23	testing to the Town of Hempstead employees - Town
24	of Hempstead.
25	Resolution - Authorizing the grant of funds

to the South Nassau Communities Hospital. d/b/a Mount Sinai South Nassau located in the Town of Hempstead to be paid from monies received by the Town through the "CARES ACT" to establish a drive—  $\frac{Page \mid 5}{f}$  through COVID-19 rapid testing site in Oceanside for the residents of the Town of Hempstead - Town of Hempstead.

Resolution - Authorizing the transfer of monies received by the Town of Hempstead through the "CARES ACT" to fund unbudgeted, necessary expenses incurred directly related to the COVID-19 pandemic related expenditures by the MOUNT SINAI SOUTH NASSAU (\$445,967.00) TOWN OF HEMPSTEAD

Resolution - Authorizing amendment to the 2020 adopted budget to increase the General Fund Estimated Revenues, an increase to the General Fund Appropriations, an increase to the General Fund Undistributed Other Expense Account and the increase of the CARES Act Assistance Revenue Account in the Town of Hempstead General Fund Undistributed (\$445,967.00) - Town of Hempstead.

SUPERVISOR CLAVIN: Just before we ask any Board Members to be hard, just so everybody knows, as everyone is well aware, the Town received CARES funding under the diligent efforts of Senator



Schumer.

We have utilized that funding in many different instances to benefit and safeguard the wellbeing of the Town of Hempstead residents.  $\overline{Page \mid 6}$ 

To date, because of our teaming up with other entities, we have been able to provide over, now, one million meals through Long Island Harvest, some of those being delivered through Long Island Cares through the INN.

In addition, we have tested thousands of residents.

We have given funds to all of our hospitals in the area including private and public.

We have given funds to the Nassau County IDA, as well as, our private and public college institutions to assist them and, as well as, reimbursed First Responders and Fire Departments and Villages.

The purpose of today's Meeting and those items is because of the conversations we had last week with Health Care Providers, in particular, with Northwell and that is why we are having this Emergency Board Meeting, instead of sitting around and waiting, this Town Board acts and they act diligently and I am appreciative of all the



efforts of all the Board Members, in particular, um, with the Resolution will amend with Northwell and expand testing to Town Residents throughout the Town of Hempstead.  $\overline{Page \,|\, 7}$ 

So, regardless of where you live in the Town, you will be able to access, um, diagnostic testing.

This is essential, based upon our conversation with Northwell, as everybody is will aware, we see the spiking of the numbers and this is to safeguard all of our residents in every community throughout the Town.

The second Resolution with Baseline Health
Management is the ability to provide rapid
testing, not only to our Town's fulltime
employees, but to our seasonal and part-time
employees, regardless, if they have insurance
coverage or not.

This, again, is based on the advice of medical providers that are seeing a spike in this mobile, rapid testing unit can be mobilized and centered around different areas of the Town so we can safeguard and keep the government functions going as we have done during this entire pandemic.

And, the last one is a Grant to South



1	Nassau Communities Hospital, that will create a
2	mobile, um, drive-thru testing facility.
3	This is a wonderful initiative that South
4	$_{ m Nassau}$ proposed and I know all the Board Members
5	are happy and delighted to be able to team up with
6	all those entities and safeguard not only all the
7	residents but the workforce, whether it be
8	fulltime, seasonal or part-time.
9	And, you know, it has worked out well.
10	And, I do want to thank the Board, again,
11	for coming together, today and recognizing the
12	importance of having to do these Meetings in this
13	timeframe.
14	And, with that, does any Member of the
15	Board wish to be heard on any Item?
16	COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Mr. Supervisor, I
17	would just like to echo what you said, I want to
18	congratulate you for your leadership on this.
19	I want to congratulate my colleagues.
20	Increased testing is vitally important to keep our
21	Town healthy.
22	And, we have great facilities. We are
23	blessed with great facilities, such as, Northwell,
24	Long Island Jewish, which is located in my

2	it is a great thing to do for the Public.
3	And, I congratulate you.

17	I had a question about Number 2, um, these
18	tests, this is just the rapid testing, does the
19	Town offer the more accurate test?
20	I don't know the accuracy of rapid, but, I
21	heard it is considerably low.
22	SUPERVISOR CLAVIN: Absolutely, Diane, Ms.
23	Madden, I will rephrase that.
24	We have been providing testing through the
25	Summer.



We were testing for antibodies late until Northwell and all the other Health providers asked us to provide the PCR testing.

We have been doing that.

We have done that for residents. We have also done initiatives to focus on essential workers, um, throughout the Town and now based on Northwells' advice, we are pivoting to extending the testing, but the rapid testing gives the ability for the workforce to be checked and if they test positive, then, they can go for a PCR test.

You know, it may not be one hundred percent accurate but if they can identify in any instances when an employee full, part-time or seasonal, may have a symptom or test positive, it is to safeguard the workforce.

DIANE MADDEN: Thank you for that.

I mean, my concern would be, you know, for example with schools, they are not doing the rapid test because, obviously, if it is a negative positive, that person would be out of work for fourteen days, so, there is a little bit of a concern with that, that is why I am conflicted on why the rapid test for employees as opposed to



the more accurate test.

SUPERVISOR CLAVIN: Again, it is on the advice of the medical professionals who said, you know what, if you can start with the rapid test, Page | 11 if an employee shows some sort of symptoms and you are able to identify it quickly, then, they can go for the second level of testing which would be the PCR and I believe - - I believe the rapid tests are what the, um, I believe they are the ones that the Colleges are providing.

At the medical advice of our providers, they said for the workforce to have this mobile rapid testing unit and the success rate of them, they highly recommend, at this time, especially, with the numbers spiking throughout the New York Region.

DIANE MADDEN: Does anyone know what the cost of the rapid test is versus the more thorough test?

COUNCILMAN BLAKEMAN: Yeah, the rapid test can be two hundred dollars, um, per test and the PCR, typically is around one hundred dollars per test right, now.

But, as the Supervisor said, the rapid test is much easier to administer.



1	It is much faster.
2	It has a ninety percent accuracy rate. The
3	PCR test is a little better.
4	It is like ninety-seven percent, so, if $^{ m Page} 12$
5	someone tests positive in the rapid test, they
6	would, then, get a PCR test under the protocols
7	that the medical professionals have established.
8	DIANE MADDEN: Number 4, it mentions a
9	COVID Committee, could someone, please, tell me
10	who those members are?
11	SUPERVISOR CLAVIN: Number 4, Resolution
12	30283?
13	DIANE MADDEN: I believe it is Number 4, I
14	took some quick notes here, but I believe it is
15	Number 1 of the Resolutions mentioned.
16	SUPERVISOR CLAVIN: "Fund unbudgeted,
17	necessary expenses directly related to
18	expenditures by Mt. Sinai South Nassau for the
19	amount of $445,967.00$ ," that is all that says.
20	DIANE MADDEN: Okay, maybe it is on another
21	resolution.
22	Is there a COVID Committee appointed by the
23	Town?
24	SUPERVISOR CLAVIN: Ms. Madden, I have an
25	advisory committee of outside sources



1	and, then, we have an internal advisory committee
2	for COVID-related expenses.
3	DIANE MADDEN: And, that is a private
4	issue, I am assuming that is something that I have $$^{\mbox{\sc Page} 13}$$
5	to FOIL.
6	SUPERVISOR CLAVIN: Joe Nocella?
7	CHIEF OF STAFF NOCELLA: Supervisor, these
8	are Committees which are looking to examine
9	whether or not there is compliance with the CARES

12	whether or not anything is granted or budgeted,
