21	MARY ELLEN KREYE: Mary Ellen Kreye. Locust
22	Avenue, Uniondale. I had a question about the
23	difference between the Water District Fund and the
24	Water District themselves; for example, Uniondale
25	and others as opposed to Bethpage, Hicksville,

1	Franklin Square, they are a separate group?
2	DEPUTY COMPTROLLER LONGOBARDI: The
3	Districts that you referenced, Uniondale, our Town
4	of Hempstead Water Districts, meaning that they $\overline{ ext{Page} 6}$
5	are funded by this Board and controlled by this
6	Board.
7	The other Districts that you referenced,
8	Bethpage, Hicksville are commissioner-operated
9	districts, which have an independent Board that
10	makes their decisions.
11	MARY ELLEN KREYE: I see, thank you.
12	DEPUTY COMPTROLLER LONGOBARDI: You're
13	welcome.
14	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Thank you, Ms. Kreye.
15	Felix Procacci?
16	FELIX PROCACCI: Felix Procacci.
17	Don Clavin has proposed some budgeted
18	initiatives if he is elected Supervisor.
19	These are cutting the Supervisor's budget
20	by fifty percent, getting rid of take-home cars
21	and getting rid of unnecessary Deputy
22	Commissioners.
23	These are good initiatives, but, it is
24	important that the Town Council lead by example.
25	To make this a fair process, the Town

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1	Council should also agree to cut its budget by
2	twenty-five percent.
3	It is important that the Town Council show
4	m Page the public that it is willing to share the pain of
5	budget cuts and not just make it look like they
6	are picking on a particular department or person.
7	It is important to note that the
8	Supervisor's budget hasn't been a million dollars
9	for, at least, twenty years; in other words, four
10	Supervisors ago.
11	In addition, it is important that the Town
12	Board should, first, pass a resolution that
13	mandates any future changes to a budget must come
14	before the Town Board for a vote.
15	This is necessary so the public would be
16	notified if the Town decides to reverse their
17	budget cuts.
18	I believe these initiatives should be voted
19	on unanimously, that is they can't be split.
20	Town Board Members must vote for all of
21	them or none of them.
22	In order for this to be done with some
23	thought, I propose that the Board, the Town Board
24	continue to take public comment about the budget

today and adjourn this Hearing to sometime before

1	the end of October.	
2	By seriously considering this type of	
3	initiative by actually voting on it, this will	
4	show voters how serious the Town Board is in $$\operatorname{\textsc{Page}} 8$$	
5	cutting expenditures for the long term and not	
6	just to show up one of their fellow Board Members.	
7	In addition, as I mentioned at previous	
8	meetings, it is necessary to put the titles and	
9	salaries for all departments, department employees	
10	in the budget.	
11	For example, the Franklin Square Park	
12	District Budget still doesn't list the employee's	
13	titles and salaries.	
14	This is absolutely necessary for residents	
15	to understand how their money is being spent.	
16	Thank you.	
17	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Felix, could you	
18	meeting with someone from my staff and give them a	
19	list of what you propose.	
20	You said your proposal has to be done all	
21	together or not at all?	
22	FELIX PROCACCI: Yes.

2	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: I have a slip from Mr.
3	Kroll.
4	STU KROLL: Stu Kroll, Great Neck. Let's
5	see, I wanted to talk about some of the budget
6	items regarding the Animal Shelter, some of them
7	struck me as a little bit odd.
8	So, can someone explain it to me, the first
9	one I saw, there was no money allocated for first
10	aid and supplies.
11	According to the Union people, there have
12	been people, volunteers, people have been getting
13	bites quite often.
14	We have a dog trainer that, obviously, lied
15	about her credentials, so, how could we not have
16	first aid supplies there?
17	I mean, that seems a little odd.
18	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Mr. Lacarubba?
19	DEPUTY COMPTROLLER LONGOBARDI: Dominic,
20	correct me if I am wrong, but, I believe that is
21	being corrected.
22	MR. LACARUBBA: Yes, it has been.
23	STU KROLL: Okay, good.
24	Next item I noticed was a little strange to
25	me, two hundred and seventy-five thousand

1	Dollars that was allocated for legal services.
2	This is the Animal Shelter, I mean, this
3	isn't what is that for?
4	$_{ m I}^{ m Page} 7$ I know our friend, Pastore has been named
5	in five lawsuits, is this defending him?
6	What is all this money being allocated for
7	at the Animal Shelter?
8	DEPUTY COMPTROLLER LONGOBARDI: Legal
9	services are allocated in various departments
10	based on need, based on possible, um, open cases,
11	things like that, so
12	STU KROLL: That answers my question, open
13	cases, okay.
14	That is fair enough, I guess.
15	Under part-time wages, I think we now have
16	a five and a half million dollar budget, at least,
17	four million dollars goes to salaries that I can
18	see, um, Ms. Fonte is making fifty-five dollars an
19	hour, is that counted in the part-time wages?
20	And, how many hours is she actually
21	working?
22	DEPUTY COMPTROLLER LONGOBARDI: I would say
23	it is counted in the part-time wages.
24	I don't know how many hours she is working
25	directly.

1	STU KROLL: Okay, there is also an item in
2	there, a line item for forty-two thousand dollars
3	for other salaries, I am just curious what other
4	salaries are there? $\overline{\text{Page} \mid 8}$
5	DEPUTY COMPTROLLER LONGOBARDI: This is
6	actually for a lump sum payments that have to be
7	paid out should somebody retire, somebody leave.
8	The other is health, health insurance
9	payments in there.
10	STU KROLL: Okay, that is fair enough, I
11	guess.
12	There is also a twenty-seven thousand
13	dollar item in there for placement of animals.
14	We know where forty-two hundred dollars at
15	one point was going for per dog to being sent to
16	Kim Strong up in Utica, that obviously, worked out
17	very well.
18	Um, that twenty-seven thousand dollars,
19	what type of placement are we talking about.
20	DEPUTY COMPTROLLER LONGOBARDI: Again, that
21	would be based on the needs of the departments,
22	so, the placement would be however the department
23	determined where the animal could be placed.
24	STU KROLL: And, who would make that
25	determination?

1	DEPUTY COMPTROLLER LONGOBARDI: That is
2	determined by the Department and people running
3	the Animal Shelter, itself.
4	$_{ m STU}$ KROLL: It doesn't exactly fill me with
5	confidence, okay.
6	The last item I want to talk about there
7	was nine thousand dollars that was requested for
8	advertising and promotion, nine thousand dollars
9	set aside, it was actually, it was ten thousand
10	dollars was requested, so, I have to congratulate
11	everybody.
12	You guys are, obviously, very budget
13	conscious and we saved a thousand dollars on the
14	backs of the animals.
15	We have five and a half million dollars for
16	the Shelter, which, as I said, four million-plus
17	goes to the salaries, surely in the name of
18	decency, we can try to get more money for these
19	animals to get adopted by allocating a reasonable
20	amount of money for promotions.
21	I think nine thousand dollars is an
22	absolute disgrace to be honest, what can I tell
23	you.
24	All right, thanks.
25	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Thank you, Mr. Kroll.

1	Diane Madden?
2	DIANE MADDEN: Diane Madden, full
3	disclosure, I am running for Hempstead Town
4	Supervisor. Page 10
5	Um, the Animal Shelter budget, first of
6	all, did anyone ever explain what all the
7	amendments were?
8	And, I don't really want to use much of my
9	time on this, from the last meeting.
10	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: I didn't put forward
11	the amendments, so, maybe one of you would like to
12	explain one of the amendments.
13	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Yes, basically, we
14	went through the budget, our first pass at the
15	budget, our first review of the budget, we found
16	out that there was money that was allocated, um,
17	for various items that we thought we could reduce
18	that expenditure.
19	We also looked at the revenue side and we
20	thought that the revenue in some areas was being
21	underestimated and that was based on data that we
22	received from the County of Nassau concerning both
23	mortgage tax revenue and also sales tax revenue.
24	So, basically, we feel that the money
25	should be in the pockets of the taxpayers

1	and not spent in a way that we feel is not in the
2	best interest of the taxpayers.
3	So, we offered the amendments with
4	additional cuts. Page 11
5	And, also, we adjusted revenues to more
6	accurately reflect what we feel the revenue
7	figures will be for the next year.
8	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Mr. Capobianco, you
9	were involved in doing revenue projections, is
10	that correct?
11	MR. CAPOBIANCO: Yes, I was.
12	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Can you speak into the
13	microphone.
14	MR. CAPOBIANCO: Yes, I was.
15	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: And, when you were
16	doing the revenue projections, were you trying to
17	hide revenue from the taxpayers?
18	MR. CAPOBIANCO: No, absolutely not, but,
19	the Town's budgetary consultant made different
20	assumptions than I had done previously and in
21	source information that he received, he had
22	different source data that he feels the
23	projections that he is proposing to the Board to
24	be made are more appropriate than what I made.
25	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: So, is it fair that

1	you just took a more fiscally conservative
2	approach to the projections?
3	MR. CAPOBIANCO: You could say that, but,
4	you could also say that he had other data that I $^{ m Page} 12$
5	didn't have, that is one, also, possibility.
6	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Okay.
7	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Well, Supervisor, I
8	don't think it is fiscally conservative when you
9	are taking money from the taxpayers that you don't
10	have to take, that it is better if it is in their
11	pockets, in their wallets than in government and
12	bureaucracy.
13	And, Mr. Capobianco, would you agree that
14	the amendments more accurately reflect what the
15	County projections were than the amount that was
16	in the Supervisor's initial budget?
17	MR. CAPOBIANCO: The amendments that were
18	made were based upon what information the
19	budgetary consultant from the County's budget as
20	opposed to what I was using, based on historical
21	data that I had.
22	Like I said, it is a different source, um,
23	different projections, in essence.
24	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Revenue is just
25	projections, it is not actual money that we have

1	that we are hiding?
2	MR. CAPOBIANCO: That is correct.
3	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Supervisor, it is not
4	a question, you know, of whether you are hiding it $^{ extstyle{Page} 13}$
5	or not hiding it.
6	I think it is a question of whether or not
7	you are going to ask the taxpayers to write a
8	check for "X" amount of dollars or " Y" amount of
9	dollars and you are underestimating the revenue
10	than you are asking the taxpayers to pay more to
11	make up for that difference.
12	And, I think that is where we have our
13	philosophical difference.
14	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Mr. Capobianco, were
15	you trying to hurt the taxpayers of this Town when
16	you made your projections?
17	MR. CAPOBIANCO: No.
18	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Thank you.
19	DIANE MADDEN: So, were one of the
20	amendments, the Supervisor's budget?
21	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Yes.
22	DIANE MADDEN: And, how much is that cut
23	by?
24	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Do you have the figure
25	in front of you?

1	They cut out my budget for part-time and
2	seasonal staff, but they didn't cut out their own
3	budget for part-time and seasonal staff, just
4	mine. Page 14
5	DIANE MADDEN: The reason I personally take
6	issue with that is that as Supervisor, should I
7	win this election, I will need that budget.
8	I will be cutting every other budget along
9	with the Town Board, but I am not coming in with
10	two million or any amount of money for patronage
11	jobs.
12	So, I do take issue with that.
13	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Actually, I have a
14	question; the seasonal and part-time in the
15	Supervisor's budget that was cut by the Board, was
16	that in the budget last year or did your office
17	operate without seasonal and part-time employees?
18	MS. SMITH: The Supervisor's budget did not
19	anticipate, um, seasonal and part-time last year.
20	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Okay, thank you.
21	MS. SMITH: However, Councilman
22	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: All I wanted to
23	know if it was in last year's budget, last year
24	there was nothing in the budget for seasonal or
25	part-time employees in the Supervisor's budget.

1	MS. SMITH: That is correct.
2	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: This year it was
3	added, so, it was removed by the Town Board as
4	part of our amendment, so, just to clarify, there $$\operatorname{\textsc{Page}} 15$$
5	is nothing being taken away because there was
6	nothing prior.
7	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: That is not correct.
8	Ms. Smith, could you elaborate further.
9	MS. SMITH: The Supervisor was allowed 2.1
10	million.
11	I am going to use round numbers, in
12	changing our staffing, um, allocated a certain
13	portion because we needed the help in the office,
14	we did not exceed the budget that the Board
15	allotted, so, we are very comfortable that we were
16	being responsible.
17	There were lines for the fulltime folks,
18	who, in some cases, did not use the full amount
19	and we used the excess money to hire part-time.
20	So, no, the Town did not the Board did
21	not give us a seasonal line, but we created that
22	by being fiscally responsible with the dollars
23	that were allocated by the Board.
24	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: By hiring part-time, we
25	don't have associated costs with fringe,

1	isn't that correct?
2	MS. SMITH: Correct.
3	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Which is quite
4	considerable costs that we are not paying health $^{\mbox{\sc Page} 16}$
5	insurance or other things for these part-time
6	employees and for our seasonal.
7	We are able to offer opportunities to
8	students to come and work in my office over the
9	Summer, law students who came and got great
10	experience, got a little bit of money to help them
11	over the Summer to offset some of their expenses
12	and gave them a great opportunity.
13	We had a young man who worked with our
14	Counsel to the Supervisor, who is a Hofstra law
15	student.
16	He was great. We are grooming people who
17	may be able to come back, here and become part of
18	our workforce one day.
19	It was a great opportunity and it is a
20	shame it was cut from my budget but they didn't
21	want to cut it from their own budget.
22	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: That is extremely
23	nice of you.
24	All, I was trying to point out is that it
25	was added to the budget this year and it was

1	not in the budget last year.
2	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: It was not added to the
3	budget, what Ms. Avril
4	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: I am just pointing
5	out nothing is being taken out because it wasn't
6	in the budget.
7	SENIOR COUNCILWOMAN GOOSBY: Excuse me,
8	excuse me, excuse me, one at a time, please.
9	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: It wasn't added to the
10	budget, we just took money that already was
11	allocated to hire fulltime staff and we just tried
12	to itemized them and delineate it to make it part-
13	time and seasonal.
14	We were just trying to be clearer with the
15	funds that were allocated to my office because we
16	made an effort in our budgeting process to start
17	line item and itemizing things to give the public
18	a better understanding of where those lump sums
19	are going that is what we were trying to do.
20	And, it is very much a shame it was cut
21	from my budget.
22	SENIOR COUNCILWOMAN GOOSBY: Well, I don't
23	think so, Supervisor, first of all, I would like
24	to note, none of the people that work in your
25	office does anything to help anyone of us with

1	anything that we do.
2	So, we have separate government, anyway,
3	you know as far as your people are concerned.
4	I asked you when you came if you would, $^{ m Page} 18$
5	please, not have your staff and our staff, we are
6	all one and we all work for the taxpayers and that
7	is what we are not what we are doing.
8	I am very concerned, too, because you said
9	you have over two million dollars, already, you
10	know, for people that work for you, not for the
11	rest of us.
12	So, if you still have the two million, how
13	are you coming up with someone that is going to
14	work preliminary or part-time or seasonal, that is
15	what I don't understand.
16	I could not get that in my head, so, maybe
17	you can explain that.
18	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: I believe your budget
19	is collective, the Council's budget, we all
20	represent the same amount of people.
21	Your budget is 1.4 million dollars more
22	than my budget.
23	SENIOR COUNCILMAN GOOSBY: We have six
24	Councilmanic Districts that we take care of.
25	I take care of my District and all the

1	others take care of their Districts.
2	We are Council Members and we each have
3	Districts.
4	$_{ m You\ are\ not\ responsible\ for\ the\ Districts}^{ m Page} 19$
5	that we have but you do try to take over.
6	A Councilmanic District started this is
7	the 20^{th} anniversary of Councilmanic Districts that
8	we worked so hard and this community is aware of
9	that.
10	I work part-time supposedly but I am out
11	there.
12	I am out, I work forty hours a week and
13	more because I try to take care of our residents
14	and that is what it is all about.
15	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Just looking at the
16	budget, here, unless I am reading this
17	incorrectly, I know the Supervisor claims I don't
18	have the ability to read, but in the budget that
19	is presented, Page 74, 2019 budget amended the
20	final number is two million one hundred and
21	fifteen thousand two hundred and seventy-six
22	dollars.
23	2020 Departmental requests which would be
24	this budget, two million one hundred and sixty-
25	four thousand nine hundred and fifty-tw0 dollars,

1	so, if we are just reallocating money from the
2	Supervisor's budget, why is there an increase when
3	there are no positions that have been removed?
4	The only decrease is when the Town Board, $^{ ext{Page} 20}$
5	when it goes from tentative to preliminary, when
6	the Town Board removes the seasonal and part-time.
7	MS. SMITH: Last year the Board removed the
8	employees that services the Help Desk, the Help
9	Line, um, among the folks that were removed was an
10	employee who has continued to work on the Board in
11	subsequent amendment, moved that employee back to
12	the Supervisor's office.
13	This was a decision that the Board made.
14	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Okay.
15	MS. SMITH: I will avoid naming the
16	employee but that employee's salary counts for the
17	difference that you see and the Comptroller's
18	Office can speak to that.
19	DEPUTY COMPTROLLER LONGOBARDI: That is
20	correct.
21	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: So, Ms. Madden, are
22	you saying that if you should win the election
23	that 2.1 million dollars is not enough for you to
24	run your office?
25	DIANE MADDEN: That is what I am trying to

1	come to what is the current budget for next year?
2	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: For the Supervisor's
3	Office?
4	DIANE MADDEN: Correct. Page 21
5	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Okay.
6	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: Two million
7	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Go ahead, Anthony.
8	COUNCILMAN D'ESPOSITO: I believe the
9	preliminary 2020 preliminary, two million one
10	hundred seven, eight fifty two.
11	DIANE MADDEN: That is generous. Thank
12	you.
13	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Are you willing to
14	cut that?
15	DIANE MADDEN: Um, not by an awful lot, no,
16	because I wouldn't be bringing in I will be
17	bringing in outsiders, non-politically driven
18	outside experts, as many as that much money will
19	allow.
20	And, I am not suggesting they will come in
21	making one hundred thousand dollars.
22	They may come in each making forty thousand
23	dollars, but, I think there is a lot of changes
24	that have to take place in this Town.
25	And, I believe the people that will come

1 in will have no issue working with the Board, with 2 the Commissioners, with the Deputy Commissioners. 3 They are not going to come in as a challenge or another party, they are not looking $^{\mbox{\sc Page}\,|\,22}$ 4 5 for jobs. 6 They are looking for change. 7 COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: You will have a lot 8 of hundred and fifty thousand, one hundred and 9 thirty thousand, one hundred twenty thousand 10 dollar jobs, if you are elected, so, those are 11 pretty well paying jobs. 12 DIANE MADDEN: What is the overall salary 13 for the Town - - I am using a lot of time here and 14 I just want to know - -15 COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Get back on your 16 agenda. 17 DIANE MADDEN: Exactly. For you to take 18 issue with salaries that are going to be for very 19 meaningful employees that are going to make 20 changes that are needed, I would think twice about 21 that because, again, I am not coming from a place 22 where I am looking to bring in salaries and jobs 23 after jobs, after jobs. 24 In any case, who can access the advertising

money that was reduced from ten to nine?

1	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Are you talking about
2	in the Animal Shelter?
3	DIANE MADDEN: Yes, please.
4	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: So, that would be the $Page \mid 23$
5	Animal Shelter personnel, the Director.
6	DIANE MADDEN: Who, specifically, because
7	ten thousand wasn't used?
8	There are animals that have to get out of
9	there and no one used it last year.
10	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: I guess, ultimately, it
11	would be at the discretion of the Commissioner and
12	the Director of the Shelter.
13	DEPUTY COMPTROLLER LONGOBARDI: Part of
14	the operations of the Animal Shelter.
15	DIANE MADDEN: The crematory costs, where
16	can I find that?
17	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: I am sorry, what costs?
18	SENIOR COUNCILWOMAN GOOSBY: The crematory,
19	she says.
20	DEPUTY COMPTROLLER LONGOBARDI: It is part
21	of account 4900.
22	DIANE MADDEN: I am sorry?
23	DEPUTY COMPTROLLER LONGOBARDI: It is part
24	of account 4900, if you look, I am apologize, I
25	just changed the page, one second.

1	MR. CAPOBIANCO: I apologize, my fault, it
2	is part of 4151.
3	DEPUTY COMPTROLLER LONGOBARDI: Fees and
4	services. Page 24
5	SENIOR COUNCILWOMN GOOSBY: It is for the
6	Animal Shelter.
7	DIANE MADDEN: What is within the health
8	line, what does that cover?
9	MR. CAPOBIANCO: That covers all the
10	outside vet services that we have.
11	The Town has, approximately, I would say,
12	one, two, three, four, five, six plus the
13	laboratory services that are required by the
14	Shelter.
15	DIANE MADDEN: The trainer, where can I
16	find that salary?
17	MR. CAPOBIANCO: The trainer, you mean the
18	behaviorist?
19	DIANE MADDEN: There was a straight line
20	item to have a qualified trainer at the Animal
21	Shelter.
22	I don't see that.
23	MR. CAPOBIANCO: The behaviorist that would
24	be
25	DIANE MADDEN: Yes.

1	MR. CAPOBIANCO: That is part of the 4151
2	account, fees and services.
3	DIANE MADDEN: What is the total amount
4	there?
5	MR. CAPOBIANCO: I believe it is for the
6	entire line, which includes, um, includes the
7	cemetery which we just spoke about, the
8	behaviorist and, um, Dr. Singh, so, that is,
9	approximately, about less than one hundred
10	thousand dollars.
11	DIANE MADDEN: So, what happened to the job
12	that use to be a Civil Service title, where did
13	that go?
14	And, why is it just shoved in with
15	something else, the second most important job at
16	the Shelter?
17	It was a Civil Service test.
18	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: We will have to look
19	into it and get back to you, Ms. Madden.
20	DIANE MADDEN: Where can I find the T and R
21	expense?
22	MR. CAPOBIANCO: T and R is part of the
23	health account. I don't think that is separate.
24	There isn't a separate account for T and R
25	expenses.

1	It is blended with all others, um, of the
2	same purpose, meaning health account, fees and
3	services, depending on what the scenario is being
4	done, whether it is medical supplies or veterinary $^{ m Page} 26$
5	services.
6	DIANE MADDEN: Where can I find the
7	lawsuits that are currently the four lawsuits
8	and also the audit lawsuit, is that within any of
9	this budget money?
10	MR. CAPOBIANCO: The representative
11	services is in the 4158 account which is legal
12	services, which is budgeted at two hundred and
13	seventy-five thousand for 2020.
14	DIANE MADDEN: And, that is for the outside
15	attorney that the Town is paying for to stop an
16	operational audit?
17	MR. CAPOBIANCO: That is not part of that,
18	no.
19	DIANE MADDEN: Where is that lawsuit money?
20	MR. CAPOBIANCO: I don't know anything
21	about that.
22	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: The number he gave you
23	was a bulk number, so, it would come out of that.
24	He is not being paid two hundred and
25	seventy-five thousand dollars, that is a bulk

1	Number.
2	DIANE MADDEN: That is for the anticipated
3	four lawsuits and the audit lawsuit?
4	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: Correct.
5	DIANE MADDEN: Where can I find the total
6	number of all the litigation costs for the Town?
7	(Whereupon, the three-minute bell rang.
8	After, the following ensued.)
9	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: For what period?
10	DIANE MADDEN: For last year, just take last
11	year.
12	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Mr. Ra, do you know
13	what the figure is?
14	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: You can FOIL it and we
15	will have to get it for you.
16	DIANE MADDEN: There is no number, here,
17	that shows what the taxpayers have paid and have
18	in outside litigation costs from 2018.
19	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: That wouldn't be in the
20	budget.
21	DIANE MADDEN: There is not an anticipated
22	amount?
23	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: I think the anticipated
24	amount is what we have set aside for that, is that
25	correct?

1	DIANE MADDEN: I am not talking
2	specifically for the Shelter, I am talking about
3	Town wide?
4	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Each department, if $Page \mid 28$
5	you go through the budget, each department has an
6	allocation for outside Counsel and legal expenses.
7	DIANE MADDEN: For every department, so
8	every lawsuit is related to a certain department?
9	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Well, it is allocated
10	if people sue the Town, it is because someone had
11	a slip and fall at one of our Parks and beach, the
12	legal fees would be allocated towards that.
13	If it was General Services, it will be
14	General Services.
15	Um, if it was Highway, if there was a
16	traffic accident with one of our pieces of
17	equipment, then, it would be allocated for that.
18	DIANE MADDEN: To get the number for 2018,
19	that was totally paid out, I would have to FOIL
20	that?
21	TOWN ATTORNEY RA: Yes, because it is not
22	kept in bulk, it is kept by the, um, the case, by
23	the lawsuit.
24	DIANE MADDEN: Okay, thank you.
25	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Thank you.

1	I think Senior Councilwoman, you would like
2	to announce some people.
3	SENIOR COUNCILWOMAN GOOSBY: I just like to
4	$_{ m announce}$ the fact that there are young people here
5	from my District.
6	They are the Teens Empowered to Advocate.
7	They are from Saint John's Baptist Church
8	in West Hempstead.
9	Reverend William Thomas, who is my friend
10	and Pastor and Sheila Thomas, his wife is CEO of
11	TEA they were brought here by the coordinators,
12	Ms. Cheryl Lovelace and Ms. Michelle Daniels
13	Dubois, so, thank you for coming.
14	(Whereupon, applause from the Town Board
15	Members and the audience was heard. After, the
16	following ensued.)
17	SENIOR COUNCILWOMAN GOOSBY: They thought
18	this was a regular Town Board Meeting, but it is
19	not.
20	It is one where you see we are talking
21	about the budget, so, at least, you got the chance
22	to hear something that you would not have heard
23	any other time because this happens once a year,
24	so, I am doing this, if you need to leave it is
25	okay.

1	It is up to you if you want to stay. Stay,
2	happy to have you.
3	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Thank you for visiting
4	with us. Page 30
5	So, I do not have any other slips on this
6	Public Hearing, is there anybody else that would
7	like to be heard?
8	(Whereupon, no response was heard. After,
9	the following ensued.)
10	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Supervisor, at this
11	time, I would like to move that the Hearing be

14	SENIOR COUNCILWOMAN GOOSBY: Second the

16	SUPERVISOR GILLEN: Councilman, could you
17	just explain why you think we need to adjourn it.

19	number of community meetings throughout the past
20	two weeks and I heard from my constituents and

22	addressed either in the budget or in our
23	amendments, I think we can do a better job cutting
