you give me
20	clarification of the scope of improvements, what
21	they call the scope of this improvement and what
22	it encompasses?
23	COMMISSIONER REINHARDT: Part of it is
24	hiring a design firm for pilot tests and design
25	treatment systems for Oak Street Well site, PCM

Requirements that come down each year and there is
a large amount of money, the water tank at the
foot of Peninsula Boulevard and some modifications
of the structure, itself.
PEARL JACOBS: The question is why would
our taxes have to be raised to do this work?
I just spoke earlier regarding that Grid,
you know, being included into the capital plan.
Why would our taxes have to raised?
COMMISSIONER REINHARDT: Money to make
improvements need to come from somewhere, um, it
comes from capital improvements, come from the tax
base district.
Each District is independent financially.
PEARL JACOBS: Would this increase be
revealed to the community, um, you know, the
residents, the taxpaying residents as far as how
much the tax bill with increase?

something that the Comptroller's Office handled
when they do the budget, when they raised the

3	minimal increase?

16	out new toxins that we just found 1,4 dioxane, so,
17	that has been part of our capital plan.
18	Roads is the Number 1 expenditure that we
19	have for our capital plan and the second largest
20	is water because we all care about very much about
21	preserving and protecting our water quality.
22	So, this is already part of the plan that
23	has been adopted.
24	And, now, this is just kind of going
25	forward with what we need to do with our capital

1	Plan.
2	Is that correct, Commissioner?
3	COMMISSIONER REINHARDT: That is correct.
4	$_{ m MARY}$ ELLEN KREYE: Just so to understand,
5	each Water District is separate?
6	COMMISSIONER REINHARDT: Yes.
7	MARY ELLEN KREYE: I never paid attention
8	to this. There is a separate line in our taxes
9	for the Water District?
10	COMMISSIONER REINHARDT: Yes, there is.
11	MARY ELLEN KREYE: Okay.
12	COMMISSIONER REINHARDT: The tax bill on
13	top, you will see Uniondale Water District has its
14	own tax line.
15	MARY ELLEN KREYE: This is separate from
16	what we pay for water prices?
17	COMMISSIONER REINHARDT: Yes.
18	MARY ELLEN KREYE: Water that we use?
19	COMMISSIONER REINHARDT: Those are the
20	consumption costs, that is cost you control based
21	on conservation.
22	MARY ELLEN KREYE: Right, so, um, I mean,
23	it is a little fancy footwork but, in fact, the
24	taxes will eventually go up, even if it is part of
25	the capital plan?

1	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: We can't say whether
2	the taxes will go up or down, yet.
3	We are looking at the budget this year.
4	We are also we retained Counsel in $^{ m Page 69}$
5	terms of addressing toxins in our water.
6	We retained Counsel to sue on behalf of the
7	Town of Hempstead to try to improve some of our
8	costs to people that are putting contaminants in
9	our water.
10	So, that is a way of hoping to offset the
11	burden to taxpayers by seeking, um, the
12	remediation costs from the polluters and
13	contaminators.

15	Lane, (as heard) West Hempstead.
16	Um so, just to clarify, we don't actually
17	know what the increase is going to be.
18	It is just put in the capital plan.
19	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: This is already part of
20	our capital plan, which is a multi-year plan, what
21	projects we are going to prioritize and one of the
22	projects is to put in new infrastructure in our
23	water delivery system.
24	Also, to remove contaminants, so, this is
25	really just enabling us to go forward and do

1	what works.
2	So, it is already part of the capital plan.
3	This is not something new.
4	$_{ m ARIEL}$ SCHWARTZ: I wished it was clarified
5	on the agenda.
6	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Just to clarify,
7	thanks to you my understanding is that there will
8	be a proposal by the Supervisor with respect to
9	the budget in this particular water district and,
10	then, the Town Board will consider that proposal.
11	So, there will be hearings and
12	opportunities for the residents to be heard if
13	they have any objections to the budget, which may
14	or may not have an increase in the, um, in the
15	fees for that particular water district.
16	ARIEL SCHWARTZ: We are going to get
17	mailers or emails notifying us?
18	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: It will be available

20	budget hearings.
21	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: The budget is generally

19	relates to an existing auto repair shop and the

23	business.
24	As noted by the Clerk, the property is
25	located on the corner of Lawrence Avenue and

14	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Second.
15	SENIOR COUNCILWOMAN GOOSBY: Second the
16	Motion.
17	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Madam Clerk?
18	CLERK CABANA: Supervisor Gillen?
19	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Aye.
20	CLERK CABANA: Councilman Blakeman?
21	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Aye.
22	CLERK CABANA: Councilman D'Esposito?
23	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Aye.
24	CLERK CABANA: Senior Councilwoman Goosby?

8	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Would any other Council
9	Members like to sever any other item on the
10	agenda, on the Administrative Calendar, rather?
11	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Just to have it
12	correct, we amended 37.
13	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: 37 was amended.
14	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Tabled 50 and 51.
15	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Correct.
16	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Everything else
17	still stands.
18	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: And, we added the
19	Emergency Resolution as what number?
20	SENIOR COUNCILWOMAN GOOSBY: 74.
21	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: 74, Thank you.
22	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: May I have a Motion on
23	the Administrative Calendar.
24	SENIOR COUNCILWOMAN GOOSBY: I move the
25	Administrative Calendar with the exception of the

1	ones already called.
2	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Second.
3	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Okay, all right, I have
4	$\overline{\text{Page} \mid 97}$ a number of slips on the Administrative Calendar.
5	Susan Ryan?
6	SUSAN RYAN: Thank you, I had a question.
7	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: I am sorry, can you
8	state your name and address for the record.
9	SUSAN RYAN: Susan Ryan. 100 Inwood
10	Avenue, Point Lookout, New York.
11	Um, on Item 49, there is, um, a resolution
12	to appoint Members of the Town of Hempstead Board
13	of Ethics, could you explain to me what that is?
14	Is that a new Board of Ethics?
15	Who are the people and how are they
16	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Yeah, so from my
17	understanding the Supervisor has already nominated
18	and we approved her recommendation to the Ethics
19	Board and this would a recommendation from the
20	Town Board where one, um, where there are two
21	remaining appointments who have to be registered
22	from different parties or one could be registered
23	could be Blank.
24	So, these are the Town Board's
25	recommendations for the Ethics Board, one, a

1	Member of the Republican Party and Independent.
2	SUSAN RYAN: So, how many members in all are
3	on the Board?
4	SENIOR COUNCILWOMAN GOOSBY: Four.
5	SUSAN RYAN: Four.
6	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: And, the Town Attorney;
7	this is according to the Ethics Legislation.
8	There are four members and the Town
9	Attorney is also a Member of the Ethics Board.
10	SUSAN RYAN: I am sorry, they are
11	appointed?
12	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: So, according to the
13	Ethics Legislation, the Supervisor got to appoint
14	one person to the Ethics Board.
15	The Town Board Majority gets to appoint two
16	people to the Ethics Board and these are their
17	selections for the Ethics Board and Dorothy, the
18	Minority, gets one.
19	SUSAN RYAN: Okay, I was just wondering
20	what the structure was, thanks.
21	Um, I also wanted to talk about, I know
22	that you, um, can't.
23	You tabled 50 and 51, but, um, I have a
24	real concern about outside, you know, taking a
25	look at a Parks Commissioner being able

1	to negotiate his own deal with, um, you know, a
2	vendor.
3	It just, you know, I am on a State Parks
4	$_{ m Page 99}$ Board and our Commissioner would never be allowed
5	to do something like this where you could alter
6	anything related to, you know, staff, staffing
7	issues, um, length of the contract, um, capital
8	improvements, any kind of payments, renting or
9	fees.
10	It is not something that would be able to
11	be done independently with a Commissioner and, um,
12	you know, a vendor.
13	And, I have real concerns about the lack of
14	oversight in these areas, um, several times I have
15	at these meetings and, um, there has been a
16	request from Laura Gillen to have outside auditors
17	come in and take a look and the response to that
18	very often is that it is too expensive or you
19	already have a Compliance Officer.
20	A Compliance Officer is there to take a
21	look at the rules that are already there.
22	They are not there to take a look and
23	assist how departments are run.
24	And, I really think that the Town Board

should consider having outside auditors take a

25

1	look, whether it is the Parks Department, Building
2	Department or any other Department.
3	You need a fresh eye to come in and take a
4	look at how you run your departments. Page $\mid 100$
5	It is better government.
6	It is better business for all of you and it
7	is better business services for your constituents.
8	And, continuously gets, you know voted down
9	and I really think that it is something that you
10	should take a look at, so you don't have any
11	department serving your constituents which are all
12	of us.
13	But, um, this should never get to the point
14	that it got to, regardless of who the vendor is.
15	I am just saying, you know, it is messy
16	and, um, the Parks, because it is my background, I
17	am very aware of how things run well and other
18	State Parks, the level and we would never even
19	consider doing something like this.
20	And, it does show a lack of oversight for
21	your Commissioner of Parks in this situation.
22	So, you know, I like to see that addressed.
23	COUNCILWOMAN KING-SWEENEY: Ms. Ryan, I
24	fully share your concerns and spoken out about
25	that, that is why proposing Item 37, I just

1	amended which simply amended it to try to make the
2	process more efficient.
3	And, a fifty thousand dollar threshold, we
4	Page $\mid 101$ an change out at a later date, figure out if that
5	doesn't work but these new procurement policies
6	and procedures are meant to get at that issue.
7	Thank you.
8	SUSAN RYAN: It is very serious regardless,
9	the guidelines affect the services that -
10	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: That was certainly the
11	intent of the resolution.
12	The Councilwoman and I worked on it
13	together, so, that this never happens again.
14	SUSAN RYAN: I appreciate that.
15	I hope it passes. Thank you.
16	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Thank you, okay, Felix
17	Procacci?
18	FELIX PROCACCI: Item 37 amended or
19	unamended, it is really not necessary because
20	State Law, if anyone read it, does not allow you
21	to offload your responsibilities as a Town Board
22	to a Commissioner or anybody else.
23	I mean it is sort of writing a 14 Amendment
24	to the Constitution that lets you omit the 13
25	Amendment.

1	It would never be done.
2	So, you are just contradicting, but, now,
3	you are giving people the authority to do stuff
4	that changes that and are not done by the elected $^{ m Page} 102$
5	officials.
6	It is not right.
7	So, you are violating State Law.
8	Laura Gillen proposed a law last year that
9	would require the Town Attorney's Office to look
10	at all legislation to see that it is legal and
11	everything.
12	And, this Board tabled it indefinitely, um,
13	for no reason because, why not.
14	Check the law because you have a lot of
15	illegal laws on the books, from what I can tell,
16	this is just one of them.
17	And, also, there is a clause in the
18	guidelines that I believe that will allow the Town
19	Board to overrule themselves any time they want.
20	If you go to Guideline Number 3, it says,
21	"except when directed by the Town Board."
22	So, that means you could just change that
23	fifty thousand to one hundred thousand for another
24	contract.
25	You can write new revisions in another

1	contract and you can use that term, "except when
2	directed by the Town Board."
3	So, why not get rid of that, "except
4	when directed by the Town Board," provision, so, $^{ extsf{Page} 103}$
5	the Town Board can no longer do that anymore.
6	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: I think that is a good
7	point.
8	We should look at Mr. Procacci's comments.
9	FELIX PROCACCI: So, anyone would have to
10	say anything about that.
11	You know, you want to read the State Law or
12	just make stuff up?
13	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: The intent is that it
14	would be brought back before the Town Board for a
15	vote, that is what it means, that is the safeguard
16	that you have, is that if there is a change, it
17	would come back before the Town Board.
18	There would be a Hearing on that. We would
19	have an opportunity to comment and the Board would
20	have to vote on it.
21	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Mr. Ra, is that
22	correct?
23	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: That is correct.
24	FELIX PROCACCI: But, if you write another
25	contract that is illegal and it gets passed, now,

1	that is directed by the Town Board, so, now you
2	could still, you know, the ultimate thing I am
3	getting at, you are still overriding State Law,
4	so, you are illegal not matter what you say, $\overline{Page \mid 104}$
5	anyway, because you can't do anything without
6	Board approval but, now, you are overloading your
7	responsibilities through a contract approved by
8	the Town Board to give someone else your
9	authority.
10	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: You are wrong, Felix,
11	the bottom line is that the State Law does not
12	apply to minor modifications.
13	They are a material part of the contract
14	which we all agree on the Town Board should come
15	back before the Town Board if there is a material
16	amendment.
17	But, if it is one hundred dollars, you
18	know, a call by a Commissioner, that you know this
19	small item is a modification that is justified, I
20	think we would have four thousand resolutions
21	before us every month.
22	This addresses issues that are of concern
23	whether or not there can be a material change to a
24	contract without coming back before the Town

25

Board.

1	The threshold is low, fifty thousand, the
2	year requirement, that it not exceed a year is
3	reasonable and I cannot believe that you are not
4	in support of this legislation. Page $\mid 105$
5	It baffles me.
6	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: I just want to add,
7	Councilman, I respect your right to comment your
8	legal opinion, however, that is
9	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: It is not legal
10	opinion. It is my judgment.
11	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: State Law applies
12	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Are you saying State
13	Law applies?
14	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: I am not making a legal
15	argument right, now.
16	This is an issue that is going to be
17	litigated before the Courts, so, I think we should
18	be careful with our comments but I just wanted to
19	clarify to the extent that you are making a legal
20	opinion that is your legal opinion, that is not
21	mine.
22	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: I want to
23	understand, Supervisor, it is your clarification
24	that if there is a minor modification of a de
25	minimis amount or de minimis duration that the

1	Commissioner cannot make a judgement call, that it
2	would have to come back on a day-to-day basis on
3	to the Town Board?
4	$_{ m SUPERVISOR}$ GILLEN: I am saying that I have
5	not taken a comprehensive look to draw any legal
6	conclusion.
7	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: That is your right.
8	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: I would not make one at
9	this time.
10	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Won't you admit that
11	this provision that Councilwoman King-Sweeney is
12	putting forward is a very efficient safeguard to
13	make sure that matters comeback before the Town
14	Board that are of consequence?
15	Wouldn't you agree with that?
16	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: I worked on this
17	resolution with Councilwoman King-Sweeney and, um,
18	I don't know if I agree with the change to the
19	fifty thousand dollar threshold but I support the
20	amendment because I want this resolution to pass
21	right, now.
22	We can look at the fifty thousand dollar
23	threshold and we can work together on that.
24	SENIOR COUNCILWOMAN GOOSBY: You did work
25	with her on that, you just said that you did.

1	Now, you are changing it.
2	COUNCILWOMAN KING-SWEENEY: Well, just
3	legal analysis aside, um, I haven't had enough
4	coffee for that, um, but, the idea with the fifty ${ m Page} 107$
5	thousand dollars, the idea was would we paralyze
6	Town Government if we had no sort of minimum
7	threshold of dollar amount if there is snowstorms
8	and we quickly need to get more salt, that type of
9	thing, this is meant to address practical day-to-
10	day concerns to get us through.
11	Um, if it turns out that the fifty thousand
12	dollars was just way too high, we can lower or get
13	rid of it.
14	Um, so, this is a practical amendment, that
15	is all.
16	FELIX PROCACCI: I didn't like the first
17	part of your sentence, legal analysis aside, that
18	upsets me.
19	COUNCILWOMAN KING-SWEENEY: You know
20	exactly what I was talking about, there was a
21	significant consideration of State Law.
22	In this context, I am saying that this
23	issue aside, not that I don't care about State
24	Law, that issue aside, my amendment was based on a
25	practical concern

1	I wasn't going into the complicated State
2	Law analysis.
3	FELIX PROCACCI: I read the complicated
4	State Law analysis. Page   108
5	Since I am running out of time, the bottom
6	line is if you read just the "petty cash" section,
7	of the State Law on how you divide petty cash to
8	the different departments, it is one of the most
9	lengthy paragraphs in the law for finance, that is
10	fifteen hundred dollars
11	(Whereupon, the three-minute bell rang.
12	After, the following ensued.)
13	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Thank you, Mr.
14	Procacci.
15	Stephen Edmondson?
16	On the administrative Calendar, on your
17	sheet, it said you want to talk about Number 25.
18	STEPHEN EDMONDSON: The one on Senior
19	Citizens and you had the one with Westbury Seniors
20	doesn't really clarify it on here, "gifts," for
21	the Senior Center.
22	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Mr. Ra, I believe that
23	is allowing us to accept gifts for new programs,
24	is that correct?
25	STEPHEN EDMONDSON: I hope you get some

1	air conditioning.
2	I called Councilwoman Goosby's office and
3	you can take a walk, twenty-five steps across the
4	street, the Senior Center over there and the $^{ m Page} 109$
5	Seniors are dying over there with no air
6	conditioning.
7	SENIOR COUNCILWOMAN GOOSBY: Which Center?
8	STEPHEN EDMONDSON: Town of Hempstead with
9	the County of Nassau, EAC supervising over there.
10	There is no air conditioning.
11	SENIOR COUNCILWOMAN GOOSBY: You need to
12	talk to the County.
13	STEPHEN EDMONDSON: They told me the Town
14	is involved, horrible.
15	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Thank you, Mr.
16	Edmondson.
17	Diane Madden?
18	DIANE MADDEN: Diane Madden, Hempstead;
19	full disclosure, I am running for Hempstead
20	Supervisor.
21	(Whereupon, applause from the audience was
22	heard. After, the following ensued.)
23	DIANE MADDEN: Vote Madden.
24	Item Number 37, um, I don't know where the
25	Councilwoman went to, but, my question is really

1	directed to her.
2	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Would you like to come
3	back when she comes back?
4	DIANE MADDEN: I would appreciate that. $Page \mid 110$
5	Thank you.
6	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: You're welcome.
7	Ariel Schwartz?
8	ARIEL SCHWARTZ: I like to comment on all
9	the corruption
10	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Mr. Schwartz, could you
11	state your name and address.
12	ARIEL SCHWARTZ: Ariel Schwartz, 463 Weizel
13	(as heard) Lane, West Hempstead.
14	Item 74, I put 52, but I guess 74, now, the
15	contract with Dover, whatever the name of the
16	company was.
17	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: That was just tabled,
18	now, it is going before the Court, so, it is not
19	on the Administrative Calendar anymore.
20	If you like to make comments, you make them
21	at Public Comment.
22	It is not on the Administrative Calendar
23	anymore.
24	Thank you, Mr. Schwartz.
25	Ms. Madden, would you like to

come back.

DIANE MADDEN: With reference to the, um, comments that you made for the amendment,

Councilwoman Sweeney, um, the problem I have with

Item 37, is that it is kind of a joke and the reason I say that is because as you recall and I continue to bring up the issue of the corrupt 109 thousand dollar contract that was fraudulent, um, the Animal Shelter, I guess, Commissioner/Director was smart enough not to put it before the Board, again, because the contractor lied throughout the hiring process and RFP process, followed by bogus investigation where an appointed Deputy Town Attorney to the Committee was also overseeing the investigation.

So, there is tremendous conflict in and of itself right there.

My issue is that since the Board was never given that contract, the Commissioner and Director managed to give this person who lied throughout the hiring process another job at the Animal Shelter for, approximately, three times the amount of salary for her profession where she works in an Animal Shelter part-time, potentially to get over time and make more than one hundred and nine

1	HEMPSTEAD TOWN BOARD 8/6/19 Thousand dollars.
2	So, I ask that you take a look at that
3	amendment, again, put it aside and include it in
4	that along the lines that no Commissioner or $\overline{Page \mid 112}$
5	Director or anyone representing a Department can,
6	then, once a contract is not approved, again or
7	found to be fraudulent, they cannot on their own,
8	hire these people for the same amount of money as
9	they did at the Animal Shelter.
10	That is corrupt. That is fraudulent.
11	This does nothing to stop what is going on.
12	So, I would like to know if someone can
13	amend that.
14	You can take a look at that, again, to make
15	sure none of these Commissioners or Directors can
16	also hire these people if they can't get it passed
17	the Board, private and on their own, as I assume
18	they did at the Animal Shelter because I didn't
19	see any Board approval for three times the amount
20	of money that the taxpayers are now paying an
21	employee part-time at the Animal Shelter because
22	they do not pass a one hundred and nine thousand
23	dollar contract.

Can someone, please, respond.

SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Mr. Ra, first of all,

1	were there ever any findings with respect to any
2	fraud related to that contract?
3	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: No, there was not.
4	$ ext{Page} \mid 113$ SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Okay, the other thing
5	when people are hired, it has to come before the
6	Town Board?
7	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: Correct.
8	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: So, the Town Board does
9	have to weigh in on it when people are hired.
10	DIANE MADDEN: This was a part-time
11	position and to my knowledge, it was not approved
12	by the Town Board and as far as Mr. Ra's
13	investigation, he did not investigate what he was
14	asked to investigate.
15	He investigated what he wanted to
16	investigate.
17	And, that is why his investigation, his
18	alleged investigation came out with no findings
19	because he only investigated what he wanted to be
20	investigated.
21	So, are you saying because I am getting
22	conflicts in facts, Mr. Ra, you have told me a
23	number of times that the Board, in fact, needs to
24	approve part-time and, then, you told me that they
25	do not need to approve part-time.

1	Because we have a part-timer making three
2	times the salary of a profession because they
3	could not pass a fraudulent
4	(Whereupon, the three-minute bell rang. $Page \mid 114$
5	After, the following ensued.)
6	DIANE MADDEN: By the way, if there was no
7	fraudulence, your Commissioner would have put up
8	the resolution to review that contract but they
9	did not.
10	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Ms. Madden, your time
11	is up.
12	DIANE MADDEN: I understand. Is someone
13	going to answer that question?
14	Do you need approval to hire a part-timer
15	in any department?
16	ATTORNEY: Since we have been here,
17	Supervisor, part-timers have not come before the
18	Town Board for approval.
19	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Okay, they have to be
20	within the budget, is that correct?
21	ATTORNEY: That is correct.
22	DIANE MADDEN: They never have been before.
23	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: I only been here a
24	short time.
25	Mr. D'Esposito doesn't believe they have.

1	DIANE MADDEN: How does that amendment
2	handle that?
3	Because it is a Catch-22, it doesn't
4	address that. Page   115
5	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: This relates to
6	contracts that will be a totally different
7	resolution relating to hiring.
8	DIANE MADDEN: It could be put in this
9	resolution if you wanted it to.
10	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Okay, thank you, Ms.
11	Madden.
12	Catherine Rasia?
13	(Whereupon, "Pass" was heard from the
14	audience. After, the following ensued.)
15	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Mary Ellen Kreye?
16	MARY ELLEN KREYE: Mary Ellen Kreye. 436
17	Locust Avenue, Uniondale, New York.
18	Item Number 25, accepting monetary gifts
19	for Senior Citizens Programs; I am glad to see
20	that and I have a feeling that the Senior Citizens
21	Programs are being cutback because the people in
22	Uniondale tell me the Nurse has been removed, um,
23	which was a very popular service to the people in
24	the Senior Center.
25	So. I hope somebody will look into that.

1	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Is our Commissioner,
2	here?
3	DEPUTY COMMISSIONER: I don't know anything
4	about a Nurse in the Senior Center. $\overline{\text{Page} \mid 116}$
5	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Okay, Deputy
6	Commissioner has indicated she doesn't know
7	anything about this.
8	I am sure, Ms. Kreye, we will look into it
9	and investigate it, thank you.
10	MARY ELLEN KREYE: Okay, thank you.
11	Um, so, then, there is an amendment to
12	Number 44, solid waste service agreement.
13	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Commissioner, are you,
14	here?
15	ATTORNEY CAPITANO: The Commissioner is not,
16	here. I am Counsel to the Department.
17	I am here to answer any questions.
18	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: If you could clarify
19	for Ms. Kreye, I appreciate it.
20	ATTORNEY CAPITANO: Council, good
21	afternoon, Francesca Capitano, Counsel to the
22	Department of Sanitation.
23	Mrs. Kreye, the Kovanta amendment allows
24	the department to deliver up to four hundred and
25	twenty thousand tons of waste every year.

1	If you see this is every year, it covers
2	any excess waste.
3	It gives us a more desirable price for that
4	$\overline{\text{Page} 117}$ waste and it is ministerial that we do every year
5	to cover that excess waste.
6	MARY ELLEN KREYE: We definitely like to
7	hear about recycling and, um, making energy out of
8	waste, so, I am glad to hear that is being done.
9	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Thank you, Counsel.
10	ATTORNEY CAPITANO: You're welcome.
11	MARY ELLEN KREYE: On Item 55, the roadway,
12	I have a question whether the roadways are mostly
13	reserved by outside companies or is that done by
14	our department?
15	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: So, again, this is part
16	of our capital plan to surfacing roadways.
17	For this particular item, there were six
18	bids received.
19	We put it out to bid.
20	This contract is for the lowest bidder.
21	MARY ELLEN KREYE: There are a lot of
22	complaints in Uniondale about the resurfacing
23	because the roads are left opened and dusty for
24	weeks at a time without being tared and we just
25	can't understand.

1	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Commissioner, can you
2	speak to that.
3	COMMISSIONER: Yes, there are two
4	contracts. Page   118
5	These cover roads throughout the Town of
6	Hempstead, all areas throughout the Town, selected
7	roads, so, that is the way of doing a road and
8	spending less money to do the roads.
9	So, we don't have to do a full
10	reconstruction.
11	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: And, Commissioner, can
12	we work with the vendors that get awarded the
13	contracts to make sure they don't leave dangerous
14	conditions like Ms. Kreye is suggesting.
15	COMMISSIONER: Yes, of course, what exactly
16	I didn't hear it.
17	MARY ELLEN KREYE: They are opened for
18	weeks at a time, so, especially, in the
19	Summertime, it is brutal.
20	People driving up and down the street and
21	all the dust going around and it just doesn't make
22	sense why they don't do it and finish it.
23	COMMISSIONER: Yeah, we will certainly work
24	to improve that, that could be because, you know,
25	the contractor gets tired coordinating many

1	Jobs at once and he does it at different stages
2	and he has to come back and pave at appropriate
3	times.
4	$_{ m Page 119}$ But, we certainly will try to better manage
5	that.
6	There maybe reasons why that is being done.
7	MARY ELLEN KREYE: I mean three weeks, four
8	weeks is a long time to have a road opened and
9	having to drive on it and deal with the dust.
10	COMMISSIONER: Certainly take that into
11	consideration, especially with this large
12	contract, that is going out.
13	MARY ELLEN KREYE: Thank you.
14	On Item 60, Beechwood, I would like to
15	compliment Beechwood on the way that they cleared
16	the property on um, Merrick Avenue where the
17	Jewish Center previously was, they ripped up
18	mature trees and this is indirect contrast that
19	was done by, um, Engle Berman in A. Holly
20	Patterson where they left a desert.
21	I hope that the Town will work in the
22	future to prevent that because it is really
23	improper.
24	They could have left the perimeters with
25	trees, you know, there were trees and shrubs along

1	the perimeters that would have filtered the dust
2	instead, now, all of that dust is blowing on those
3	houses which are on the perimeter of the property.
4	So, I think that, um, Beechwood is to be $^{ extsf{Page} 120}$
5	complimented instead of taking down beautiful
6	trees.
7	They left them.
8	(Whereupon, the three-minute bell rang.
9	After, the following ensued.)
10	MARY ELLEN KREYE: And, um, whatever the
11	Town can do to prevent this dis-beautification of
12	properties by developers would be appreciated.
13	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Thank you, Ms. Kreye.
14	I totally support that. I am working with
15	my Counsel and Counsel to the Town Board Majority
16	are working on a tree ordinance.
17	Ms. Jacobs?
18	PEARL JACOBS: Pearl Jacobs, yes, I have a
19	question regarding professional services rendered.
20	Can you expand on Item 22, please, would that
21	encompass
22	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: I don't think you
23	stated your name and address.
24	PEARL JACOBS: Sorry, I am sorry, Pearl
25	Jacobs, President of the Nostrand Gardens

1	Civic Association in Uniondale.
2	Item 22, I need some clarification.
3	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Commissioner Rottkamp,
4	could you provide some clarification, please.
5	COMMISSIONER ROTTKAMP: Good Afternoon.
6	Number 22 is professional services in
7	reference to Kash & Associates, as well as, the
8	contractor L. Riggerio who is our demo.
9	PEARL JACOBS: What is the scope of the
10	work, um, with regard to these communities?
11	I am happy to see that these issues are
12	being addressed.
13	Could you explain or clarify the scope of
14	the work that is being performed?
15	COMMISSIONER ROTTKAMP: Sure, most of the
16	unsafe structures and things like that are boarded
17	up or reports that they are unsafe to the Town
18	Board.
19	PEARL JACOBS: Okay, I have an issue, an
20	ongoing issue, 615 Uniondale Avenue and, um
21	COMMISSIONER ROTTKAMP: As far as 615
22	Uniondale Avenue, I believe Mr. Lopinsky from my
23	office informed you that it was put out to bid to
24	demo the building.
25	And, when it was put out, the um, the

1	Purchasing Department didn't put down to have it
2	as a controlled demo, so, we are rebidding it out
3	as a controlled demo because there is so much
4	asbestos in that building that if they had to $^{ m Page 122}$
5	remove everything, first, it would case a larger
6	amount of cost.
7	So, this is the best way to do it for the
8	residents of the Town.
9	PEARL JACOBS: Yes, the reason I ask, the
10	last meeting I was here, you stated that, um,
11	there would be a thirty-day, um, turnaround before
12	there would be some action taken and this is well
13	over thirty days.
14	COMMISSIONER ROTTKAMP: Okay, as I said to
15	you, the contract was put out, unfortunately, it
16	did not go out as a controlled demo.
17	They put it out as a regular demo.
18	It is going back out, again.
19	Once the bids come in, we will award the
20	contract and we will demo the property.
21	PEARL JACOBS: So, that is the only
22	roadblock from impeding you from demolition of
23	this property at this time?
24	That is the only roadblock that is impeding
25	this demolition?

1	COMMISSIONER ROTTKAMP: That is correct.
2	PEARL JACOBS: Okay, do you have any sort
3	of timeframe that you will turnaround, you will
4	see the turnaround on this?
5	COMMISSIONER ROTTKAMP: Again, I just
6	forwarded the information to Purchasing to ask
7	them to rebid it.
8	It has to get circulated through the Town
9	Board.
10	The Supervisor's Office has to sign. The
11	Comptroller's Office, the Town Attorney's Office
12	and at that time, Purchasing has to advertise it.
13	They have to bid it and, then, we have to
14	award the bid.
15	PEARL JACOBS: You are speaking, perhaps,
16	another thirty days?
17	COMMISSIONER ROTTKAMP: Probably more than
18	that before we actually do the demo.
19	It has to be re-bided. It has to go out
20	and the Town Board has
21	PEARL JACOBS: This property has been there
22	unsafe structure, sir, for many, many years.
23	It is an unsafe structure because there are
24	bricks that are falling off of the chimney, okay.
25	Neighbors text me all the time with these

1	issues.
2	I know there was a fence put up there,
3	thank you, by the Town of Hempstead.
4	$_{ m Page 124}$ However, children still climb through that
5	fence and I just want to make it clear and put it
6	on record, it is an unsafe structure.
7	SENIOR COUNCILWOMAN GOOSBY: Commissioner,
8	have you checked the structure to make sure it is
9	safe?
10	COMMISSIONER ROTTKAMP: Yes and we put a
11	fence around the property.
12	PEARL JACOBS: But, it is unsafe, I know
13	that for a fact.
14	And, one more thing, Commissioner, while
15	you are here, 576 Uniondale Avenue, the Quick
16	Lube Oil Change is an unsightly structure.
17	COMMISSIONER ROTTKAMP: Yes, that is the
18	Quick Lube Gas Station.
19	We boarded it up the pump stations. We
20	have given them numerous appearance tickets, so,
21	they are currently in Court.
22	PEARL JACOBS: They are currently in Court?
23	COMMISSIONER ROTTKAMP: Correct.
24	PEARL JACOBS: Are they State violations or
25	Town violations?

1	COMMISSIONER ROTTKAMP: State.
2	PEARL JACOBS: Okay, thank you.
3	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Thank you, Ms. Jacobs.
4	Thank you, Commissioner. Page   125
5	Eric Alexander?
6	(Whereupon, no response was heard. After,
7	the following ensued.)
8	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: I do not have any other
9	slips on the Administrative Calendar.
10	Is there anybody else that would like to be
11	heard?
12	Please, come forward.
13	PETE GIORGOS: I put my name down. I don't
14	know why they didn't call me.
15	Um, my name is Pete Giorgos and I reside at
16	900 Oakland Court in North Bellmore.
17	Supervisor Gillen and Members of the Board,
18	Good Afternoon. I am here, today to speak to you
19	about some persistent flooding issues on our
20	street that needs much improvements.
21	I just came, here after paying some of the
22	highest property taxes in the Nation.
23	However, we are not and never have been
24	getting the services we paid for all of these
25	years.

1	I am very upset, disgusted and angry by the
2	Town and employees for more than thirty years
3	since we brought up this issue with Supervisor
4	Gulotta in 1984. Page   126
5	Here is a partial response to complaints by
6	William McKinsey, Commissioner of Engineering in
7	2014 addressed my wife, Nancy and I.
8	"Improvement projects for various areas,
9	the condition of the roadway and the flexibility
10	of funding, your concern regarding Oakland Court
11	is important to us and we thank you for taking the
12	time to bring it to our attention. The street
13	will be inspected by our office for an improvement
14	project.
15	"It will, then, be considered for a future
16	highway project program."
17	Having repeatedly asked Engineering for Mr.
18	McKinsey's report, I finally filed a FOIL request
19	for this report and I found out that other than my
20	wife, nothing else was done, nothing, no
21	inspections, no violations, no report, nothing,
22	nothing is done since 2014, while the condition,
23	the roadway further deteriorates.
24	Cars still get stuck in two feet of water

trying to get their children to school.

25

1	Our cars get flooded repeatedly.
2	Nobody can walk on the sidewalk because it
3	is dangerous.
4	$Page \mid 127$ And, we always get stuck with the cleanup,
5	major repairs and new material to replace topsoil,
6	grass and bushes in our front yard, that is why we
7	have a lot of grass growing from the street than
8	on the sidewalk.
9	And, we cannot use our garages because it
10	floods.
11	Time and again, while we call to complain
12	about yet another flood, we get the same tired
13	answer, "we will send a crew to investigate. The
14	project is next in line. We are in the middle of
15	budget process."
16	Can never tell me what the results of all
17	these previous investigations were.
18	Can't get one appointment.
19	Don't get any communication at all about
20	these so called evaluations that are supposed to
21	be done.
22	Every time we complain and while street
23	conditions are evaluated, flooding never gets
24	mentioned at all it seems.
25	And, of course, the Highway Department

1	gets and usually the project is brought up
2	(Whereupon, the three-minute bell rang.
3	After, the following ensued.)
4	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Sir, this is our $Page \mid 128$
5	Commissioner, Mr. Tuman and that gentleman, right,
6	there is Joe Davenport
7	PETE GIORGOS: I need a few extra seconds.
8	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: You can have a few
9	extra second.
10	I am just saying you can work with these
11	gentlemen and they will respond to you.
12	PETE GIORGOS: Please, um, sometimes I
13	wonder if anything was being done at all.
14	I do not wonder anymore. I know, now, that
15	nothing was being done to fix this problem for
16	over thirty-five years, nothing at all.
17	We still get flooded every time it rains
18	hard.
19	COUNCILMAN DUNNE: You're my constituent.
20	My office has been working with you constantly.
21	We referred you to traffic and safety in
22	the past.
23	We referred you to Engineering constantly.
24	I understand Mr. Tuman's office is in touch
25	with you constantly back and forth.

1	PETE GIORGOS: Constantly is not the word
2	that I would use, sir, um, he only calls me when
3	you call me and I don't understand whywhat I
4	am asking for are details. Page $\mid$ 129
5	I don't get any details. Where is the
6	communication?
7	COUNCILMAN DUNNE: Mr. Tuman is here,
8	right, now.
9	I would like him to come up, just so you
10	know who he is and then go back in the room there.
11	He is right here and go in that glass room
12	behind you and discuss it.
13	He will tell you and maybe show you where -
14	-
15	PETE GIORGOS: You don't seem to
16	understand, sir, what the problem is, here.
17	The problem here is not the Engineering
18	Department and I ma getting a little bit more
19	persistent, now, but the problem is for thirty
20	years nothing has been done, no movement.
21	When I asked the Engineering Department was
22	were the results of the report that you have been
23	getting?
24	Since '14, I get no reports why the
25	flooding issue is never looked at, never.

1	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Sir
2	COUNCILMAN DUNNE: I will tell you this,
3	sir, I have been, here tow years, let's get it
4	taken care of. Page   130
5	Mr. Tuman will sit with you and discuss
6	what we can do and let me tell you what, we can
7	do, we will do.
8	PETE GIORGOS: You know what we can do is
9	fix this problem once and for all.
10	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Sir, sir, I can't
11	answer for what happened over thirty years.
12	Let's address this right, now.
13	Mr. Tuman and Mr. Davenport from my office
14	will work with you and give you information, okay.
15	PETE GIORGOS: Look, I have been getting
16	information right, now, but, it is irrelevant,
17	again, they are pushing it off to the side.
18	They are giving it off to the engineering
19	company to investigate what the problems are when
20	the problems are right in front of their charts if
21	you take a look at the way this thing was designed
22	and built and never improved.
23	You can see where the problems are.
24	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Okay, Mr. Tuman and Mr.
25	Davenport, will you meet with this gentleman.

1	COMMISSIONER: I just want to say for the
2	record, we are looking at it in great detail among
3	many other drainage issues throughout the Town.
4	We have issued it to consultants for the $^{\mathrm{Page} 131}$
5	purpose of trying to tackle it in the best way
6	possible.
7	It is not an easy fix.
8	It is among many drainage issues that the
9	Town has an we put it out to consultants so we can
10	properly prioritize which one to tackle, first and
11	this is one very high on our list, but we need to
12	properly assess all the drainage issues and use
13	the money properly to alleviate these issues.
14	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: How far long are we in
15	our process with analysis by the consultant?
16	COMMISSIONER: Consultants are wrapping up
17	their study, now.
18	They reached out to the gentleman.
19	They have been onsite with him, at least,
20	they have tried, um, and we should be getting
21	answers pretty soon as to what the study will
22	reveal and use that to make our decisions on which
23	problems to tackle, first.
24	Um, hopefully, this would be one of them

among others.

1	COUNCILMAN DUNNE: Commissioner Tuman, this
2	gentleman took time today. He is dressed to the
3	nines. You have been extremely polite with us on
4	the phone. Page   132
5	If we can expedite anything for him, keep
6	me in the loop with it.
7	Let my office know what is going on, so, I
8	can respond to him, also.
9	COMMISSIONER: One hundred percent. I am
10	also hoping from the study there might be some
11	kind of shortcut solution that will allow us
12	potentially to alleviate things before
13	implementing a larger situation.
14	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Just to clarify
15	PETE GIORGOS: If you look at the plans,
16	the sewer system
17	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Just to clarify, we
18	don't expedite things because people look dapper.
19	We expedite things if there is a very pressing
20	need.
21	Thank you.
22	PETE GIORGOS: Not only that, thirty-five
23	years of inaction, that is the worse part about
24	it.
25	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: I am sorry about that.

1	We are going to try to address it, now.
2	COUNCILMAN DUNNE: Help is on the way.
3	PETE GIORGOS: Well, I will hold you to it,
4	Page   133
5	I will be at the next meeting to inform you
6	of the progress that we are making.
7	COUNCILMAN DUNNE: Thank you so much.
8	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Thank you so much.
9	All right, I do not have any other slips on
10	the Administrative Calendar, is there anybody else
11	that would like to be heard?
12	AARON ROSS: Yes, thank you very much for
13	giving me time.
14	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: You have to state your
15	name and address for the record.
16	AARON ROSS: My name is Arron Ross and I
17	live in Atlantic Beach.
18	My address is 54 Jefferson Boulevard.
19	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Thank you.
20	AARON ROSS: And, the reason I am here is
21	because I would like to kindly ask you to propose
22	new legislation for tobacco 25.
23	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Okay, sir,
24	respectfully, right, now, we are trying to close
25	out the Administrative Calendar since there is

1	not legislation pending on that issue in the

5	So, we will close out the Administrative

17	opportunity to be heard on the Administrative

19	It is not fair.
20	I do not have any other slips on the
21	Administrative Calendar, Madam Clerk, can you,
22	please, call the roll.
23	CLERK CABANA: Supervisor Gillen?
24	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Okay, on the
25	Administrative Calendar, I vote yes, with the

1	Exception of Item Number 23 because I understand
2	there is still some issues, judicial issues with
3	respect to the locations selected.
4	Um, also with respect to Item Number 75, $^{ m Page} 135$
5	that is the resolution, I put up a resolution to
6	appoint outside, independent Counsel, um, from the
7	firm Coven & Levels.
8	The Town Counsel put up a competing
9	resolution to appoint Counsel of their choosing.
10	The gentleman they have selected has an
11	incredibly impressive resume, so, it is not with
12	respect to anything about his qualifications,
13	however, he, um, he is in an office that is
14	located in Rochester and, um, we have litigation
15	pending in Nassau County and I don't think it is
16	ideal to have a lawyer located in Rochester.
17	I have been advised that he has an office
18	in New York, um, or closer to Nassau County, I am
19	not sure, but an office closer to Nassau County,
20	the gentleman that they put forward is to my
21	understanding in Rochester, so, we are really not
22	getting him.
23	So, we will be getting somebody else, so,
24	that is why I vote no.
25	On 75 I am sorry that is Number 74

1	I also vote no on certain items within the
2	personnel resolution, which is Item 62, I vote no
3	on Mario Polio.
4	$_{ m Page} \mid 130$ This personnel action was never discussed
5	with my office, um, and there is only 17 thousand
6	five hundred dollars left available for salaries
7	according to the Comptroller's Office within this
8	Department.
9	Um, we still have three people on the
10	Tozner List from this department who have to be
11	made fulltime.
12	So, there is no money for random,
13	unbudgeted step increase for this gentleman, so, I
14	vote no.
15	Um, also, I vote no on Debra Winrid who is
16	supposed to be a new hire, um, to be Counsel to
17	DGS.
18	There is no position in DGS's budget for an
19	Attorney and if we are hiring Attorneys, the Town
20	Attorney's Office is in desperate need of help.
21	We should not be depleting funds from the
22	Town Attorney's Office which is supplying and
23	attorney to the department when no attorney to my
24	knowledge has ever been assigned to that

department before.

1	Um, there is no money in DGS's budget for
2	it and, in addition to that, with respect to the
3	hires from the Town Attorney's Office, we tried to
4	Page $\mid$ 13° conduct an open and transparent process to provide
5	an opportunity for anybody who is interested in
6	being employed by the Town Attorney's Office to
7	submit their resumes.
8	We posted the job, which is what we should
9	do at a Town to create an environment where
10	anybody can have the opportunity to do business or
11	to work for the Town, that job was posted.
12	We have resumes on file.
13	We are willing to work with the Town
14	Attorney's Office to interview the candidates that
15	submitted their resumes within these resumes was
16	not Ms. Winrid's, who did not submit a resume.
17	This is not an open and transparent
18	process. I have never seen her resume. There is
19	no money in the budget, I vote no on Ms. Winrid.
20	CLERK CABANA: Councilman Blakeman?
21	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: I vote yes with
22	respect to the Administrative Calendar with the
23	exception of Item 23 which I vote no and I abstain
24	on Item 52.
25	CLERK CABANA: Councilman D'Esposito?

1	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: I vote aye on the
2	Administrative Calendar with the exception of
3	Number 23 which is a resolution establishing
4	electric vehicle sharing pilot program, I think $^{ m Page} 138$
5	there are some issues, some of the roads, actually
6	have listed there are in the County's
7	jurisdiction, so, I vote no to that and I am
8	abstaining from Number 52.
9	CLERK CABANA: Councilman Dunne?
10	COUNCILMAN DUNNE: I am going to vote no on
11	Item 23, abstaining from Item 52 and I vote aye on
12	the rest of the calendar.
13	CLERK CABANA: Senior Councilwoman Goosby?
14	SENIOR COUNCILWOMAN GOOSBY: I vote no on
15	23, abstain from 52 and abstain from 74, first of
16	all they are under investigation.
17	These items are already being investigated.
18	I don't see why we need to hire lawyers.
19	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: They filed a lawsuit
20	against us.
21	SENIOR COUNCILWOMAN GOOSBY: I don't agree
22	with this.
23	Wait until what the Federal Government has
24	to do and FBI.
25	We have a Compliance Officer that we hired,

1	so, we have someone that can help.
2	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Senior Councilwoman,
3	there is a lawsuit that has been filed against us
4	and we need to defend ourselves. Page $\mid$ 139
5	SENIOR COUNCILWOMAN GOOSBY: Nope, not on
6	this one, I am abstaining on 52 and abstaining on
7	74, that is it.
8	CLERK CABANA: Councilwoman King-Sweeney?
9	COUNCILWOMAN KING-SWEENEY: Yes, with the
10	exception of 23 for all the reasons everyone has
11	explained and Number 52, I am abstaining on that
12	and I do note that Polk & Wardwell is incredibly
13	well respected.
14	The Attorney that the Supervisor selected,
15	um, is a very impressive Attorney.
16	He would be fine to handle the case.
17	With that said, the reason why, um, I am
18	voting in favor of the law firm in Rochester, the
19	location of someone in Rochester was purposeful
20	and was a Member of the Democratic Party, not the
21	Republican Party.
22	We tried to have no political interference
23	and influence because he has a New York City
24	Office that will, um, be fine, um, and, then, I
25	also want to mention just publicly, I did send

1	a letter yesterday to the Eastern District of New
2	York providing them with copies of resolutions for
3	both law firms in case either one was selected,
4	um, advising them that no one intends to obstruct, $^{ ext{Page} 140}$
5	um, their investigation or otherwise impede it and
6	to have them, please, reach out to us should they
7	have concerns about the hiring of either law firm.
8	Um, so, I am in favor of the Rochester Law
9	firm.
10	And, then, finally, I am recusing myself on
11	Item Number 58, um, the hiring of the security
12	consultant simply because I recently accepted a
13	campaign donation from one of the principals.
14	They are a well respected firm and I am
15	sure they will serve the Town well.
16	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Supervisor, if I may
17	be heard with that issue with regard Item 74, I
18	just want to explain if you pay careful attention
19	to that resolution, it has nothing to do with any
20	investigation.
21	It was the feeling of most members of the
22	Town Board that we should have independent Counsel
23	considering that there are some people in the
24	County that have been involved in the controversy.

We want to remove that issue and have

1	Someone independent who will deal with the
2	contracts only to give advice to the Town Board or
3	to represent the Town in independent litigation or
4	any other litigation concerning those contracts $^{ m Page 142}$
5	but it is not an investigation of any way, shape
6	or form.
7	We will do nothing to step on the toes of
8	any investigation that is pending by any
9	governmental agency.
10	And, we will not take part in any parallel
11	investigation, that is not our function right, now
12	and that is the purpose of hiring outside Counsel,
13	just to administer these contracts, render advice
14	to the Town Board and if necessary, to represent
15	the Town of Hempstead in the event there is any
16	litigation.
17	I have been advised this morning that there
18	is litigation.
19	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Yes, I heard that it is
20	up to the FBI to conduct a criminal investigation.
21	It is not up to our Attorney to conduct a
22	criminal investigation.
23	It is up to our Attorney to participate in
24	the civil remedies that are available to us as a
25	Township with respect to these contracts, um

1	and advocate on behalf of the Town and the
2	taxpayers of this Town.
3	CLERK CABANA: Councilman Muscarella?
4	COUNCILMAN MUSCARELLA: Aye, I like to vote
5	yes on all, no on 23 and I will be abstaining on
6	Number 52.
7	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: All right, that
8	concluded the formal portion of this Board
9	Meeting.
10	We will take a five-minute break and return
11	for Public Comment.
12	I am sorry, a Motion to adjourn.
13	SENIOR COUNCILMAN GOOSBY: I move that we
14	adjourn.
15	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Second.
16	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Madam Clerk?
